In the maple syrup competition for the prize given by the Grimm Co., there were 1200 entries. Two hundred of these were selected. Of the 200 competitors the exhibit of Mr. D. A. Graham, of Wanstead, took twenty-second place. Pretty good showing.

ON account of the end of the year of the Merchants Bank of Canada being changed from November to April the interest dates will now be the end of April and October. Depositors may now present their pass books and have interest for five months added.

THE first ball game of the season will be played at the Driving Park this (Thursday) evening between the Warwick nine and our local team. This promise to be an exciting and interesting game so come out and enjoy an evening's fun.

IT has been suggested that the town should place a large clock to be placed in the tower of the new post-office. The corporation is ahead of the price of the site since the government purchased the property, and if a few hundred dollars were expended in that way the clock would not only be a great benefit to the community but an ornament to the building and prove a good investment. Probably the Council will bring the matter up for discussion at an early meeting.

COMPLAINTS are to hand about poultry running at large in town, destroying flower and vegetable beds. Standing By-law No. 21 of the Village prohibits poultry from running at large and because it is not enforced is no reason why otherways law-abiding citizens should openly violate it. If you own chickens just imagine yourself for a few moments in the place of the person who is endeavouring to make a garden, and no doubt your good sense will tell you that you are not doing unto others as you would have others do unto you. "Live not unto thyself alone."

THE new license law came into force on Monday. Under this latest bill, hotels cannot open before 8 o'clock in the morning, and all liquor sold over the bar must be consumed on the premises. Under another section of the act the opponents of local option are given the right to compel the municipal councils to submit a by-law for the repeal of local option on petition of 25 per cent. of the electors on the voters' list. This makes the law which formerly applied to petitions for local option apply also against it.

CIRCULARS have been issued by the Department of Education to all teachers in the Province, containing material and suggestions for the observance of Empire Day in the schools this year. May 23rd is set apart by the Department as Empire Day, the forenoon being devoted to a study of the Empire, its extent and resources, such as addresses and patriotic celebrations. Ten thousand copies of circular are being distributed, which is made up in pamphlet form, and touches Imperial events during the past year. Interesting chapters have been prepared upon Nigeria, the Imperial flag, the Livingstone centenary and the death of Captain Scott in the Antarctic.

THE Ajax Chemical Fire Engine, which Defiance Fire Co. and the Council are considering buying, has arrived and a test was made with it at the Wire Works on Tuesday afternoon. A large pile of light and inflammable material, consisting of varnish boxes, etc., was lighted and

when the fire had gained good headway the engine was put into play and extinguished the blaze in a very short time. Before the engine is purchased a public test will be made so that all interested may have an opportunity of judging of its efficiency. The engine has a tank of 50 gallon capacity and will throw a stream 80 feet horizontally and 60 feet vertically, weighs 650 lbs and is easily moved by one person. There are 50 feet of ½ inch chemical fire hose attached, and the machine is built to pass through narrow doors or aisles. The engine is easily put in operation. All that is necessary is to turn the tank and open the nozzle attached to the hose. Chemical charges can be purchased at any drug store at \$1.00 for each charge, and one charge is said to be equal to several thousand gallons of water. If the public test proves satisfactory, as no doubt it will, the machine will be a valuable addition to the fire-fighting apparatus of the town.

Miss Agnes Kingston

It was with inexpressible sorrow and surprise that the many friends of the late Miss Agnes Rachael Kingston, 1200 line, Warwick, received news of her death. She had been ailing for some time, and had never completely recovered from an attack of la grippe which she contracted in the winter, but no one thought that her sickness would terminate in such a serious manner. On the 2nd of May, however, she turned rapidly worse, and after lapsing into unconsciousness she passed peacefully away in the early hours of Saturday morning, May 8th. Miss Kingston will be keenly missed, not only in her home and home town of Watford, but all over the province, for her friends were many and widely scattered. Few women were more worthy of real appreciation than Miss Kingston. Her gifts and abilities were of an eminent kind, and were best known to those who were most intimate with her. Her innate and natural love for literature in all its various departments won for her the acquaintance and esteem of not a few whose influence is by no means common in the world of letters. She always took a keen interest in the political and social progress of the country, and was ever ready to assist any cause which she considered right and true, and conducive to the moral and spiritual welfare of humanity. For many years she was an ardent worker in the Presbyterian church of Watford, of which she was a member. Her profession of religion was not unduly demonstrative, but it was solid and genuine, and followed her through life. Her love and reverence for Him who is the great Head of the Church. The temperance cause had a strong advocate in Miss Kingston, and it was no fault of hers that the bar is still open. Her sympathies were ever with the pure and good, but she was the sworn foe to all social evils, both hidden and exposed. Although she has gone home to her reward, her works will follow her. The legacy she has left behind will be recognised by many; it is duplex in form—"Cleave to the good, eschew the evil." All who knew Miss Kingston will hold her in grateful remembrance, and the sympathy of the whole community is extended to the sorrowing brothers and sister at home who mourn her loss. The funeral took place on Monday, May 5th, at 3 p. m., from Miss Kingston's home, 4th line, Warwick, where she was born. The remains were interred in the old Presbyterian cemetery at Watford, the service being conducted by Rev. J. C. Forster, who was assisted by Rev. R. Stevenson. The pall-bearers were William Kingston, John Kingston, Peter Kingston, Fred Kingston, Frank McCordie and William A. Smith.

Herman House, formerly of Warwick, but now of Melbourne, Australia, is the inventor and patentee of a device that will likely be a great benefit to users of automobiles. It is called the "Glide Spring." This spring can be placed on any make of car and insures smoothness of running, and increases the life of the pneumatic tyre, engine and all running parts of the car. The invention consists of pivoting specially formed springs in such a manner as to cause great resilience with extreme rapidity of action, thus keeping the wheel down to its work and reducing the recoil to a minimum. A stock company has been formed to manufacture the Spring in Australia with a capitalization of £150,000. The invention has been patented in 27 countries. Those who were acquainted with Mr. House when he lived here will be glad to hear that he has disposed of his invention at a big figure.

Farming For Furs

The Canadian Conservation Commission, being of opinion that something should be done to stem the upward trend of the price of furs in the Dominion, recently requested Mr. Walter Jones, an expert of the commission, to investigate the possibilities of breeding fur-bearing animals, in captivity, on the lines of the black fox industry in the Maritime Provinces.

According to information made public in Ottawa the report demonstrates that the supply of valuable Canadian fur-bearing animals has diminished with alarming rapidity, especially during the past ten or fifteen years. The decrease is ascribed to the increasing outdoor habits of the people, and to the tremendous demand for fur and leather resultant upon the growth of automobile traffic. It is calculated that upon an average the price of furs has increased over 200 per cent. during the past decade.

The legislature of New Brunswick has unanimously passed an act for the better protection of children, drawn up on similar lines to the legislation of Ontario. This means that the same method of caring for neglected and dependent children now prevails in all the provinces in Canada.

Less than twenty years ago, says the New York Journal of Commerce, the annual cost of Germany's army was barely \$94,000,000, while the sum now demanded reaches \$262,500,000. Add to this an appropriation for the navy, which has risen from \$50,000,000 in 1900 to more than twice that amount to-day, and the burden of armed peace on the industry and commerce of Germany will be found to have approached a distinctly dangerous limit.

Canned tomatoes will probably be much cheaper this season. Last year the Canners' Association seems to have over-estimated the price at which the public would use these goods, with the results that sales have been much smaller than is usually the case. Both wholesale and retail grocers find big stocks now on hand, and are adverse to the canners selling plan of ordering before May 1st for fall delivery, not knowing what price will be fixed.

To have a home of our own and to live distinctly and honestly within our means is essential to all married life. How many couples now in mature life and surrounded by luxury and wealth, look back to the days of early privations as among the happiest days of their life. No sensible person will deem it a hardship to begin on a moderate scale. And when we have ascended to the top steps of prosperity, we may look back on the days of small things as the golden days of our hearts if not our purses.

Dr. E. E. Kennedy has introduced a bill in the Ontario Legislature which provides heavy fines and imprisonment for doctor's errors. Surgeons operating for appendicitis must show the appendix after the operation, and if the organ is sound the surgeon will be liable to a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$10,000, or imprisonment for not less than one year and not more than ten years, or both. Friends of the measure say that fully 60 per cent. of the operations for appendicitis are unnecessary.

Possibilities of the Aeroplane

A thousand miles a day, between sunrise and sunset, is the new aeroplane record. Six months ago it was but five hundred and fifty miles in a day. Two years ago it was but a hundred and fifty miles. This increase of distance has been achieved partly by increase of speed, but mostly by increase of reliability and endurance in the gasoline engine. It is no mean task to put one of these little engines to develop a hundred horsepower for twelve or fourteen hours in an almost consecutive run. They are extremely light and made to develop the very large power by the rapidity with which their little pistons work. Fourteen whirling cylinders of a Gnome engine, making a thousand revolutions per minute, give twenty eight thousand piston strokes per minute, and result in seven thousand explosions of gasoline per minute. This is a rate of explosion so fast as to lose the identity of separate blasts in a continuous musical note of about the pitch of the beginning of the second octave on the organ. It is a marvellous performance and may some day be as implicitly relied on as is the organ to produce a note when the key is pressed. That day has not yet come, and the aviator who relies on one of these machines to sustain him in the air for a whole day runs a considerable risk and excites wonder by success. At the same rate of flight, could it be done without stops, twenty-four hours would have taken this aeronaut across the Atlantic from Ireland to Newfoundland, seventeen hundred and fifty miles. Not more than five years ago the marine gasoline engine was unreliable. To-day it is as reliable as a steam engine. Perhaps the next five years will do the same for the aeronautic engine.

Distribution of Pure Bred Male Animals by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa

Realizing that inability to secure the use of well-bred male animals is at the present time one of the greatest difficulties standing in the way of live stock development in many parts of Canada, particularly in the newly settled districts, the Dominion Department of Agriculture, through the Live Stock Branch, is this year undertaking a wide-spread distribution of pure bred stallions, bulls, rams and boars. The original cost of the animals will be borne by the Department and they will be placed in the hands of such local organizations as agree to the conditions governing the distribution. In a word these sires will remain the property of the Department, but the local associations will be responsible for their proper maintenance and management under the general supervision of the Live Stock Branch. In the case of stallions, the members of the associations will also be required to pay a fee covering an annual insurance premium.

All animals distributed will be bought from home breeder and will be Canadian bred. As far as possible, they will be purchased in the province in which they are to be placed. In this way Canadian breeders will receive encouragement at their market will be increased not only directly but also indirectly through the emphasis given throughout the country to the value of pure bred sires. It may be added that it is not the intention to place the animals in districts where suitable male animals of the same class are already owned by private individuals. The aim is rather to aid sections where pure bred sires are lacking and as well to encourage new communities in following a proper and intelligent system in breeding.

All bulls distributed will be purchased subject to the tuberculin test and only stallions which have passed a rigid veterinary inspection for soundness will be selected.

In order to take advantage of this form of assistance, it will be necessary for interested parties, in any section, to undertake the organization of a local association in whose hands such sires as are required may be placed. Complete information regarding the rules and regulations governing the distribution may be made upon application to the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa. Whenever possible, an Officer of the Branch will render assistance in the perfecting of the necessary local organization.

NOTE AND COMMENT.

The Powers are taking a long time to square up the Balkan trouble. By the time the Allies have had their whack, it'll be a case of: "There ain't goin' to be no core."

The King's Printer has made an increase of 25% in the prices allowed to printers for work done outside the government printing bureau. This is simply the government's official recognition of the fact that the cost of production in the printing business has increased greatly in the last few years.

Give the children work as well as play. An idle person is neither a benefit nor an ornament. Let the children learn music. It is a great charm in a family, and that in connection with books and instructive games, will make better children and make them like to stay at home.

Starting with the 1st May, all Canadian mails are now transferred to and from the old land in Canadian steamers. This service costs in subsidies \$1,000,000, an increase of only \$170,000 over the old contract, under which the Dominion has been paying Uncle Sam \$180,000 a year for handling mail at New York.

It looks very much as if the days for the sale of debentures bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum is a thing of the past, as many municipalities which have issued debentures bearing that rate of interest are finding no buyers. Brokers will not touch any debentures that call for less than 6 or 6 1/2 per cent.

John D. Rockefeller is now in his seventy-fourth year and enjoys good health. Yet twenty years ago he could eat nothing but milk and crackers, and was apparently dying of slow starvation. The doctors told him he ate too fast and had disregarded the laws of health and exercise. Then John D. quit business entirely, although he said the first three months cost him \$5,000,000, and started to take exercise and to eat slowly. And now, twenty years later, he is practically a well man. Exercise, slow mastication, fresh air, freedom from worry, are the greatest medicines on earth.

If a man really loves a woman, which some people doubt, it is a woman who never abuses him. Every woman seems to imagine that she is a sort of a missionary, and that as soon as she has "influence" over a man, she must reform him; that is, make him different from what a man ever will be. No woman ever admitted that a man had a right to be natural. So she begins her reform work, and in a little while she has lost her influence. A man hates nagging and fault-finding; he hates a woman who pretends to love him one minute and then abuses him the next. The only thing positively known about angelic men, is, that there are none.

Legislation providing for publicity, both before and after voting, as to the source from which campaign funds are received, and the manner in which they are spent, would be a revelation of the facts, tend to check the existing evil. Prohibition of contributions by contractors and others selfishly interested would be a further help. Limitation by law, as in England, of the amount which any one candidate may spend, would also be a good thing. But the chief need of all is the creation of a public sentiment which will lead the rank and file of our citizenship to insist on exemplary punishment in every case where either individuals or Governments seek to substitute the Power of the Purse for the Power of the Ballot.

Unity in the Home

The happiest place on earth should be the home. A place of rest and refuge, of peace and pleasure, of love and joy. A home is all this where the family is united, having the same purpose and working for the same end. There is not only strength in unity, but blessings unnumbered. Family unity is the basis of family prosperity, national unity is the basis of national prosperity. It is unity that makes the happiness of

a home. One discontented disloyal member can spoil the peace of a household and make a place of torment where paradise should be.

There are many sins we can and must forgive, but disloyalty to father or mother, sister or brother, is the act of a traitor and should be despised as such. If those who belong to us have faults, let us hide them in our hearts that the world will not find them out. If misfortune comes to the one member of the family let all share it and help the unfortunate one to keep a proud face to the world. Let us be true to our own. Loyalty in friendship has been the theme of poets, but loyalty to the home and household is the fairest of virtues and covers a multitude of faults and follies.



Cut in Express Rates

The Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners have just issued a sweeping reduction in express charges which will benefit all shippers of goods to any point west of Ontario in Canada. While the cuts in individual charges do not exceed, in the main, more than 3, 10 or 15 cents, it is estimated that the Dominion Express Company will be \$250,000 poorer, with the other companies suffering a like ratio. This, of course, applies to parcels carried under the table of graduated charges. Traffic carried at what is known as "pound rates," or at so much per hundred pounds, will be 30 per cent. lower, e. g., formerly \$1 now 80 cents. The reduction, which is ordered to go into effect on July 15, will mean to the Dominion Express Company just 35.36 per cent. of its net revenue, or approximately 20 per cent. of its gross revenue, and a corresponding amount as far as the other companies are concerned.

The New Marriage Law

On Thursday, May 15, the provisions of the recent amendments to the marriage law came into force. Now it will not be possible for parties who are desirous of entering into the blissful state to procure a license without one of the pair having resided in the district for at least fifteen days prior to the date of the issue. This provision can be overcome if a notice of the application for license is advertised in a local paper once a week for three weeks preceding the application, and, failing that, the Registrar-General may waive these provisions if the circumstances warrant such procedure. Under the new law parties coming from distant parts and meeting at any specified place, say Toronto, may secure the issuance of a license upon application to the department if the facts are properly established. But the amendments will seriously affect the business of marrying persons at border towns, as, unless good cause is shown, runaway couples will have difficulty in getting the necessary license that will comply with all the provisions of the law of Ontario.

Co-Operative Egg Circles

An important part of the poultry work of the Live Stock Branch of the Department of Agriculture, during the past year has been the organization of Co-operative Egg Circles. Ten circles in all have been organized under the auspices of the Branch, working in conjunction with the provincial and agricultural college authorities and the Poultry Producers' Association of Canada. The preliminary work in connection with a number of others has been done, and from present indications it is apparent that this phase of co-operative work is likely to have a rapid growth in the near future.

Being primarily concerned with the improvement of the Canadian Egg Trade the Live Stock Branch has encouraged the formation of these circles because the movement affords a means whereby the quality of eggs can be improved as they leave the farm, and the pernicious practice of holding eggs both on the farm and in the country store largely eliminated. Co-operative effort of this kind also affords a medium whereby the eggs in any given community may be collected and marketed frequently and regularly, and insures to the consumer a new-laid egg of uniform quality at no great increase in cost.

At the time of joining the association the members agree to stamp each egg with a given number designated by the Board of Directors. This is done so that the eggs of each member may be identified when graded and payment made according to quality.

A manager is appointed by the Board of Directors, whose business it is to collect, grade, sell the eggs and apportion the returns among the members according to the quantity and quality received. In most circles the eggs from each farm are collected at stated intervals, but in others the members deliver the eggs to some central point such as creamery, cheese factory, store or house, from which the manager makes the shipment.

It is well known that at certain seasons of the year there is a wide difference between the price received for eggs by the farmer in the country store and the price paid by the consumer in the city. This difference is not nearly so marked in the spring of the year as it is in the late summer, fall and winter. In other words, as the quality of ordinary farm eggs becomes more uncertain, the premium placed on new-laid circle eggs increases. While during the spring of the year prices received by circle members may not greatly exceed those paid in the local store, it is a fact that for the eggs produced in the month of December last year the majority of circles in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec received a price of from 45 to 50 cents a dozen.

A limited number of circles will no doubt be able to take advantage of the rapidly growing select trade in the larger Canadian cities, but from the fact that the wholesale egg dealers in Ontario and Quebec have recently adopted a new system of buying on a basis of quality, it is likely that the product of the majority of circles will find its way to the consumer through the more recently established channels of trade.

The Live Stock Branch stands ready and willing to help on the Egg Circle movement in every possible way. Officers of this Branch are now in the field, and there is available a quantity of literature, including outlines of constitutions by-law, etc., dealing with the work, copies of which may be obtained upon request from the Live Stock Commissioner, Ottawa.
