

LABOUR DISPUTES.

On January 9 h Mr Borden submitted a resolution expressing the opinion that legislation should be adopted for the prevention and settlement of labour disputes and asking for a select committee of nine to inquire into this whole question and report what further enactments are desirable and necessary.

This motion was opposed by the Government and was finally shelved by a Ministerial amendment stating that existing legislation with certain proposed amendments was all that was necessary. The amendment was adopted on a party division of 78 to

ROBINS IRRIGATION DEAL. 
