A CIRCUS SENSATION .- The Rochester, N. Y., Democrat, July 5th, has the following account of a thrilling scene in a circus: The immense audience assembled under the canvass of Messrs Thayer & Noyes, Falls' Field, on Thursday evening were treated to a performance which they had not would willingly have foregone. case of neutrality being violated all the treaty Powers may be called upon to take collective action without any one of them alone being bound to intervene,' he thereby asserts nothing less than that the guarantee of one great Power is of greater weight than that of all the great Powers. But the impossibility of Lord Stanley's theory is clear from the impossibility of this con-

clusion being logical. The statement made by Lord Derby upon he same question on the 20th inst., in the House of Lords, is still more extraordinary. According to the noble Lord's opinion, if the neutrality of Luxemburg should ever be assailed by one of the Treaty Powers none of them would be bound to step forward in its

Lord Granville justly asked, in reply to this opinion, why Prussia had then made so atterly worthless a guarantee a sine qua non condition of her participation in the Conference, and why Lord Starley had so long hesitated to undertake an obligation which apparently contained no meaning whatever. Earl Russell also considered that in case of a breach of the treaty the other European

Powers were bound to intervene. Or, are we to understand that it has only been intended to guarantee the neutrality of Luxemburg against such States as Lichtens stein, Greece, or Mexico?

The more impossible the consequences to be deduced the rather do we find ourselves justified in putting the question what can have induced the noble lord to lay down this hitherto unheard of theory, in the correctness of which he himself can hardly believe? 


