HOW TO SEE TRICHINA IN RAW PORK.—We have often, in these pages suggested that the microscope, as its name implies, is for the observation of little things. A few evenings since, an amateur brought a piece of trichinous pork which he had placed on a glass slip and covered. He had placed a comparatively small piece on the slide. The trichine were visible but were dim and hazy. Upon lifting the cover, and picking out a piece of a single muscular fibre, removing the rest of the meat; coving the particle of single fibre, and pressing it out thin with the finger on the cover, the trichine in their cysts were plainly, clearly, and beautifully visible. Examined with a quarter-inch objective they were still plain, and all the details of the parasite could be plainly and satisfactorily observed.—*The Microscope.*

A correspondent says: "I have been bitten by dogs repeatedly, once severely. A pet dog of a neighbor's was very sick, and I was attempting to relieve it. It bit me in the left thumb, just below the nail. That member became black as far down as the wrist. It remained so until the nail came off. The owner talked hydrophobia, and said that the dog had not tasted water for two weeks. Had I been afraid I should no doubt have taken nervous fits and died. The verdict would have been hydrophobia. But I simply applied a solution of salt and vinegar—a little more vinegar than salt—washed the wound

with it, tied a clean rag around the thumb, keeping it saturated well with the solution, and moved the rag so that a fresh part covered the wound at intervals. This remedy was once applied to my wrist by a colored woman for a snake bite. My arm was then black, hard, and painful. The remedy acted like a charm. In two hours the discoloration had disappeared, and with it the pain, and only the needle mark where the fang had entered was visible."—*Fam. Doct.*

SOAP DUST FOR HAY FEVER.

A young woman before her marriage was for over a year under homeopathic treatment for hay fever in Portland, Oregon, with indifferent results. She then married a photographer and helped him burnish photographs once a week. A part of this work consists in rubbing with a dry cloth first a piece of dry castile soap and then the photograph, whereby considerable soap dust is inhaled. Since thus employed she has been free from rose colds.

She told another lady of her cure, who also had suffered from severe yearly hay fever and this one has likewise been free from it since inhaling soap dust. Whenever the symptoms of the rose-cold appear, she rubs a piece of dry castile soap with a dry cloth, inhaling the dust, and this stops the disease at once. A previous homeopathic treatment and use of Farradic current had also been unsatisfactory in her case.

We are personally acquainted with both ladies and can vouch for the correctness of both their statements.

ULCER OF THE LEG.—Dr. Chanfard treats chronic ulcers of the legs by covering them thickly with powdered sugar, retaining it in position by means of a proper dressing. The application is first made every day, then every other day, and later at longer periods, until the ulcer is healed.—*Mod. Med.*

A SIMPLE METHOD OF GETTING A BRASS RING OFF A SWOLLEN FINGER.—Some time ago a child was brought to me with a brass ring on her middle finger. Her parents tried in vain to get it off. The ring was one of those flanged ones that are found on cheap tool handles. The flanged portion was toward the hand, and the finger was much swollen, the flange being embedded in it. I was about to get instruments to attempt cutting the ring off, when my eye caught sight of one of those small endless elastic bands made of India rubber. I put it on the finger, ring fashion, and after twisting it several times so that it would constrict the finger, and pushed it over the soaped finger under the ring and next to the flange. The elastic constriction quickly reduced the edema, and the ring was easily removed, it following after the elastic, the sharp flange not even scraping the finger. This way out of a similar ring difficulty is well worth remembering.—*Charlotte Medical Journal.*

ODDS AND ENDS.

A frog hung head downward in a child's mouth till it dies is still used as a remedy for thrush in Shropshire, England. One man boasted that his little son "wore out" four frogs before he himself died of convulsions.—*The Daily Lancet.*

Dr. John Hunter, the famous surgeon, a truly great and original investigator, said that "Surgery is an acknowledgment of the imperfections of the art of healing," and he compared it "to the acts of a savage, which attempt to get that by force, which the civilized man would get by stratagem."

It is said that the acidulous fruit of *Rhus Glabrum* (growing plentifully around Chicago) will cause one to dream of flying through the air, the effect lasting several weeks.

Vegetables that grow above the ground are said to be better for torpid livers and constipation, than those which grow under the ground.

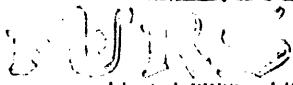
