THE MACWHERRELL CASE.

The judge and jury men who heard the whole evidence in the case were satisfied beyond a doubt of MacWherrell's guilt. The only point about the engineer's project that needs confirmation is his method of bringing the water to the city. Quality is uneven, the best yielding sections have the finest quality, while the short sections complain of small crops of inferior quality. The Canadian crop is also short. Prices have opened at a high rate, and it is expected to continue at a high rate to hold for still higher values.

Found Dead With a Broken Neck.

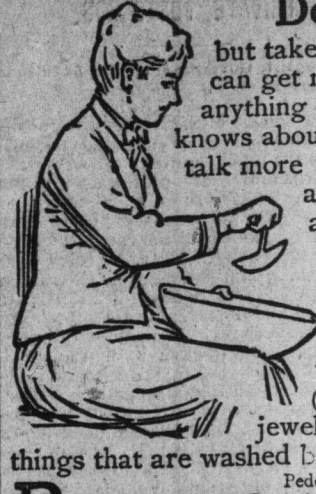

The building is more like a palace than a plain office building. From either front it presents an appearance at once striking and attractive. With the grounds decorated with flowers, it looks like an Italian villa.

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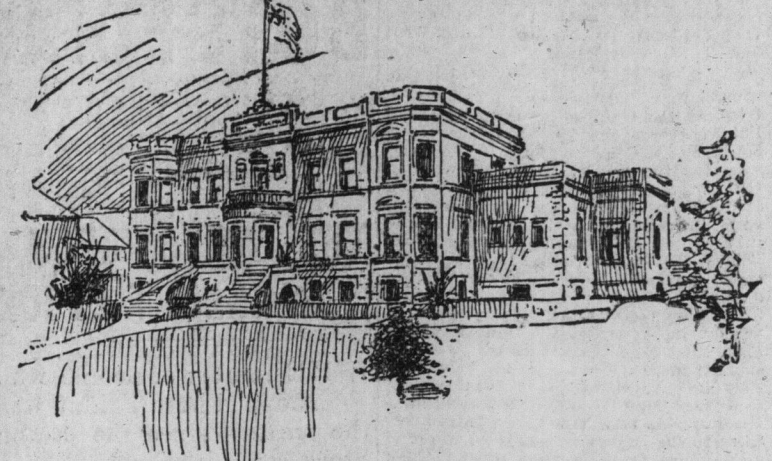
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HIRAM WALKER & SONS' NEW OFFICE BUILDING



designs of the building are in artistic keeping with those of old and recognized models. Leading to the inner vestibule are steps of polished Numidian marble. Lightening the vestibule is a bronze lamp, the original of which, in the Borghese Palace at Rome, bears the date of 1648.

Divided from the outer vestibule by doors of polished oak is the inner vestibule. The fittings of the doors are all in dull bronze, and hundreds of bronze roses stud the framework. Around the walls is the gleaming surface of the finest linings, shining like rare old porcelain. The ceiling is modelled in stucco to conform with the general style. The floor is of ceramic mosaic. At the sides of the door is a wainscoting of polished oak eight feet high. From the flooring spring rounded columns of polished Numidian marble supported by capitals in stucco of Renaissance style.

On the left or east side of the main entrance are the offices of the corporations controlled by the Walkers other than the distillery. The fittings of these correspond with those of the distillery offices.

On the second floor is a kitchen, dining room, gymnasium, barber shop and toilet rooms, and the board room, where the directors of the Walker corporations meet, and on its massive oak table were displayed some of the many cups and costly prizes with which the firm has ever been so ready to encourage the cause of honest sport.

The lighting of the main offices in daytime is accomplished by a magnificent skylight. Handsome electric lights light the lobbies and corridors, and at every desk there is an incandescent lamp. The heating and ventilation is on the fan system, the cool or warm according to the season, being distributed throughout every room. The telephone system is the most complete, each private office being connected with the entire staff under the control of its occupant as well as with the central exchange.

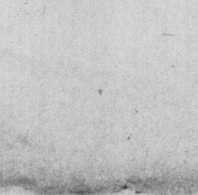

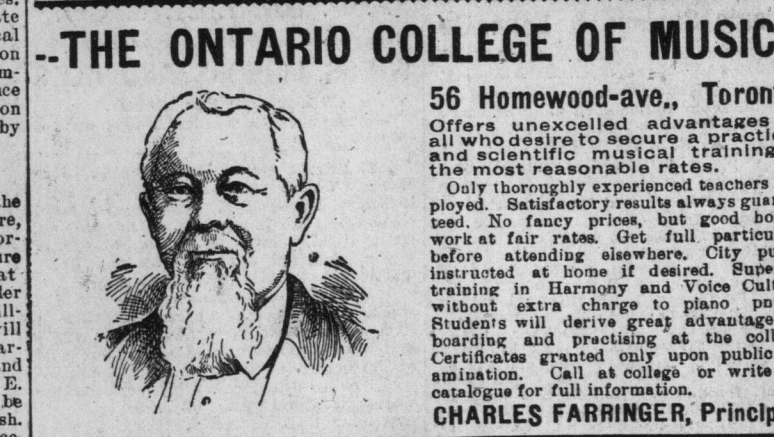
