



Ladies Shirt Waist with Gibson Plaits.

A type of shirt waist that is easily made and becoming to most women is here shown. The pocket is a smart feature that may be omitted. The sleeve is the regulation shirt sleeve with straight cuff and lap. The pattern is cut in 6 sizes: 22, 24, 26, 28, 30, 32 inches bust measure. It requires 2 1/2 yards of 36 inch material for the 36 inch size.

Doubtless the reason Emerson was so great a teacher was that he realized that the youngest of his pupils COULD teach him something.

Wise though you may be, deep thinker and earnest student, every one you meet could teach you something, almost every one, a great deal.

Old Age Pensions.

In another column of to-day's issue will be found Sir Robert Bond's speech on Old Age Pensions. The scheme he advocates, the "Universal Scheme," is regarded by all writers on the subject of Old Age Pensions as the most popular. It is that under which a State pension of one dollar a week is to be granted to all persons who attain the age of 65 years. To require no specific contribution from the pensioners, and it imposes no limitations in regard to their characters. As soon as a man attains to the age of three score and five years, he is entitled to receive his pension. This is the scheme which received the powerful advocacy of the Right Hon. Charles Booth, who, Sir Robert Bond has described as the father of the Old Age Pension movement in England, and was adopted by all the Trade Unions and other organizations of the working classes in Great Britain. One of the Merits of a Universal Scheme is that its cost of administration should be small. The Registrar of Births, Marriages and Deaths might very properly be chosen as the pension authority, because he has obvious facilities for determining the age of applicants. He knows also when they die, a matter of considerable importance in the practical working of the scheme. From him the applicant for a pension would be able to obtain forms to be filled up; these would be a certificate of identity and a pension book, both of which he would present at the Post Office where he resides. The book would be post-marked at the proper space for each payment, and a duplicate copy similarly marked would be kept at the office of issuing. Nothing could be more simple, more secure or more satisfactory to applicants. No faint of paperism could possibly attach under such conditions, and the cost of administration would be trivial. But as Sir Robert Bond has shown the present Government have proved themselves incapable of dealing with the question of Old Age Pensions in either a practical or adequate manner; they cannot rise above the vulgar dolo. While they are wasting a portion of the public monies on the one hand and distributing another large portion among themselves on the other hand, the deserving poor, the old and the infirm are allowed to suffer. The Government are to-day paying Messrs. Downey, Seymour and Devereaux, three able bodied men who are capable of earning their living, more than one quarter as much money as they propose to distribute among four hundred poor old fishermen of 75 years of age and upwards.

It is a sad condition of things, but the public have themselves to blame for returning such men as compose the present Government to power.

Smallpox on Train.

Archibald Morgan, Seal Cove, not feeling well, this morning decided to come to town on the train, coming up from Hr. Grace. He intended to seek a doctor's advice and get admission to the hospital if possible. Dr. Jones of Avondale, happened to be a passenger on the same train, coming to town, and as soon as he saw Morgan, on the coach, knew that he had smallpox. He informed Conductor Lee, who on reaching Kelligrews, telegraphed to the Reid Nfld. Co. They at once informed Dr. Brehm of the Board of Health, who went to the Railway Station to confer with Mr. H. D. Reid. As a result a telegram was sent to Conductor Lee at Topsail, ordering him to hold up the train west of the Gas House. Arriving there at 12.40, Dr. Brehm and Dr. Paterson went on board. Guards were stationed on the doors of the second class car where there were about 30 passengers with Morgan and nobody was allowed out till all who had not been vaccinated recently had to undergo that operation at the hands of the doctors. The passengers were allowed to come out of the first class car without having bare their arms. Morgan was taken to the hospital at once. The disease is fully developed on his face. It is unknown where he contracted the disease.

Death of Mrs. Ayre.

The Angel of Death, which has been so busy amongst us for some weeks past, this morning removed another estimable and venerable citizen in the person of Mrs. Mary H. Ayre, relict of the late Hon. C. R. Ayre and mother of Hon. J. B. Ayre, Rev. G. J. Ayre, Messrs. F. W. Ayre and C. P. Ayre, the well known and highly respected business men of this city. Mrs. Ayre had reached the ripe age of 90 years, and her life was characterized by those excellent qualities of benevolence and charity which endeared her to many people of all classes and creeds. In her earlier years Mrs. Ayre was prominently identified with matters appertaining to the Methodist Church, but having received a painful accident some years ago she necessarily was compelled to withdraw from such activities. Nevertheless her interest in the church, of which she was such a devoted and loyal member, did not wane. Her charitable acts were numerous and freely and unostentatiously professed, and the deserving poor will have cause to regret the loss of a true friend. Her life was one act of kindness, always extended to the afflicted, and to her bereaved family the sympathy of the whole people will go out. Mrs. Ayre was a daughter of the late Mr. Bray, a well known contractor and builder of former years, who erected many cottages in the environs of the city. One daughter also survives her, Mrs. A. McDougall, of this city. The funeral of the deceased lady takes place Saturday at 3 p.m. from No. 12 Rennie's Mill Road.

No Sealing News.

Before the Rosalind left here yesterday afternoon Mr. Mann, of Bowring Bros., instructed Capt. Mann to try to establish wireless communication with Bowring's sealing ships on the front of the country. Mr. Mann had a wire from the ship which was west of Cape Race this morning saying that his instructions had been carried out, but that no information as to the ships had been gleaned. Last year several messages were received from the Florizel via Cape Race. This year it is quite likely that wireless messages will be received from Belle Island in the Straits and transmitted to the Quebec, but there is always a risk of the code words being mutilated and the information rendered nugatory. There was a rumour cut to-day to the effect that the Eagle had wire she was jammed off the Horse Islands with the rest of the wooden fleet, but Mr. Mann said he knew nothing of this.

There is no news from the Gulf to-day.

Special Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, To-day. When Congress assembled in December it is believed President Taft may be able to redeem his promise to submit the Treaty with Britain providing for a general and unlimited arbitration of all questions arising between Great Britain and the United States. It has been learned that negotiations for such have been proceeding informally for a long time, though neither side has yet submitted a final proposition.

Special Evening Telegram.

BERLIN, To-day. The declaration of Sec. Grey in relation to Anglo-German relations in the Commons have found a sympathetic response in the Zeitung, which announces that the views of the British Foreign Secretary on the subject of armaments correspond closely with the German standpoint. There is a prospect of further developments in cordial relations between Britain and Germany, and if an agreement is submitted, calculated to assist in allaying distrust in the British House of Commons, Germany is ready to do her part. Secretary Grey's speech is approved by most sections of the unofficial press.

Pertinent Questions.

The Following Notices of Question Were Given in the House of Assembly Yesterday Afternoon by Messrs. Roberts and Earle. Mr. Roberts.—To ask the Hon. Minister of Agriculture and Mines whether any of the agricultural societies established by the Agricultural Board have yet presented their annual reports; and, if so, to lay the same on the table of this House. Mr. Roberts.—To ask the Hon. Prime Minister why workmen employed on the branch railways last year were paid only \$1.00 and \$1.25 per day as wages, although the contract called for them to be paid \$1.50 per day; and what action he intends to take to prevent a repetition of this. Mr. Roberts.—To ask the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs if any motor cars or automobiles imported by any of the Messrs. Reid since the present Government assumed office

were allowed in without presentation of invoices or payment of duty; if so, why so? If invoices were subsequently presented, and if the duties paid were based thereon; if so, to lay on the table the originals of the invoices, and whether it is intended to insist upon the presentation of invoices respecting such articles. Mr. Roberts.—To ask the Minister of Marine and Fisheries from whom the plank was purchased for the repair of the King's Wharf in St. John's, and what price was paid for the same; and if the plank was purchased from Crosbie & Company or the Newfoundland Produce Company; if the price paid was \$22 per thousand; and if similar plank for the wharf at Kelligrews was purchased at \$10 a thousand. Mr. Roberts.—To ask the Hon. Minister of Finance and Customs how much silver was distributed through out issued to the Reid Newfoundland Company, to Crosbie & Company, or to the Newfoundland Produce Company, from July 1st, 1909, up to date; whether the Reid Railway Company paid their employees on the Bonavista Branch Railroad in silver; and why it was distributed through these channels, instead of through the banks as previously; Mr. Earle.—To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if any telegraph poles were supplied by Captain Jesse Wanser, of Westville, or any other person; if they were rejected by the Postal Telegraph Department as not being up to requirements; and if they were subsequently purchased by the Department in spite of this fact; and, if so, at what rate were they paid for. Mr. Earle.—To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if any payments or advances were paid to the contractors of the Bonavista Branch Railway last year prior to the performance of the work for which such payments were properly payable; and, if so, to lay on the table of the House copies of the correspondence between himself, the railway company and the Government Engineer in reference to such payments.



GOVERNMENT EXPOSED

To the Ridicule and Contempt of the Community!

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
March 14th, 1911.

SIR ROBERT BOND.—I have listened intently and have followed close the remarks of the Hon. the Premier in introducing these Resolutions, but I have failed to observe him advance any argument in justification for the restricted, and to my mind entirely unsatisfactory, measure before us.

The question of Old Age Pensions is, and so far as I am concerned shall remain a non-party question. A few days ago an attempt was made by a member of the Government to give it another complexion by charging the late Government with inconsistency in respect to the matter, and this afternoon the Premier had followed in the same line of conduct by quoting from speeches delivered by the Hon. John Anderson in which he had a public meeting condemned an Old Age Pension Scheme. This speech the Premier had declared was delivered by Mr. Anderson on behalf of the late Government and must be accepted as the views of the late Government. That was a most unwarranted statement on the part of the Premier, it was an unfounded and utterly incorrect statement. Mr. Anderson was not a member of the late Government, I cannot be sure that he was even a supporter of that Government. I know that he had no authority to speak on behalf of the late Government and he therefore must, and could only, have spoken as a citizen and taxpayer. Now no provocation will induce me to descend from the position that I took up in the year 1906 on the question of Old Age Pensions. At that time, it will be observed on reference to the official report of the debates, I said that in the principle of Old Age Pensions the House of Assembly.

Might Unanimously Concur
for it was a question of workers and of these past, the allotted span for work. I declared that it was the duty of the State to extend every possible consideration, sympathy and relief to the aged poor and infirm, for they had done something in the building up of the country for which they should be recompensed. On the 27th of April 1906 an Address was unanimously adopted by the Legislature praying His Excellency the Governor to appoint a Commission "to inquire into the subject of providing pensions for aged persons" and in pursuance thereof the then Minister of Finance, the Commissioner of Public Charities, the Hon. J. S. Pitts, Hon. Edgar Bowring, Hon. John Harvey and W. B. Grive, Esq., were appointed such Commissioners. The chairman of the Commission was the Minister of Finance, and the Secretary was the Hon. John Harvey. The first meeting of the Commission was held on December 13, 1907, when it was decided "that regular meetings of the Commission shall be held on alternate Fridays hereafter." The Commission entered on its duties, as might have been expected considering its personnel, in a thoroughly business like manner. Correspondence was exchanged with officials in Great Britain, Canada, and elsewhere, and a lot of valuable information, blue books and other data bearing on the subject of Old Age

Pensions was procured for the guidance of the Commission in their deliberations. Several meetings were held, but before the Commission was in a position to report a General Election took place, and, as I advised, terminated the labours of that Commission. There was no unnecessary delay on the part of those gentlemen in dealing with the question submitted to them. The work was a gigantic one, having regard to the general financial exigencies of the country.

They Had to Work out a Scheme of Old Age Pensions that the Legislature Would be Warranted in Adopting, and that Would Commend Itself to the Whole Country.

Not an easy thing to do in a country of very narrow financial resources and constantly fluctuating revenues. In England, the wealthiest nation of the world, statesmen of both political parties hesitated to move in this matter of Old Age Pensions without searching enquiry and the greatest caution. First there was a Royal Commission appointed to enquire into the subject in all its bearings, then a Committee of Reports, and then a Select Committee of the House of Commons. Twelve years were thus occupied and no conclusion was reached. The Old Age Pension Act passed by the Imperial Parliament in 1908 was the outcome of the labours of the National Committee on Old Age Pensions which was representative of the Labour Unions of Great Britain numbering three million members. These unions sent delegates to what was termed the National Committee which had for a nucleus such distinguished leaders of thought as the Right Hon. Charles Booth, Francis Herbert Stead, M. A., and Frederick Rogers. It was several years before the Labour unions could agree as to a scheme of Old Age Pensions, but guided by the wisdom and moderation of the gentlemen I have named they became as a unit, and acting in unison they won the nation to their will. Strange as it may appear at first sight the South African War hastened the day for Old Age Pensions in Great Britain. That war had called upon the taxpayers of Great Britain to contribute two hundred and sixty million pounds sterling in extra taxes for its carrying out. At the close of the war the National Committee on Old Age Pensions, under the distinguished leadership of the Right Hon. Charles Booth, raised the battle cry of

"No Reduction of Taxes Without First Providing for Old Age Pensions," and it was taken up by the whole country forcing Parliament to pass the Act of 1908. The history of the Old Age Pension movement in Great Britain is a most fascinating study and at the same time conveys a lesson as to the care and caution that is necessary in dealing with a matter of this kind so as to do justice and inflict no injury on any person. I have scanned the history of this movement in England to show that the Committee or Commission appointed by the late Government to deal with the subject of Old Age Pensions was acting on the proper lines and were not open to the censure that has been passed upon them for delay. Again, the Premier says that the

question of Old Age Pensions was made an issue at the last General Election. That is not correct. How could a question be made an issue when both political parties had agreed on that question. The statement was not only incorrect but absurd. What the present Government had done was to give a solemn pledge that they would immediately if returned to power give Old Age Pensions to all deserving persons, and now they were as solemnly breaking that promise by providing in substitution a pauper dole. In my manifesto of 1908 I used these words—

"With regard to Old Age Pensions: From my place in the House of Assembly I have clearly defined my position in relation to the same, and have clearly indicated the sources from which such provision must necessarily come—namely, out of the General Revenue of the Country—when the old age pension scheme is adopted. A statement to the contrary would be nothing but a cruel deception. Any scheme of old age pensions would have to be provided for upon a basis beyond peradventure; therefore any body of men who realize their responsibility as trustees of the public are bound in honour to move very carefully in a matter of this kind. The present Government, appreciating their responsibility in the premises, and having regard to the general financial exigencies of the country, determined to call into their deliberations several gentlemen who hold the highest position in this city as financiers. These gentlemen have been gratuitously giving of their time to the consideration of this important subject, and together with the Executive Government, are endeavouring to work out a scheme that the Legislature will be warranted in adopting, and that will commend itself to the whole community. The electors of the country may therefore confidently depend upon the present Government bringing into force such a measure at the earliest possible date."

In the face of this evidence how can the Premier truthfully declare that the question was a party issue at the late General Election? The assertion is only an attempt to obtain party capital at the expense of political opponents, and it is an evidence of what the impelling motive while this motion really is. The Government evidently desires to be first to place on record in our Statute Book an Act entitled "Of Old Age Pensions, while in reality it is simply what parliamentarians term a "bastard arrangement" designed to deceive. Sir, I think the Government would have acted wisely if they had worked out a full and complete Old Age Pension Scheme. To my mind this proposal is neither practical, or adequate, or just. The secret force of social evolution, working the world over, has declared that the expectation of the aged poor shall not fall; that poor relief with its degradation and disfranchisement shall give place to the honour and respect that properly belongs to old age, and that no taint of pauperism shall attach or cling to the provision which the State confers on its veterans of industry.

Now Universality Alone Can Remove the Pauper Taint, and in My Opinion the Only Right and Just Plan is to Give a Pension to Everyone Who Needs it on Attaining the Age of 65 Years—Man and Woman Alike.
Modern conditions of industry do not favor the aged. Work nowadays is rushed, and it needs more nerve and strength than the old can bring to it. The community gains, perhaps, but the old people suffer, and hence their claim to special consideration. This House is under a greater obligation to-day to pass an Old Age Pension Scheme than ever it was before. Since 1906 we have passed the Workmen's Compensation Act, which provides compensation to the laborer from the employer if he should be injured or incapacitated while performing his employer's work. This has forced employers in self protection to call the men they engage, and the old and weakly are thus thrown out of employment. Then with respect to the women. Are they not deserving of consideration? The

Government by their proposed legislation say no. Why not? Do they not represent the wives and mothers who have kept the homes together under in very many instances a struggle for bare existence? The case of the women is even stronger than that of the men, for they may spend live of the utmost social utility with hardly any opportunity of saving a cent for themselves. Yet under the proposed Act the poor old women of the country are to be left to starve or to go down to pauper graves. You call this an Old Age Pension Scheme, do you? I call it a most heartless strategy, a cruel injustice. Again, the Premier's remarks would lead the House and the country to believe that there is a precedent for this legislation in the acts of other countries. I must remove that impression by declaring, without fear of successful contradiction, that there is no precedent in the world for such a bill as this. You may look to Great Britain, Denmark, Belgium, Germany, France, Canada, New South Wales, New Zealand and Victoria, which are the countries where old age pensions are in force.

And I Defy the Government to Show That Their Proposal in Any Way Resembles the Scheme of Either of These Countries.
The Right Hon. Charles Booth, the father of the British scheme, says in his work on Old Age Pensions: "The most desirable age for a State pension is put by various authorities at 60, 65 and 70. If we consider solely the usual working powers of men, 60 is now late enough in most manual industries; but some employments press less hardly, and in most cases the industrial breakdown precedes the financial breakdown by several years, so that we find 65 to be the age at which pauperism increases by leaps and bounds, and thus this age has been commonly chosen as representing the time when strength is gone and money spent and pensions most excellent. As 65 is the usually accepted age so five shillings per week is the usually accepted pension." England fixed the age at 70, Germany and France the same. Denmark at 60; Belgium at 65; New Zealand at 65; New South Wales at 65, and Victoria at 65. The present Government fix the age at which the poor man will be entitled to an increase pauper dole, for it is not a pension, at 75, for which as I say there is no precedent in the world. They have evidently done this to make their absurdly small allocation of twenty thousand dollars cover more cases. Now, according to the last Census there are within our jurisdiction, that is to say Newfoundland and Labrador,

The cost then of the estimated number of pensionable poor persons, say 5,038, would amount to \$251,900 per annum. A vote of that sum would allow every pensionable person, male and female, over 65 years of age fifty dollars per year pension. The Government's proposal is to vote only one thousand dollars. That amount will only provide four hundred persons with \$50 per year AND LEAVE FOUR THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED AND THIRTY-EIGHT PENSIONABLE PERSONS WITHOUT ANY PROVISION WHATSOEVER UNDER THIS BILL. Or, if this amount is divided amongst all who, under my calculation, would be entitled to it, then this so-called Old Age Pension scheme only amounts to Four Dollars per year, or less than One Cent per day and less than Eight Cents per week. Was there ever such a piece of absurdity and cruelty blended together before? Imagine a poor old couple, of whom it might truthfully be said that they had reached the "verid of life when the shadows of death are rapidly gathering around them, endeavouring to keep body and soul together on EIGHT CENTS PER WEEK. But, I would be perfectly fair to my political opponents. They say we don't propose to divide up the twenty thousand dollars amongst all who would be entitled to it under any pension scheme known to the world. We propose, they say, to select four hundred old men of 75 years of age who we may consider are deserving, and to give them FIFTY DOLLARS per year, or to increase their present allowance under the Poor Commissioner from \$24 to \$50 per annum. How can this be termed an Old Age Pension? The very suggestion of selecting from among the poor those whom the Governor-in-Council may consider the most deserving is evidence that extreme poverty is, the qualification under the proposed bill. The very thing that a pension scheme is designed to overcome, namely, the taint of pauperism, the Government propose to perpetuate under this bill. Again, this bill is bound to cause the most bitter heartburnings, for out of fourteen hundred and twenty-one old men of 75 years of age and upwards in this Colony the Government propose to select only four hundred for this charity dole, that is to say two persons in every seven. What is to become of the one thousand old men of 75 years of age and upwards to whom this bill will bring no comfort, no provision whatever? What is to become of the old men and old women, numbering four thousand six hundred and thirty-eight, between the ages of 65 and 80 upwards who are not considered at all under the proposed bill? The Premier says "half a loaf is better than no bread." But there is no half loaf; the whole loaf goes to the chosen favorites of the Government.

There is Not Even a Crumb of the Loaf to Divide Among the Four Thousand and Odd Poor Old People, Who Are Not Considered in the Proposed Bill.
Again, I say, this vote is nothing but a dole or largesse to be distributed by the Government on no principle of justice. Such a scheme as is proposed by the Government must necessarily be administered with some appearance of arbitrary dealing, for under the Government must appoint some one to draw and enforce the lines of demarcation decreed by the proposed bill. Some one in such a locality, probably the Relieving Officer, will have the task assigned him of dividing the

aged poor into classes of "deserving" and "undeserving." Such an investigation would necessarily have the taint of pauperism about it, and would thereby be entirely inconsistent with the principle underlying Old Age Pensions. Then again, the Relieving Officer may be at personal or political enmity to the applicant, and the most deserving case may be left to suffer. Since the late Government went out of power, as a result of their wise administration of public affairs during their ten years of office, the revenues of the Colony have been yielding large surpluses, so that the difficulties that forced the late Government and the Commissioners appointed in 1906 to consider Old Age Pensions do not exist to-day. There is no reason why a universal scheme of Old Age Pensions should not be dealt with at once.

The Premier Says This Cannot be Done.
because, first, the surplus revenue is required for telegraph extension, the building of light houses and other such works. My reply is that to take current revenue for such purposes is improper, because such public works are a proper charge against capital account, and what is required for such purposes should be raised by loan. The late Government were censured by the present Minister of Finance for their temporary loans, which it was the intention of the late Government to cover by a permanent loan, for such public works; but the course was entirely proper; and to argue that other Governments had paid for telegraph extension and light-houses out of current account was not to justify in any way the practice. Further, the present Government have been boasting of their surplus revenue—a revenue that did not flow from anything that they had done—but I would remind the Minister of Finance that it is not sound finance to have large surpluses. We should only tax to the extent of the absolute requirements of the public service. This principle was laid down by Mr. Gladstone, who, with the possible exception of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, was the greatest Finance Minister that England has produced. A portion of that surplus, namely, that which goes to pay the interest on the Railway Loan of last year, might more properly have been reserved in aid of Old Age Pensions. Now it goes out of the country to foreign bond holders to pay for wild cat railway schemes. Then there is another large portion which flows into the Treasury from the great industry at Grand Falls.

An Excellent Sermon.

At the service in the R. C. Cathedral last evening His Grace Archbishop Howley occupied the pulpit and preached an instructive sermon from St. Matthew, 3rd chap 1-8. The portion of the text which His Grace particularly emphasized was:—"Do penance for the Kingdom of Heaven is at hand."

His Grace reviewed the practice of the early Church, showing that acts of penance were always performed, and substantiated this truth by quotations from the Old Testament, particularly where the Prophet Jonas warned the Ninevites to do penance in sack cloth and ashes to avert the anger of God and save their city from destruction; showing that anterior to and under the Mosaic dispensation the Israelites observed the laws of penance and fasting. St. John the precursor of the Redeemer, was a great example of the necessity for acts of penance, having lived a life of asceticism in the desert, his food being locusts and wild honey. The first act of the public life of the Saviour was the forty days fast in the desert. Penance did not altogether mean an inactive condition of the soul but should be given expression by outward acts. His Grace spoke of the fact that the rigors of the fast had been relaxed this Lenten season, but there were ways by which people could practice self-denial, such as abstaining from all amusements and games, and above all abstaining from backbiting, calumny, detraction and kindred faults. He inculcated charity to all and emphasized the spiritual benefit to be derived from alms-deeds, the reading of good books, attending the Church services, family prayers and approaching the Sacraments, and then indeed would Christ reign in the soul. "This holy season of Lent is 'the acceptable time' and 'the Kingdom of God is at hand.' The Jews of our Lord's time believed this was to be a great earthly kingdom which would restore the temporal power of Judea and free them from the bondage of the Roman Empire, but Christ had told them repeatedly that His Kingdom was not of this world, but was a spiritual or heavenly kingdom which should endure for eternity. By corresponding with the Grace of God and leading a good life, even in this world, we participate as members of Christ's everlasting heritage.

LONDON, March 15.
Warfare in the Air was discussed in the House of Commons last night. Mr. Haldane, Secretary for War, gave details of the preparations of the British Army for fighting with dirigibles and aeroplanes. A further sum will be expended by the Technical Research Commission. The War Office has acquired five aeroplanes, three of the latest pattern; five biplanes will be delivered in April. The War Office will make use of other biplanes for experimental purposes. An observation war balloon factory has been completely organized. Lord Kitchener will be placed at the head of a Special Committee to get men for the Royal Engineers who can direct and conduct aerial warfare.
