Majestic Holds Carrying Record

WHITE STAR LINER CONVEYED 37.876 PASSENGERS IN 1923.


NEW YORK, March 1 .- (Special to Star from Own Correspondent) .- The greatest number of passengers transported both ways across the Atlantic Ocean in 1923 by any one steamship line or group of lines were carried by ships of the International Mercantile Marine Company, the total being 231,-

The figures embrace carryings between ports in Europe and those in Canada, the United States and Cuba. by ships of the American Line, Atlantic Transport Line, Leyland Line, Red Star Line, White Star Line, and White Star-Dominion Line, but exclude carryings on West Indies cruises. In the number of passengers carried to Europe in 1913 the company also led, having carried 31 per cent. of the total taken out by ships of all line in first class, 21 per cent. in second class and 16 per cent. in third class.

The ship carrying the largest number of passengers both ways across the Atlantic in 1923 was the Majestic of the White Star Line, the total being 37,876, or nearly 8,000 more than the total of her nearest competitor.

The Majestic also achieved the record of the largest number carried in first class in 1923 on a single trip,

In passenger traffic to and from Ireland the White Star Line led, with 9,583 passengers of 48.21 per cent. out of a total of 19,898 carried by all lines.

Obituary.

THOMAS CULLERTON.

Mr. Thomas Cullerton, aged 72 years lied at midnight Thursday night at Bar Haven after a brief illness. Mr. Cullerton, who was a native of Placentia Bay, was actively associated with Catholic and civic affairs at Bar Haven for nearly fifty years, and was dearly beloved by the people of Placentia Bay irrespective of creed or class. In his business career he was engaged in the Lobster packing industry, and was widely known as an expert on the scientific aspects of codfish conservation. He gave his whole undivided attention to all those interests that were susceptible to the beterment of the laws of the country and his God. Mr. Cullerton was a man of deep foresight and prudence, an ardent Catholic of unaffected plety, and a zealous worker in the cause of religion. He was a gallant man when in command of his boats, and many thrilling tales could be published with illustrations by Rather Caceiola of the dashing trips they made together in storm and stress with his intrepid crews on calls of mercy, or to the mainland to intercept a special train to attend sick calls on the Eastern Shore. His funeral, which took place from his late residence, was one of the largest ever held in Bar Haven. Solemn High Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul in the beautiful church of St. Francis Xavier, Bar Haven, by the Rev. Francis Cacciola, who in fitting words paid a choice testimonial to his many traits of character, zeal and enterprise in the great church, Interment took place in Calvary Cemetery Bar Haven.
