Their acceptances have not been received, and the third place on the High Commission will not be filled until Mr. Phelps and Mr. Lincoln accept.

G.T.R. Coal Experiments

The tests to obtain a suitable coal for the engines of the G.T.R. service, which have been conducted with coal brought from 20 mines, for more than a month, between the stations of Little York and Belleville, are now finished. 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

Wholesale trade at Toronto the past week has been quiet. 
