

United States Addresses Note to Great Britain.

Bulgaria's Admission to League of Nations Opposed-Lords Carried Second Reading Home Rule Bill--New York Crowd Objected to British Flag--Thanksgiving Day Snow Storm in New England States.

U.S. WANTS ITS PLACE.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. The Government of the United States has informed Great Britain that it does not propose to be excluded from participation in the rights and privileges secured under the mandates provided in the treaties of peace. Furthermore, it expects to be heard regarding the terms of those mandates before they are put into force. The position of the United States is set forth in a note by Secretary of State Colby to Earl Curzon, British Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and the specific question discussed is that of the Mesopotamian petroleum fields.

WOULD KEEP BULGARIA OUT.

GENEVA, Nov. 25. Serbia, Rumania and Greece to-day formally notified the Assembly of the League of Nations that they are opposed to the admission of Bulgaria into the League.

NOT IMPOSING MARTIAL LAW.

LONDON, Nov. 25. Premier Lloyd George in reply to questions in the House of Commons to-day said that the Cabinet had decided not to impose martial law in Ireland at the present time.

THROUGH SECOND READING.

LONDON, Nov. 25. The House of Lords to-day carried the second reading of the Home Rule Bill rejecting a proposal for adjournment. The Committee stage commences Wednesday next.

CARSON AND THE ONE HUNDRED.

LONDON, Nov. 25. Sir Edward Carson has denied that he had received an invitation to appear before the Committee of Self-constituted Council of One Hundred members who are investigating the Irish situation. He adds that he would regard such an invitation as a gross insult.

AN OBVIOUS REASON.

LONDON, Nov. 25. The Irish problem again was brought up in the House of Commons to-day and the question of conciliation between the Irish people was raised. Premier Lloyd George giving his opinion in the matter declared "I have always been convinced that no policy of conciliation is possible in Ireland until the reign of terror has been broken for the very obvious reason that men in Ireland who would be prepared to enter into negotiations at the present time are in terror of their lives and cannot do so freely."

MORE SHOOTINGS.

LONDON, Nov. 25. A Dublin correspondent of the Central News says policemen and soldiers were shot dead in Infirmary Road last evening during a search for wanted men. The number of killed obviously has been deleted from the message, says the London office of the Central News.

BUT THE FLAG STILL FLEW.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25. The usual quiet observance of Thanksgiving day here was violently interrupted shortly after noon to-day when crowds who had attended High Regueman Mass in memory of Terence MacSwiney, former Mayor of Cork, rebelled at the sight of a British flag decorating the facade of the Union Club across Fifth Avenue from St. Patrick's Cathedral. After a fight participated in by hundreds of Irish sympathizers in the course of which shattering by missiles hurled by members of the mob, order was restored when a cordon of two hundred police established itself around the beleaguered building. The Union Jack was the cause of the assault and though taken down by the superintendent at the first demand of the crowd and subsequently replaced by order of the

club officers, it was still draped over the sidewalk with the emblems of France and United States when the fracas ended.

AT THE RITZ.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25. Hon. Richard Squires, Prime Minister and Colonial Secretary of Newfoundland, is staying here at the Ritz Carlton Hotel.

AGRICULTURAL BILL THROUGH.

LONDON, Nov. 25. In the House of Commons to-day the Agricultural Bill was read a third time. The second reading will be taken in the House of Lords next Tuesday.

WINTERY THANKSGIVING.

BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 25. Wintery weather made this Thanksgiving Day one that followed closely the ideas of the fathers who instituted it. The feasting and worship held a principal place on the programme for the day here after a snow storm had ceased or minimized the outdoor sporting events which have crowded former features in recent years.

RACERS KILLED.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 25. Gaston Chevrolet and Eddie O'Donnell, famous racing drivers, both were killed to-day when their machines crashed together on the Los Angeles speedway at the east end of the grandstand near the end of the two hundred and fifty mile race. Their mechanicians were badly injured.

WILL PAY FOR RELEASE.

LONDON, Nov. 25. The owners of the Italian steamer Cogno which was seized last September by D'Annunzio's Fiume Legionaries, have decided to land at Fiume fifteen million lire to secure the steamer's release, says a Rome despatch to the Exchange Telegraph quoting a message from Genoa.

HOSTILITY AGAINST LIQUOR BILL.

LONDON, Nov. 25. The Liquor Bill, recently introduced, which transfers control of the liquor traffic from the War Board to the Home Secretary, will it is stated be abandoned. The Government at this stage is not prepared to face the hostility which the proposal has unexpectedly aroused.

Walls of Ancient Tiberias.

Biblical scholars everywhere will be greatly interested in a chance find made in Jerusalem in August of this year by some Jewish workmen who were building a wall for the Palestine Government. In their excavations preparatory to the building they came across ancient walls and columns, and one of their overseers, an intelligent fellow, carried the information at once to Jerusalem. The location of the spot was that he suspected that the ruins of some important Old Testament edifice had been found.

Work was ordered stopped, and the Director of the Department of Antiquities went to the place with members of the Jewish Exploration Society. Preliminary digging was done and a thorough study of the grounds, the investigation convincing, the men that they had found the site of the ancient Tiberias, a place which had such great association with Christian and Jewish history. That it is near the modern Tiberias on the Sea of Galilee is, in itself, enough to promise important historical light.

The Palestinian Government granted permission to the Jewish Exploration Society to go ahead immediately, and uncover the ruins. Rapid progress is being made. The excavators have no doubt of the importance of their find and will be able shortly to draw up a plan of the ancient city, as opposed to the present day stronghold of Arabs and Jews. Tiberias, at the present time, is notorious for its feuds. The king of seas is said by the Arabs to hold his court in Tiberias.

The German Ambassador.

Once more Germany has an ambassador to Great Britain—the first since August, 1914, when war was declared, and the German Ambassador, Carl Prince of Lichnowsky, was sent home. The latter seems to have done his best to maintain peace, but he was deceived up to the very last by the German Government that was at the least trying to hoodwink Great Britain and delay her intervention until the German armies had "hacked" their way through Belgium, and given France a knock-down blow. Lichnowsky has published an account of his conference with Sir Edward (now Viscount) Grey, the British Foreign Secretary at the time, and that account corroborates the statement that Sir Edward and the whole British Government strove up to the very last minute to preserve the peace of the world.

The war came and finally the Allied victory brought it to an end. A treaty of peace was signed, and Great Britain and Germany again resumed commercial and political intercourse. Then Germany sent to London Herr Friedrich Sthamer to look after her interests. At first he was Charge d'Affaires, that is, an acting ambassador, administering the office but without the title or full official rank. From February last until a few days ago that was the position of Herr Sthamer, but he has now been made full ambassador, the first from Germany since Lichnowsky left London shortly after the great war had burst upon the world.

As is the practice with respect to every new ambassador, Herr Sthamer was received at Buckingham Palace by King George.

Herr Sthamer has been accompanied to London by his wife and daughter, and also by his family in residence at the German Embassy in Carlton House Terrace, London.
