TRAVELLERS' CONVENTION.
All Arrangements Made for Reception of Knights of Grip in Calgary.
Calgary, June 5.—The local branch of the Union of Canadian Travellers have made all preparations for their convention Monday and Tuesday. Representatives will go east to meet the delegates, the first of whom will arrive on Sunday night. Mayor Cameron has declared a half holiday on Monday in honor of the visitors.

Some weeks ago, workmen on Calgary's new city hall quit work because the contractor refused to pay them on the job who refused to walk to the office to receive their checks. The trouble still exists and the men are out yet.

Manager Richardson today announced that adequate arrangements have been made to properly take care of all who wish to visit the Dominion fair. From June 22 to July 9, plenty of accommodations have been arranged for.

THE C. P. R. CONCILIATION.
Foremen Obligated to Part With Labor Because of Strike Threats.
Winnipeg, June 5.—The conciliation board was engaged all day with Superintendent of the shops, who gave technical evidence as to the grading of labor, and the comparative paucity of apprentices, wherefore the trades are not recruited properly. He also gave instances of foremen being obliged to part with satisfactory labor under a threat of a strike because the men did not belong to the union. He filed comparative schedules of parallel roads in the States to show that the schedule of wages is higher here.

APPROVE SOCIALIST STAND.
Russian Socialists Thank British Socialists for Opposition to King's Visit.
St. Petersburg, June 5.—The social Democratic members of the Duma today to frame a telegram thanking the British Socialists and Labor members of the House of Commons for opposing King Edward's visit to the east.

In an interview, M. G. Gorky, socialist leader, said the British socialists and Labor members of the House of Commons had shown much greater than was all expected, but now that the exhibit has come to the end of its career, he said he had seen in the socialist press the only paper in the west that had seen the socialist policy.

Government Owns—pip.
Mr. MacKie then took up the plank of the socialist platform dealing with the ownership of railways. He said that the government should own the railways and not the private enterprise. He had come to the meeting to advocate the nationalization of the railways, not government ownership of the political parties. He quoted the King's speech and said that it was in the interest of the country that the government should own the railways.

Opposition of Railway Competition.
Mr. MacKie then introduced the startling proposition that competition will only aggravate the evils of the railway system. He said that the only way to improve the railway system was to have government ownership.

What Did C. P. R. do for Us?
A speaker—What did the C. P. R. do for Edmonton when it was the only railway in the west?

All we now have in the line of railways is by virtue of the commercial credit of the people of Canada. The immense sums given as bonuses to the C. P. R. and other lines will go far towards constructing the national system.

Prince Zu Eulenburg Reduced.
Berlin, June 5.—The Tasche Randschau today publishes, under reserve, a statement to the effect that an inquiry into the conduct of Prince Philip Zu Eulenburg on perjury charges, has compromised the great nobleman, until, lately, was a high official at court. When the inquiry was completed, the nobleman from his offices and requested him to leave his official residence.

Electric Cars Collide.
Annapolis, Md., June 5.—Two cars on the Washington, Baltimore and Annapolis Electric Railway company, running at a high rate of speed, collided near the city tonight and were completely wrecked. The motor car was caused by a defective bell. Eight people were killed and twelve seriously injured.

Need of Closure Rule.
Mr. Owen (Conservative, Northumberland) took objection to the statement of Hon. Mr. Patterson that the salaries of the civil servants had been held up by the Opposition. He said Mr. Patterson's supply had gone through the committee and was waiting for the government to introduce the supply bill. Hon. Mr. Fielding replied, amid cross fire, that the Opposition were claiming that the government was not bringing down the urgent estimates, such as salaries, which the Opposition would not unenviedly criticize, and the minister emphatically stated that the government would not be dictated to in what department should be heard first.

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Fatal Accident in Saskatchewan.
Saskatoon, Sask., June 5.—A fatal accident occurred last night at the Grand Trunk Pacific yards east of the city, in which Thomas Tiltley, foreman of one of the track laying gangs, was almost instantly killed, by being pinned between two stacks while the loading apparatus was at work. The unfortunate man was crushed to death before he could be released. Deceased was twenty-nine years of age and had been in the country nine years, coming here from Winnipeg a short time ago.

Twelve Thousand Troops at Quebec.
Ottawa, June 5.—Arrangements are practically concluded for the holding of a military camp at Quebec next week. It is understood also that about twelve thousand troops will take part in the Quebec tercentenary celebration, including permanent corps and contingents drawn from every district and corps in the Dominion from Halifax to Victoria.

Physicians Move on Ottawa.
Two Hundred Doctors Sweeping Down on Dominion Capital.
Ottawa, June 5.—Two hundred and fifty doctors are coming from all parts of the Dominion, and will gather in Ottawa next week to attend the 44th annual session of the Canadian Medical Association. The meeting will last from Tuesday until Thursday

SURPLUS GREATER THAN \$19,000,000

Financial Statement for Fiscal Year Will Show Surplus Announced In Budget Exceeded.

Ottawa, June 5.—The finance department will close the books for the fiscal year ending March 31 last in a few days. A few returns are still to come in. Definite figures as to total revenues and expenditures are still unavailable, but the figures now in show that Hon. Mr. Fielding's estimate of \$19,000,000 will be more than realized.

TOTAL ASSESSMENT SAME AS LAST YEAR

City Assessor McMillan States That There Will Be Little Variation From Year It Reached Over Twenty-One Million.

The total assessment of Edmonton for the year 1908 will be practically the same as for 1907. The total of revenue for May, as shown on the books of the finance department on the last of the month, were \$3,262,700, a decrease of \$1,250,000 compared with the corresponding month of last year. The total revenue for the first two months of the present fiscal year is given as \$11,250,281, a decrease of \$3,221,524 as compared with April and May of 1907.

TO FIGHT FOR ESTATE OF NINETY MILLIONS

Syndicate to Be Formed to Press Claims of Descendants to Estate of Christopher Springer, of Delaware, an Edmonton Descendant.

Los Angeles, June 5.—In an effort to secure a share of a \$90,000,000 estate, declared to be awaiting claimants at Wilmington, Del., Charles D. Tufford, of 622 Lucas street, this city, is organizing the heirs of Christopher Springer, who died at Wilmington in 1780.

The property, said to comprise a large portion of the city of Wilmington, as well as considerable valuable farming lands both in Delaware and Pennsylvania, was left by Springer, who died without issue.

His only child, John Springer, died in 1880, when the lease expired, the Swedish Church was confronted with the problem of disposing of the property.

Through carelessness, some of the heirs had passed into the possession of other people, though no valid title was ever given.

The state authorities were called in to help settle the matter, but the matter proved too much for them.

It was then decided to advertise for the heirs, and ultimately to divide several million dollars' worth of the estate.
