Dr. Orton's Addrass.

Dr. Orton's address a minds us of the play of Hamlet with the principal character left out. He has made one most important omission, and we refer to it in order that he may supply it in time. He treats us to some vague generalities about the consolidation of the Dominion, and the preservation of our connection with the mother country. He tells us he wants reciprocity with the United States. He denounces the dissolution of Parliament. He Dr. Orton's Add

the United States. He denounces the desolution of Parliament. He promises to keep all "Yankee speculators or politicians from interfering in the management of the aliairs of this country"—a promise for which the country must be exceedingly thankful to the valiant Distor though for the life of us we cannot see what he is driving at. He denounces two or three other things, and then like all good Tories at election times, lays his hand on his heart, and solemnly affirms that he

prefers country to party.

But what about the Pacific Rail. way Scandal? What about the guilt of the late Government in making a corrupt bargain with Sir Hugh Allan, the consideration being that Sir Hugh would furnish the needful cash to carry the elections of 1872? Dr. Orton does not say a word on this subject, which during the past nine months has engaged more attention, and excited more interest, than any public matter which ever came up before the people of Canada. Our readers will no doubt be sur-prised at this singular, this unacprised at this singular, this unaccountable omission, and some will charitably conclude that the Doctor in his hurry has forgotten all about it. No such thing. He does, in his address, refer to the Pacific Railway, but in doing so endeavors to make a point against the Government in connection with their policy in regard to this enterprise. But not a word is said about the sale of the Pacific Railway Charter, about the money Sir Hugh Allan paid to John A. Macdonald and his colleagues, about the money that was sown broadcast over the country in 1872, which was used in corrupting whole constituencies, in the hope of perpetuating the reign of a most corrupt and unprincipled Government. Coward-like Dr. Orton mimbly skips over the whole subject, he evades the momentous issues which it involves, and thinks the free and independent electers of the Centre Riding will be so silly and stupid as to forget all about it also. What confidence can they have in a man who will thus designedly shut his eyes on the great question which has to be decided either for or against the present Government. That question is, whether this Government did or did not do right in exposing the trickery and corruption of their predecessors, in causing their overthrow, and in cleansing the moral and political atmosphere of as foul a job as ever disgraced the character of politicians. Dr. Orton steers clear of all this. But he cannot evade the responsibility. He is the apologist and defender of John A. Macdonald. He wasbrought out on this occasion at his instigation, for his letters were hawked through the village of Fergus, in which all the discontented Tories at Dr. Orton's election in 1872 were entreated to heal their differences, and unite in supporting his nominee. 
