





At the expiry of the notice a petition is filed in the Crown Lands Department. This petition is considered by the Minister of Agriculture and is forwarded by him.

Harvey was a member of the Executive Council and for many years was a large shareholder and also a director of a Company which operated a coastal con-tract north and west, similar to that now held by Bowring Brothers, Ltd. Mr. Harvey was also a member of a firm or company which (some time prior to 1898) leased from the Government the dry dock at Riverhead, now owned and operated by the Reid New-foundland Company.

Before the suspension of the Union and Commercial Banks in 1894, some of their Directors were members of the Executive Council. Both these Banks had large transactions with the Government and held large amounts on deposit belonging to the Government Savings Bank. The late Hon. A. W. Harvey, the late Sir Robert Thorburn and Hon. W. J. S. Donnelly were Directors of the Union Bank, while at the same time holding seats in the Executive Council.







The Evening Telegram, St. John's, Newfoundland, June 29, 19:2-7 Oil Well Gushes Ten Thousand Barrels.

That is the Daily Flow From a Hole in the Ground in the Field Near Los

Los Angeles, Cal., June 10.-What is elieved to be the biggest gusher ever tapped south of Los Angeles is flowing at the rate of ten thousand barrels a day. The gas pressure, which was very heavy when the well came in, forced the tools out of the hole and scattered them, and then. with a terrific roar, the oil came shooting out, knocking parts of the derrick down and scattering heavy timbers in every direction.

The gusher was tabbed at a depth of less than 1,400 feet; the drill entering what was believed to be a stray fountain at about 1,300 feet less than ten days ago. A heavy gas pressure developed and the drilling crews prepared for emergency in case the stray formation developed anything out of the ordinary. To bring in a gusher at less than 1,400 feet is something entirely new in the Fullerton field.

The oil that first came out was estimated to be about twenty-five degrees gravity and of a nature different from that coming from other wells in the field. The volume of gas from the appearance of the tremendous flow of oil supposed to be banked well back in the formation.

From last report the gusher was not throwing its oil over the top of the derrick, a contrivance being arranged | with heavy timbers to break the pressure of the flow and throw it about rather than straight up. The big well was reached with ten inch casting. making it capable of throwing out the great volume of oil without weakening the casing, but while the well shows no indications of sanding up i is said that such is proable.






