

At eight years of age he appeared at the Pesth Casino, in 1839, and a discerning journalist hailed him at once as Paganini's successor, "a living marvel to see and hear." As a boy of eleven, he became the friend of Mendelssohn "the revered benefactor of my earlier days." When in 1844 the boy came to England, Mendelssohn filled his wallet with introductions to notable folk, and on the benefit night of the poet Bunn, the playbill announ-

"Master Joachim, the celebrated Hungarian boy, will make his first appearance before an English public." In 1852 he led the Court orchestra of the King of Hanover, and for the next forty years his home as director and conductor of the Royal Academy of Music. The 60th anniversary of his appearance was celebrated in Queen's Hall, where the 'master," surrounded by a great and sympathetic audience, played them the concerto of Beethoven, which he had played sixty years before to the Philharmonic Society. He married, in 1863 (while at the Court of Hanover), Amalia Weiss, then a leading singer in opera, and six children were born to them. The alliance, however, was an unhappy one, and for years they lived apart; but when, in 1889, Frau Joachim lay dying at Berlin, her husband hastened to her side, and they were reconciled before age of 76 on August 15, 1907.

AIR MAIL STAMPS.

The air post stamp has entered the sale room, and its fortunes there will be watched very closely by stamp collectors. Mr. Hawker was the first Atlantic air postman. He carried a small mail of about a hundred letters, each one of which was franked with the three-cent Newfoundland stamp duly overprinted to commemorale the occasion. The dramatic salving of the machine made the delivery of the mail possible after the soaked contents of the mailbag had been duly sorted by the General Post stamps are already highly prized, not only as mementoes of the event but also on account of their extreme rarity. One of these letters is to be sold in London. I have been shown stamps used for the mail brought over by Captain Alcock. These have an additional surcharge of a dollar on the face of the stamp. Then there are the mails brought over by the R-34. These include parcels and newspapers, but unlike the two previous deliveries they are franked with ordinary U.S.A. stamps. It is quite likely that we shall soon see the universal introduction of stamps for the carriage of mails by air routes. Such





The secret of the cooling and purifying pipe is the bowl of water situated directly below the bowl which contains the tobacco. A metal tube extends from the tobacco bowl down into the water bowl. At the top of the water bowl is an outlet pipe. By puffing the pipe, smoke is drawn through the metal tube, down through the water and out of the outlet pipe through the stem. Thus all smoke passes through the bowl of water before it reaches the smoker's

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
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
