LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

The weather continues very hot in Boston, and deaths and prostrations from the heat are of frequent occurrence.

Mrs John O McDonald and Mrs McDonald of Boston are visiting friends at St Peter and other parts of the Island.

Rev Father Ryan of St Paul, Minn., preached at the High Mass in St Dunstan's Cathedral last Sunday.

A tunnel five miles and a half long has just been completed through the Tauern Mountains in the Tyrol Austria. The work occupied six years.

The Argentine steamer Toro, was wrecked near Santiago de Chile the other day and seventeen passengers were drowned.

Mr Rafael McCormack, who has been visiting friends at Souris, returned to Boston on Thursday last. Mrs McCormack remains for some weeks longer.

Fourteen passengers were drowned at Marstrand, Sweden on Friday, by the capsizing of a small boat. Only one of the party escaped.

The china glassware house of W. J. Reid & Co. London, Ont. collapsed on Wednesday afternoon, with a remarkable warning. A score of persons were buried in the ruins. Seven persons were killed.

At Fort Brady, near South Ste. Marie, on Monday last a United States Soldier, named Bradal shot and killed Miss Cedarhead of Fergus, Ont. She was eight-months pregnant and the soldier shot at a deer and did not know he had killed the woman until informed of the fact later.

More than a hundred and fifty lives were lost Saturday night when the steamer Columbia, bound north from San Francisco for Portland collided with the lumber steamer San Pedro off Shelter Cove, Mendocino County. Eighty other persons who were on the Columbia, were rescued after being in the water several hours.

Four hundred beaver skins were seized by Provincial Inspector Loveley on Saturday last at Hull station, opposite Ottawa. The skins had been shipped from Maniwaki and were bound for Montreal when the Government men made the seizure. The fur, which is very valuable, is now in cold storage.

Edward R. Taylor, physician and lawyer, dean of the Hastings Law College and of the University of California, was elected Mayor of San Francisco on Thursday last by the board of supervisors and by the open vote of the city's graft prosecution, the so-called "reign of the big stick" came to an end.

The Southern Railway Company was fined \$30,000 and T. J. Green, their ticket agent, was fined \$3 in the State Court at Raleigh, N. C. on Friday last for selling railway tickets at rates in excess of that provided by the recent State law for uniform rate of 24c per mile to North Carolina. The court required Green to promise not to sell tickets at the illegal rate, which he did—and paid the fine.

There was a fair attendance at the chess board meeting yesterday. About 2,000 chess were boarded and nearly all were bought by Mr Spillett for 10, 12-16 cents.

A blind man named Jones occupying a summer residence at the Thousand Islands Park, New York, was disturbed by burglars Saturday night. He called the nearest year old son and told him to get the little cannon used for saluting passing vessels. He loaded it with blank shells and at the sound of the first shot the five burglars fled pell mell.

Thomas O'Connor, a boy 13 years of age, was killed by touching an electric light wire near Foster Pit at Stellarton, N. S., at 8 o'clock last Friday evening. He and another boy were playing in the street when O'Connor climbed an electric light pole saying he was going to get a shock. He touched one wire and his companions he did not get much of a shock. Then he grasped another and was instantly killed. He fell from the pole and was picked up dead.

John J. Wallace, a well known business man, of Pittsburg, Pa. is dead with a broken neck, his wife is dying at her home with internal injuries, and J. S. Henner and wife, friends of the Wallaces, are in a serious condition as the result of an accident which plunged them over a 180 foot embankment on the road to Butler, Sunday night, landing them in a big tree. Wallace was dead when picked up. The others were unconscious.

In the second wreck on the Pere Marquette Railway at Sebawing, Mich., two trainmen were killed early on Sunday by an engine derailed one freight car on the Saginaw, Tuoula and Haron division, with tender and one car, was derailed by running through an open interlocking derailing device, and A. Kelly, conductor, and J. O'Leary, engineer, were buried under the coal of the overturned tender and suffocated.

The death list as a result of Sunday's collision near Salem Mich. in the wreck of an excursion and freight train, stands at thirty one, but among them are one hundred injured in Detroit and Ipswich. Eight are reported in a serious condition and not out of danger. Of the long list of sufferers in Ipswich, but one, Mrs Darling, is in a dangerous condition. Seven others of the injured are in hospitals and are not out of danger.

On Tuesday of last week a little girl two years old, daughter of Paschal McDonald Hunter given got hold of a bottle containing carbolic acid, which had been used in the house during illness. Before she was noticed she put the bottle to her mouth and drank the acid. Medical acid was summoned, it was impossible to save the child. She died a few hours after taking the poison.

A Winnipeg despatch of the 17th says:—Private advices received during the past few days from southern Manitoba indicate that the drought is having disastrous effects on the crops, and failure is staring many districts in the face. Rain has fallen in streaks along the creeks and rivers, and others have got no rain at all. Many farmers are reported to be ploughing up their fields. North of the C. P. R. main line extending to the boundary of the province and west into Saskatchewan there are excellent crop prospects.

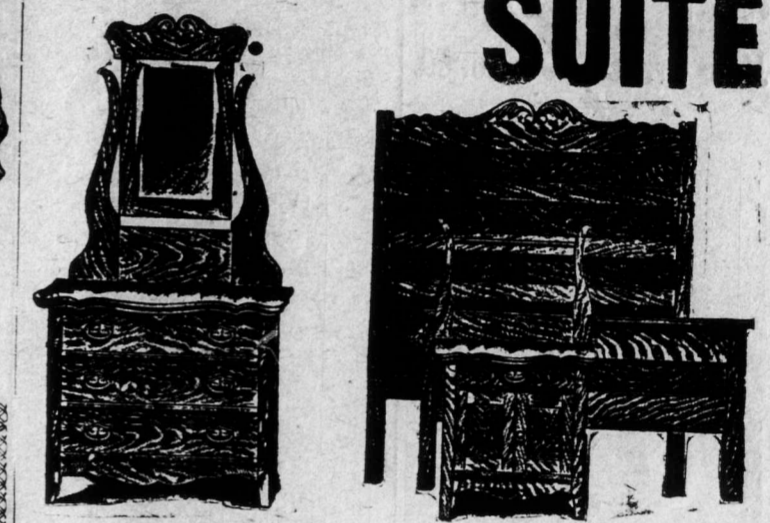

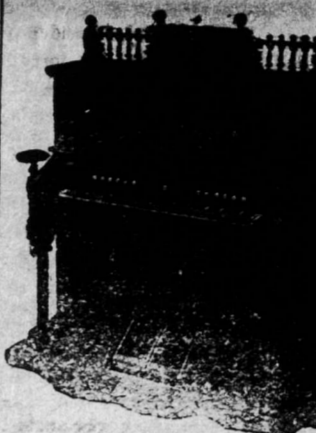
