The wave theory is the theory of waves of ether that oscillate between given points with tremendous rapidity. Marconi makes use of these oscillations to transmit an electric spark across the seas.

Dr. Carroll took up the subject of oscillations along the nerves and experimented and computed until he found that the rate of oscillations along a nerve is 300,000 per second, approximately. Marconi has found that wireless telegraphing requires 800,000 oscillations per second.

"After I had computed the number of waves oscillating per second." said Dr. Carroll, "it became necessary to obtain an electric oscillator having the same wave capacity as the nerves. I remembered that Tesla, in 1894, read a paper before an English scientific society describing a machine he had made capable of producing a million oscillations per second.

"I went to Mr. Tesla and asked him to build me an electric oscillator capable



AMERICAN MONO-RAIL. Baltimore Follows Liverpool in Experiment With New High-Speed

An experimental line about half a mile long, at Baltimore, is to be built to run cars on a mono-rail system invented by Howard H. Tunis. A passenger car for this line is being built and the track is to be constructed as soon as the weather will permit. Experiments will be conducted in the spring and summer.

The system, as its name indicates, requires only one rail. The wheels of the car are in the middle, with much of the weight arranged lower than the wheels to give it stable equilibrium. On the top of the car is to be a double rail, which will engage sheaves or rollers suspended from poles on each side of the track, so that the car cannot upset. Alexander L. Seth said today that the object of the invention is to secure high speed and cheapness of construction as well as safety. The car is to be operated by a gasoline motor. Electricity can be used.

Phaeton's Cruise Unsuccessful

Steamed Through Stormy Seas Between Honolulu and Victoria.

Italian Bark Cavour's Narrow Escapes From Destruction off the Coast.

H. M. S. Phaeton returned yesterday afternoon from her cruise to Honolulu in search of the missing Condor, which is now believed to have foundered of the mouth of the Straits in that terrible storm of December 3. Nothing whatthe mouth of the Straits in that terrible storm of December 3. Nothing whatever was seen or reported to give any clue to the fate of the lost warship, although the cruiser kept her search light playing over the waters at night as she cruised in a zig-zag direction on both her down and upbound trips. She left Honolulu on February 24, and had a rough passage, the weather being stormy throughout. The Phaeton rolled considerably and on several occasions in the seas came on board and flooded her decks. No damage was occasioned, however. With the return of the Phaeton the Condor is officially posted as "missing"—the shipping term which indicates an unknown fate.

During her voyage the Phaeton cruised around Neckar is and, a small uninhabited pile of rocks which lies to the northeast of the Sandwich islands, to examine that coast as at one time a ship's crew were found on that island. None of the islands of the Pacific to the south of Honolulu were visited, but a close lookout was kept over the surface of the waters. Two lookouts were kept posted continually by day and the search light was kept on the face of the waters at night, to watch for any floating wreckage, but nothing whatever was sighted.
