DUMBA SWILL BE NURSED ACROSS. WASHINGTON, Sept. 30. Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British Ambassador, personally delivered to Acting Secretary Polk, of the State Department, to-day, a safe conduct under which Dr. Dumba, the Austrian

Ambassador, may return to Vienna. QUESTIONED IN THE COMMONS.

LONDON, Sept. 30. Asked by Thomas Ewing in the Commons to-day, for an assurance that the financial interests, backing German manufacturers in American banks under German control, would not be able to combine to evade conditions governing concessions regardng the exportation of German goods, Lord Robert Cecil, Secretary for Foreign Affairs, declared he could see no lity of such evasion. The Uner Secretary explained that the transactions for goods must have been empleted before March 1st last. The toppage of goods, which the purchasr is bound to take delivery of, on or shipment, and, bound to pay for in any event, he pointed out, inflicted no injury upon fermany, but involved hardship on ! eutral purchasers only, and thus ! cceeded in doing a thing that Britain wished to avoid.

TELEGRAMS WILL BE DELAYED.

LONDON, Sept. 30. The Postmaster General announced to-day that pending further noce, all telegrams to neutral countries in Europe and to Russia by way of the great northern lines and for Serbia, would be subject to 48 ours' delay.

INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES.

LONDON, Sept. 30. Commandeering Greek steamers by the Greek Government has already affected the freight market. Rates from Cardiff to the Mediterranean have risen ten shillings per ton. It is estimated that quite fifty per cent. of the tonnage on this route is under the Greek flag. The withdrawal of Greek steamers will also accentuate the existing scarcity of tonnage for the United States and elsewhere.

The scene within the chamber, as the Premier announced the government policy was a striking one. Except for frequent outbursts of enthusiasm, impressive silence ruled the chamber. Premier Venizelos read his declaration. Be sides defining the Greek policy of mobilization, he declared it to be purpose of Greece to maintain all its obligations of supporting Serbia. Renewed assurance had been given that Greece was ready to support Serbia if a casus foederis arose, but he sincerely hoped that casus foederis would not present itself. The chamber afterward passed a bill applying Seres and Kavala districts, as well as to Athens and Piraeus.

Washington, Sept. 25.-James F. J. Archibald, the American who acted as nessenger for Dr. Constantin T. Dumba, Austro-Hungarian Ambassador here, will probably not be prosecuted by the Department of Justice.

Examination of the papers relating to Archibald's activities has not been completed by the Department, but some officials say there is no statute covering the case. As a result of the incident, however, it was said that Congress would be urged to enact a law to cover such cases.





Of \$2,500 and Above, to Replace Liq-uor Revenue When Prohibition is

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir.—In view of the success of the prohibition campaign, I hope that our Legislature will carefully consider the question of re-adjustment of taxation which is sure to arise. At the the present time it is said that the amount of revenue derived from the importation and manufacture of potable spirits, ales and wines is from \$370,000 to \$380,000. This is over onethird of our total revenue, and may be roughly stated as twelve per cent. to be lost to the revenue as at present arranged, and this amount will have to be extended over other goods to make up the deficiency. In other words the people who are now non-drinkers will have to shoulder a greater burden of taxation than formerly. It is argued that the consumption of spirits, &c., is confined almost wholly to St. John's, and if this is true, why should this extra heavy burden of twelve per cent. be put upon the people in the outports? There are quite a number of people in St. John's who are non-drinkers, particularly among those who work in shops, stores and otherwise, for salaries which have, for some years, been inadequate for their support. These people, male and fe-male, are now living from hand to mouth, and lately, owing to the increased taxation to meet war conditions, are sore pressed, and really cannot support life if they had to pay an extra twelve per cent. Now, Mr. Editor, it is only fair to the outport people, and the workers and others in St. John's who do not indulge in spirits, wines, ales, &c., that those who do should bear the greatest part of this taxation. There is one way that it can be done, and that is by putting an income tax on all incomes of \$2,500 and over, grading rate of taxation, from a minimum of fifty cents in the dollar on \$2,500, increasing by five cents on the next \$500 or \$3,000 and so on. It is high time now that those who can afford to pay the taxes should do so, and that some relief ought to be given to the men and women to whom starvation sal-

The man who can afford to pay to-bacco factories to close down, and to advance the price of bread by shutting up competing bakeries, are the men that should pay extra taxes. The men who are making their fortunes by such means are working against the poor man by forming trusts which greatly increase the cost of Tobacco and Bread, the one the poor man's luxury, and the other the fisherman's necessity
