Many curious regulations regarding the pallium are to be met with in liturgical writers and in the general councils.

When the Archbishop's curia (mandatories) makes application for the pallium, he is to promise to convey it to its destined recipient with the greatest dispatch. He engages not to rest for more than one night upon the journey, unless necessity compels him, and he is to take care that in that case the church shall be kept in a church—if possible, in a cathedral.

With regard to the use of this vestment, the rule which St. Gregory seems to have had so strongly in mind is now established throughout the Western Church.

The Archbishop can never wear his pallium except during Solemn High Mass within his own diocese or province, and that only on certain days, and only on certain occasions, which, in so far as they are determined by the common law of the Church, are named in the Pontifical.

The only case in which the pallium can be worn outside the cathedral building is when a crowd of worshippers is so great as to necessitate Mass being sung in the open air. The pallium is buried with its possessor after his death.

**Object of the Church's Music.**  
COMMEMORATION OF DEVOTION WITH SONG.

That vocal music was employed in the divine service of the Church in the days of the Apostles is evident from the words of St. Paul to the Ephesians: "Speaking to yourselves in psalms and spiritual canticles, singing and making melody in your hearts to the Lord." (v. 19)

For the cultivation and preservation of church music we are first of all indebted to St. Ambrose, Archbishop of Milan, who flourished in the fourth century, and later on to Pope St. Gregory, Calixtus and many of the so-called reformers abolished all church music, both vocal and instrumental. But as the soul of Protestantism, like that of the Roman Church, is essentially Catholic, they soon found it necessary to introduce it again into their conventions to give life and feeling to their devotions.

That music, both vocal and instrumental, should be employed in the service of God, is both natural and reasonable, since man is composed of a body and soul. It is true that solid devotion has its home in the heart; but the heart, like the body, is to be ruled by the will. Hence the prophet says: "My heart and my flesh have exulted in the Lord."

The church introduced sacred song and music into her services, she well knew their helps to devotion and piety. The first duty of every Christian to God is prayer. The second object of the Church is to make it more efficacious and open a way for God to the soul. After grace nothing more forcibly moves the powers and affections of the soul than music. Nothing more clearly interprets its sorrows and joys.

"Mind as I love faint, low speak, Language fades before thy zeal, When thou canst breathe her soul as well."

So it is with sacred music. It expands the soul, gives it a holy enthusiasm which renders its prayer, like the soul of the cheerful giver, more acceptable to God. Was it not the soul of the minister's harp that the heart of the Lord came upon the prophet Eliseus to prophesy those things that were true? (4 Kings, 3) As the songs of his native land cheer the acile and make him think of home and friends, so do the songs and psalmody of God's Church inspire the Christian with the thoughts of heaven, his true home and country. "Thou art worthy, O Lord, to take the book and to open the seals thereof; because Thou wast slain and hast redeemed us to God, in Thy blood, of every tribe and tongue and people and nation." (Apos. v.) Why should not we, then, who are the fellow-servants of the saints, sing or hear the praises of God, since we are destined to sing these forever in the kingdom of heaven? Does not the harp, though played by the wail of Babylon, recall the joys of Zion, though the minstrel be in a strange land?

It has been customary at all times for the children of God to return His thanks by song and psalmody for all particular favors conferred upon them. When the Lord overthrew the hosts of Pharaoh in the waters of the Red Sea, Moses and the children of Israel sang this canticle: "Let us sing to the Lord, for He is gloriously manifested, the horse and the rider. He has thrown into the sea." (Ex. xv.) When David slew Holiath, he called upon his people in a canticle to give glory to God, "because he is good, because His mercy endureth forever." (Ps. cxviii.)
