### Tragic Drowning Yesterday

**THREE MEN FROM S.S. TERRA NOVA LOST LIVES TOWING SHIP.**

One of the more too frequent tragedies in connection with the seal-hauling industry, occurred yesterday, a short distance off this port, where three men from S.S. Terra Nova lost their lives. The first news of the tragedy was contained in the following radio received by Bowring Bros. from Capt. A. Kean, yesterday afternoon:  
"Extremely sorry inform you when crew was helping haul ship through ice this morning about seven men fell through weak pan of ice. Before they could be hauled out three of them were drowned. The names are as follows: David Whelan, St. John's; Maurice Breen, Ferryland; Hubert Hiscock, Champneys. Stopped engines and made thorough search for the bodies, but all efforts were in vain."  
Upon receipt of the message Messrs. Bowring Bros. got in touch with the fishermen of the vicinities where the victims resided and asked them to convey the sad intelligence to the men and leaves a wife and four children. He resided on Newtown and the family is left in destitute circumstances. The duty of making the news of the loss of their winner devolved on Rev. Dr. ...

**ANACONDA COPPER MINING CO.**  
(From Boston News Bureau.)  
Chairman Ryan Says 1923 Profits In Excess of Fixed Charges Were \$8,500,000—Company Has Working Capital of \$72,000,000—Explains Dividend Omission.

Boston—In a statement to the shareholders of the Anaconda Copper Mining Co., John D. Ryan, chairman of the Board says:  
"As the regular annual report of the company will not be issued until May, it is deemed desirable to issue this letter in connection with the decision of the directors to omit the declaration of the dividend at the meeting held on the 29th."

"During 1923 the company earned, as nearly as can be estimated pending the final audit of all closing entries, and the closing of inventories of metals in process, and finished and manufactured products, approximately \$8,500,000 in excess of all fixed charges and costs, including depreciation."  
"Since the announcement that the declaration of the dividend had been omitted, there has been some comment that failure to act was caused by the fixed charges incurred in the financing of the purchases of the stock of the American Brass Co. and a majority of the shares of the Chile Copper Co."  
"The earnings resulting from these purchases have not only carried the fixed charges incurred in their acquisition, but have paid a substantial amount in excess thereof. Without such earnings it is doubtful if your company would have been justified in distributing \$9,000,000 in dividends during the past year."  
"The directors believe that in omitting the dividend at this time they are pursuing a conservative policy in view of the prevailing conditions of the copper market. During the first half of 1923 earnings were upon a fairly satisfactory basis, an average price of approximately 14 1/2 cents a pound was realized for all copper sold. Since then due to the increase of production to a maximum output, and the forced selling, largely on the part of custom smelters not directly concerned in either the cost of production or the price realized for the product, the market has been weak, averaging less than 13 cents a pound."  
"At this level, with increased wages and transportation costs, the margin of profit is narrow, and it is believed that it is better policy, looking to the interest of the shareholders, to maintain the company in a sound condition, rather than to weaken its current position by paying dividends not wholly earned from current income."  
Ryan Optimistic on Metal.  
"Copper is about the only stable commodity selling in the markets of the world at below pre-war prices. We do not believe that it can long continue to sell at the present level. Domestic consumption has doubled since the pre-war period, and any return to normal industrial activity in Europe will furnish the necessary excess of demand over production to cause market prices to advance and reach a level more nearly comparative with that of all other basic commodities."  
"The current position of the company is excellent. As of Jan. 1, net current assets amounted to approximately \$72,000,000."  
"We believe that only a small additional increase in consumption is necessary to take up the slack caused by the present rate of production, in order to place the industry upon such a substantial basis as will warrant an early resumption of dividend payments."

It was noted that the \$48,526 spent in Hr. Grace in 1923-24, the sum of \$21,452 was expended on Lower Island Cove. Witness said this section had always needed more relief than any other part of the island for thirty years past. ### TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

#### ITALIAN SOVEREIGNS TO VISIT ENGLAND.

ROME, March 11. It is stated that King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena will probably arrive in London on May 2nd to return the visit of King George and Queen Mary. This date has been fixed definitely between the two Courts, and it is probable that the Crown Prince will accompany the Sovereigns.

#### THE POPE LISTENS IN.

ROME, March 11. With the installation of wireless receiving set in the apartment of Pope Pius and the establishment of a broadcasting station at Rome for Italian amateurs, the Vatican now is able to listen in on programmes from practically all centers in Europe.

#### BELGIAN CABINET REORGANIZED.

BRUSSELS, March 11. M. Theunis to-day at the request of King Albert re-organized his Cabinet, the resignation of which was tendered recently when it met with defeat in the Chamber of Deputies.

#### MOSLEMS WILL NOT ACCEPT SUGGESTION.

LONDON, March 11. An announcement by the Turkish President, Mustafa Kemal Pasha, that the Caliphate in future will be vested in the Turkish Parliament, learned of in the Constantinople despatches to-day, was received with incredulity in London. It is believed here, however, that a great part of the peasant population in Turkey may be disposed to accept this radical departure from the tradition of centuries, but that Moslems generally will refuse to recognize any merely secular institution like the Angora Assembly possessing spiritual sovereignty over 300,000,000 Mohammedans scattered throughout the world and attempting to exercise powers of Allah's Vice Regent on earth. The British Government has no intention of interference in any way with the selection of a new commander of the Faithful.

#### NO RESPONSE TO S.O.S. CALL FROM STEAMER ON THE ROCKS.

NEW YORK, March 11. S.O.S. calls were flashed shortly before two o'clock this morning by the steamer Tours, saying she had been driven by the fierce gale, raging along the Atlantic, on to the rocks at Nuevititas, Cuba, and was in immediate need of two tugs to pull her off. At 2:15 a.m. the Naval Commission here, which were in touch with tropical stations to which calls were directed, said that no tugs had heeded the call.

#### REINFORCEMENTS REACH MOROCCO.

LONDON, March 11. A despatch to Daily Mail from Tangiers, says that Spanish reinforcements are arriving in Morocco and are checking the progress of the rebellious ruffian tribesmen. The Spaniards have recaptured several positions taken from them by the Moors.

#### AFFAIRS NORMAL IN IRISH ARMY.

DUBLIN, March 11. Free State Army Headquarters announced early this morning that the situation, following the recently reported mutiny, was absolutely normal in all commands. President Cosgrave is expected to make a statement in Dail during the day.

#### LORD PARMOORE URGES UNIVERSAL SUPPORT OF THE LEAGUE.

GENEVA, March 11. What the audience interpreted as a plea for German, Russian and the United States adhesion to the League of Nations, was delivered by Lord Parmoor to-day at the opening of the public session of the League Council. After pledging the British Labor Government to the whole-hearted support of the League's policy and activities, Lord Parmoor declared that world wide or European problems could never be satisfactorily settled until all countries interested in these problems became members of the League.

### Rev. Nicholls Invited to Come

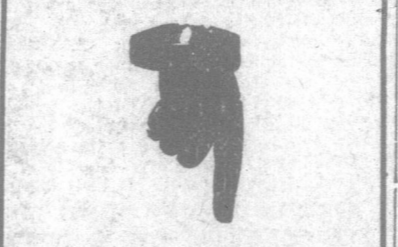

## THE BROADWAY HOUSE OF FASHION.

### In the Realms of Sport

#### BOXING IN ENGLAND. FIGHTERS CRAZE FOR HEAVY WEIGHTS—FINDING ANOTHER WILDE.

I never see a fight between little men without wondering why it is that the world is so full of people who are boxing enthusiasts only when they are given an opportunity of seeing heavyweights disappoint.

I was thinking at the National Sporting Club during the process of the flyweight bouts which are designed to assist the successor to Jimmy Wilde that if the Albert Hall were taken to stage a contest between the two cleverest small men in Great Britain insufficient money would be raised to pay the doorkeepers.

If, on the other hand, the same building were leased to provide facilities for a rough-and-tumble between two larrikin men who were born into the world to handle cargo at the docks a fair surmise that extra police would be required to control the hordes of feverish spectators to get to the ticket offices.

It is the little fellows between the poundage of fly-weights and featherweights who almost invariably win the real boxing. They do not often produce knockouts, nor do they even receive the same respect as those that are in the ears of the average boxing follower of to-day.

In the matter of artistic ability—which nowadays counts for so little—the second-rate flyweight can usually provide more genuine entertainment in one minute than a heavy-weight can in a lengthy hour.

#### A Temporary Lull.

The present "slump" is hardly to be wondered at, for some of the contests that were put on in the late months of last year were enough to kill any enterprise. But it is significant that the fashion for no-holds-and-eliminating competitors is growing apace.

We are, indeed, reverting to methods so successfully employed twenty-odd years ago. The customary night of indifferent fighting—with one big bout between heavyweights and half a dozen preliminaries—has temporarily lost its drawing-power. Apparently the only way to attract spectators is by promising them lengthy series of competitions.

The sign is a healthy one. Competitions do more than interest; they uncover unknowns and bring out the youngsters whose novitiate days are not quite over. I observe that the Ring (Blackfriars) management have gone beyond offering substantial purses to novices.

Part of the prize for the next heavyweight competition is a course of tuition by Frank Moran, the American. This is excellent, and one can only hope that the idea will be copied.

The lull, however, is not likely to be an extended one. I have heard talk of several projected big fights for March and April, but I place no reliance in these statements, for the reason that it is common knowledge that practically all the chief fighters in Great Britain are under contract to certain people.

The new promoters—and there are many of them—can find halls in plenty, but their chief obstacle is that they cannot discover non-contracted pugilists to fight in them. Whether this is good or bad for boxing may be left to individual opinion. Personally, I think it is one of the causes of our lowliness.

#### Wide the Wizard.

Two flyweight contests at the N.S. recently were good enough to be described as the best observed this season. In each contest they contained all the essentials that make for entertaining exhibitions. The four principals were naturally enough, considerably removed from the lofty position once occupied by Jimmy Wilde, but Kelly and Garrard, the two winners, are of a neatness and skillfulness that would probably tempt some of us to label them as unusually clever performers if we had not had our taste for flyweights recently warped by their wonderful little predecessor.

Wilde was very much more than a boxer or a fighter. He was a wizard and a phenomenon and a freak. It will be exceedingly astonishing if we again see his like in our time.

Honey, his countryman, on whom such high hopes were based, fell far below the standard expected. He is one of the few Welshmen I have ever seen who relies solely on fighting.

The average Welshman, especially in the Rhonda Valley, boxes first and fights afterwards. In so doing he is merely following a tradition which comes as naturally to him as does part-singing in a male-voice party. But Anthony is an exception.

Remarkably like Jim Driscoll both in body and in face, he stands full-front and flat-footed to his opponent, and banks his all on sweeping over his heavy right-hand punch.

Anthony is a new type of Welsh fighter, with something of Carpenter's bloom, and also with a little of an American's love for close-quarter

#### Primitive Man

**BONES 50,000 YEARS OLD FOUND IN SPAIN.**

Several scientists who have been carrying out investigations and excavations in an area near Cordoba, which appears to have been occupied in prehistoric times by a lake, have made discoveries which have been submitted to the Academy of Science of Cordoba. The Academy declares that a skull and several jawbones which have been found in a perfect state of preservation are those of individuals of the race of Neanderthal man, and are among the most ancient relics of primitive man which have ever been found in Europe.

Together with the human remains have been found several utensils of

stones, which seem to belong to the paleolithic period.

Neanderthal man was, according to the general view of scientists, an exceedingly primitive type of human being, who lived in Europe rather more than 50,000 years ago. He succeeded the Eoanthropus who lived 100,000 years ago and whose only relic is a jawbone found in Sussex in 1921, over which controversy still rages. Neanderthal man is so named from Neanderthal, near Dusseldorf, where several skulls belonging to his period have been found.

**Dollar Versus Pound**

"Hitherto London has been the financial centre of the world and that fact has brought wealth to England that cannot be measured in Board of Trade statistics," writes Mr. Harold Cox in the Sunday Times. "There is a certain school of economists in this country who seem to imagine that banking and commerce are matters of no account; that all that tells in our national economy is the production of material goods."

"These economic philosophers, who mostly belong to the Protectionist school, seem to imagine that as long as 'liable things are produced it does not matter whether they are sold or not. The actual manufacturer knows better; he knows that it is useless to produce things unless they can be sold, and he also knows that the business of selling is in some ways more difficult than the business of manufacturing."

"Part of England's success in the world is due to the fact that she has developed a highly skilled commercial organization at the head of which stand the bankers of the City of London. Without the aid of this commercial and banking organization most of the labour of our industrial classes would be wasted."

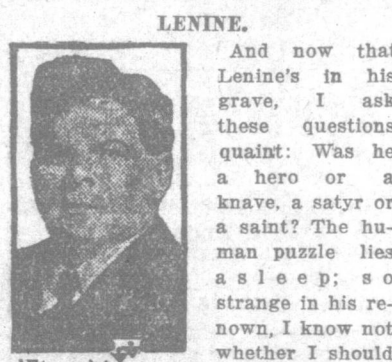
"But the past success of the City of London is very largely due to the fact that for nearly a hundred years this

gold value of the pound sterling was steadily maintained. Now that we have departed from gold, other countries, as Sir Harry Goschen pointed out, are beginning to seek another standard of value.

"For whatever the theorists may say about an ideal currency based upon index figures, or some other device, in practice the world still continues to measure values in gold, and because the English sovereign no longer expresses gold, Continental countries are taking as their measure the value of the American dollar. That is a serious loss, for which we may have to pay heavily if the return of the sovereign to gold parity is long delayed."

**Nfld. Poultry Association**

The March meeting was held in the Board of Trade Building last night. There were reports from twelve members for February month, showing that their birds laid 2,697 eggs. A clipping from the "Australasian" was forwarded by His Excellency the Governor, on the subject of Poultry raising in Australia. The article was read by the Vice President, Dr. Tall Black Orpingtons and Rhode Island Reds and White Leghorns are popular breeds there. Clipping from the New York Press was also read on the subject of the recent "Madison Square Garden Show." Eggs are sel-

ling by the members at one dollar a dozen and the demand is greater than the supply. Mr. Leonard Earle of Altona Poultry Farm, reports great success with the new breed "Black Jersey Giants," the heaviest breed of fowls grown. Two members have already spring chickens hatched. Secretary McCarter read an article on Hollywood Farms of Washington showing that by the process of eliminating the poor layers and selecting eggs from the record trap nested birds. This results increased their average production of the birds wonderfully, and they now have a record of 138 eggs each from 6,100 pullets. The reports from Truro, Nova Scotia, egg laying contest were also

read. Rose Comb Rhode Island Reds are leading, with White Leghorns second. During the meeting Secretary McCarter was presented with a coffee percolator and electric toaster suitably engraved, with an address from the members, as a slight appreciation of services as Secretary for the past two years. Arrangements were made by the White Leghorn breeders to advertise hatching eggs for the 1924 season now at hand. This breed is now the most popular in Newfoundland as proved at the last two years' fall exhibition. There being more of this breed exhibited than any other.

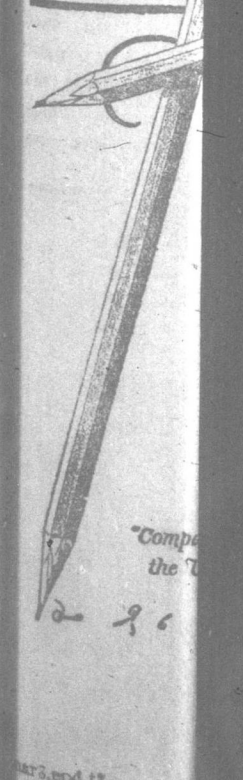

These entries are followed by the note: "N.B.—These four marriages were solemnized by Rev. John Clinch at Bay de Verds on July 31st, 1808."

At the same date in the Baptismal Register, are consecutive entries of twenty-three baptisms, followed by the note:—"N.B.—The preceding twenty-three infants were baptized by Rev. John Clinch at Bay de Verds on July 31st, 1808."

On this occasion Rev. John Clinch must have gone by water direct from Trinity to Bay de Verds, and returned by the same route, as all these entries are immediately preceded and followed by entries of work done at Trinity. On other occasions it is evident that he (and later Rev. W. Bullock) went by water, and returned by land as far as Heart's Content, and then by water to Trinity. I say this is evident, because the entries of baptisms, and marriages indicate his presence at Hart's Harbor, Old Pelican, Sully Cove, Heart's Delight, New Harbor, Dildo, Shoal Harbor, New Pelican, and Heart's Content. This itinerary usually meant about six week's absence from headquarters at Trinity. Then after a month in Trinity Bay, he would be found at Bonavista for a week or two and then home again. So it went on during Parson Clinch's Ministry of thirty-nine years; and of Parson Bullock's for twenty-one years. Eternity only will reveal how much we owe to God, for the unselfish work of such pioneers in preserving and building up the spiritual life of the people in those days; and for the blessings of such work, as have come down to us in our more favored days. We are the better to-day because of their work.

and came to Trinity about the year 1820. In 1828 he was married to Honor Weichman. To them were born six children, viz: John, Honor, Philip, Henry, Sarah Elizabeth, John left Trinity during the Crimean War. He enlisted in the British Army and fought at Sepastopol. It is said that he was the first man to enter the town when it was taken; and that leaping on the carriage of a Russian gun, or on the ramparts, he called for "three cheers for Newfoundland." For this he was reprimanded by the officer in charge, who reminded him that cheers on such an occasion should be for Britain, instead of Newfoundland. It was too late, however, to change it, and by local tradition it stands to the credit of John Hewitt, of Trinity. I have heard that others claim that it was not Hewitt at all, but some other Newfoundland; and I shall be glad to receive any other historic, or traditional information on the subject.

Honor Hewitt married Robert Sexton; Elizabeth married William House; Sarah married Stephen House; Philip was married to Caroline Sexton; and Henry was married to Elizabeth Wells of English Harbor. Joseph Hewitt died in 1856, aged 59 years. Honor Hewitt died in 1863, aged 57 years.

The grandchildren of Robert Hewitt in Trinity to-day, represent the fifth generation from Joseph and Honor Hewitt of a hundred years ago.

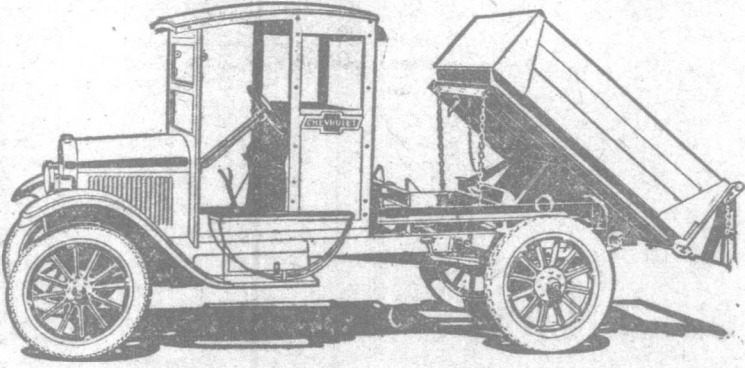

**Obituary.**

**THOMAS CULLERTON.**

Mr. Thomas Cullerton, aged 72 years died at midnight Thursday night at Bar Haven after a brief illness. Mr. Cullerton, who was a native of Pleasant Bay, was actively associated with Catholic and civic affairs at Bar Haven for nearly fifty years, and was dearly beloved by the people of Pleasant Bay irrespective of creed or class. In his business career he was engaged in the Lobster packing industry, and was widely known as an expert on the scientific aspects of codfish conservation. He gave his whole undivided attention to all those interests that were susceptible to the betterment of the laws of the country and his God. Mr. Cullerton was a man of deep foresight and prudence, an ardent Catholic of unaffected piety, and a zealous worker in the cause of religion. He was a gallant man when in command of his boats, and many thrilling tales could be published with illustrations by Father Caecola of the dashing trips they made together in storm and stress with his intrepid crews on calls of mercy, or to the mainland to intercept a special train to attend sick calls on the Eastern Shore. His funeral, which took place from his late residence, was one of the largest ever held in Bar Haven. Solemn High Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul in the beautiful church of St. Francis Xavier, Bar Haven, by the Rev. Francis Caecola, who in fitting words paid a choice testimonial to his many traits of character, zeal and enterprise in the great church. Interment took place in Calvary Cemetery Bar Haven. The pall bearers were: Bernard Murray, Peter Mulrooney, Henry Smith, Edward Hanlon, Patrick Cumble, Patrick Shea, Joseph Coody and John Pendergast.

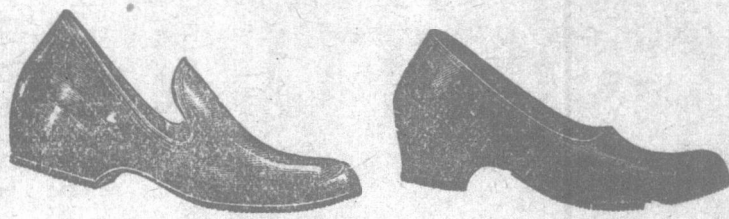

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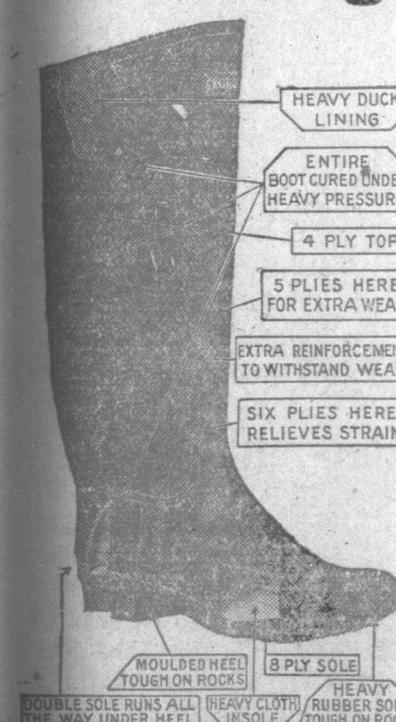
