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
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

(F. J. Morris, K.C., Presiding.) Constable Whelan vs. Edward Sinnott. For breach of Sec. 4 of the Act to Prohibit the Importation, Manufacture and Sale of Intoxicating Liquors into and in Newfoundland after the First day of January, 1917.

Judgment on Preliminary Objection In the matter Mr. J. A. W. McNeily, liminary objection to my jurisdiction as Justice of the Peace to hear and determine these proceedings, quoting

"All penalties under this Act shall be sued for, imposed and recovered in a summary manner before a Stipendiary Magistrate by any person who shall sue for same."

Quarter Sessions Act, as Justice of the Peace I have jurisdiction to try this complaint. The Section is as fol-"In places in which there may

be no Stipendiary Magistrate, or when he shall be absent, a Justice of the Peace may exercise his jurisdiction and authority as if he were a Stipendiary Magistrate, save summary trials under Sections 8 and 9 of this Act."

As these are the first proceedings taken under the "Intoxicating Liquors Prohibition Act, 1916," and the rights and interests of a number of citizens may be affected by the operation of the Statute, and as the question jurisdiction has been raised by the learned Counsel for the Defence, after careful consideration I am of opinion that the hearing of this complaint should not be proceeded with by this Tribunal as at present constituted.

I will immediately report the matter to the Minister of Justice. Dated the 12th day of January, A.D.



LONDON, Jan. 11. Six lines of entrenchments, covering the town of Rafa, on the Sinai Peninsula, have been captured by the British, it is announced officially. The statement says 1,600 Turks were captured. Rafa is thirty miles northeast of Elarish, Egypt.

DEPRIVED OF COMMAND.

LONDON, Jan. 11. A despatch to the Daily Mail from Paris, says: "I have it confirmed from neutral sources, usually very well informed on such matters in Germany, that Crown Prince William has been deprived of all effective military command."

BRITISH ADMIRALTY SHIP CORN-WALLIS SUNK.

LONDON, Jan. 11. The British Admiralty Ship Cornwallig has been sunk by a submarine. The seaplane carrier Benmychree also has been sunk.

FRENCH TROOPS EXPLODE MINE.

PARIS Jan 11 In the Argonne district French troops exploded a mine, causing heavy damages to their adversaries, according to the French war office. An abtack by Germans on the Meuse right bank was repulsed with heavy losses to the Germans.

FORECASTING TERMS OF PEACE.

LONDON, Jan. 11. The Manchester Guardian's London correspondent, forecasting the terms of the Entente Allies' reply to President Wilson, says, restitution, reparation and securities are demanded, and the note gives some indications of the aims of the Allies in redrawing the map of Europe. The principle governing this must be the question of national losses, and certain formulas are mentioned. Belgium must regain her independence and be indemnified for her losses. The boundaries of France must be redrawn in a spirit of restitution. Italy must redeem her provinces, and the boundaries of the Balkans must be redrawn in conformity with nationality and history. Russia must have access to a warm sea. Great Britain is not mentioned, nor is the question of the colonies. The reply also deals with American proposals for a league to inforce peace which is approved in principle, but questions how such a league can be brought about and the machinery by which peace can be enforced. The striking thing to the world is that while the President directed a note to each of the Allies, the Allies reply as one.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11. Wayne MacVeagh, Attorney General in the Cabinet of President Garfield, is dead.

Your Boys and Girls.

You should be very careful of the food given baby after weaning. Between ten and twelve months it should be some simple soft food, such as junket and the gruel from oatmeal and other soft cereals. Baked potato is very good if it is properly prepared. Butter and cream may be added to the potato.

The juice extracted from a piece of boiled beef is excellent. Broths made from beef, mutton or chicken should be given with toasted stale bread. About three ounces at a time is the correct amount for baby over twelve months.

The baby between twelve and eighteen months should be given three meals a day with a light meal between breakfast and dinner and again between dinner and supper.


