## ORIGIN AND CAREER OF NATIONAL CLUB.

The National Cluh was orisinally orsaniocd and the chab-house erected to sive the " Canada först" part! a "local hahitation," and it has eser since comtinted a centre for the spreat of Canadian national sentiment, which was the main idea of its founders. The results-so important and far-reachings. should be kept before the membership, and with this object in view, we give a brief outline of the chats origin and history.

Shortly after the confederation of the Canadian Provinces a few of our young men, realizing the great importance of a spirit of national unity, determined to derote themselven to the canse of fostering this sentiment as far as lat in their power, apart from all political bearings on personal opinions. Prominent amoner them may be named Henry James Norgan, Charles Mair, Robert Grant-Habburton, (ieorge Taylor Denison, and WVilliam . Nexamder Foster. Dr. John schult\%, afterwards lieutenant-Governor of

Manitoba, joined them and did yeoman service in the callie. Gradually their ranks grew and as the new party began to feel its strength their non-political creed of patriotism rapidly increased in favor with the people.

The platform adopted by the Canada First party was as follows:

1. British connection, consolidation of the Empire, and in the meantime a voice in treaties affecting Canada.
2. Closer trade relations with the British West India Islands, with a view to ultimate political connection.
3. Income franchise.
4. The ballot, with the addition of compulsory voting.
5. A scheme for the representation of minorties.
6. Encouragement of immigration and free homesteads in the public domain.
7. The imposition of duties for revenue, so adjusted as to afford every possible encouragemont to native industry.
8. An improved militia system under comwand of trained Dominion officers.
9. No property qualifications for members of the House of Commons.
so. The re-orsamization of the senate.
1I. Pure and economic administration of publie affairs.

The future greatness of C Canad was fore hd, not as an argument for a declaration of indpendence, but as an additional motive for continning British connection. Among the ranks were a few who held that the time would soon arrive (if it had not already arrived) when Canada could stand alone and abandon the protexting aegis of Great Britain, that she could fight her own battles, make hor own treaties, and have her own diplomatic relations with other powers. While these visions were hatpoured and encouraged by only a few, it to a certain extent militated against the inflame that the Canada First party was beginning to wield. The majority, however, frowned upon such revolutionary doctrines, and cherished only the hope of making Canada the greatest and most prosperous unit in the British Empire.

In 1874 the Canada First party look a more concrete form by the creation in that year of
"The National Association." The charter for the National Club was issued on the 6th of July, 1874, and the Club was opened as the headquarters of the party by a dinner which took place on the goth of March, 1875. The late Chief Justice Moss was then in the field as Parliamentary Candidate for West Toronto and his candidature was endorsed by the Canada First party, which looked to him as an upholder of the principles for which it was striving. Mr. Moss was elected and the strength of the new factor in the political arena became appalrent. Among those to whose exertions the formation of the Association and the Club were due. were the late Mr. W. H. Howland and the late Mr. W. A. Foster, previously mentioned as one of those who started the movement in 1868. Mr. Foster whose death occurred in 1888 , wats a man of exceptional ability ; as a writer he wielded great power, and his energy was indomitable. He was foremost of a number of Canada First men who brought out the "Nation," an independent weekly journal, which treated all questions on the broad lines of national patriotism and which had a very:
sucessful catree for two geats, until dircumstances compelled its withdrawal. It was: most atetively identified with all the movements of the party which so largely owed its exist she to him, although his modesty catused hin 10 remain in the background.

It was hut a few rears after the institution of the Club that the two erreat political parties of the time in a larse meatsure adopted the platform of the Canada first party. Owing to this, the Assoc iation gradnally disappeared from public view. It had done a good work however. It had greaty sirengthened a sentiment of unity amongst the Provinces, and of cohesion amongst the people. It had presented more clearly than had yet appeared, a popular Comar dian ideal, and it thas helped to lay the foundation of the dominant principle in the Dominion at the end of the century-..." Camada First, aithin the Empire." In the second place, the movement left behind it the National Club, which has proved a potent factor in the social life and independent thought of the Provincial Capital. The chief planks of the platform on which the National Association was built, viz: "Imperial

Unity," " the Consolidation of the Empire," and "closer trade relations" remained as the watchwords of the National Club, and it gradually became the centre of the Imperial Federation movement in the Dominion.

The first Directorate of the National Club consisted of twenty-eight members, one-half of whom represented the stock-holders who originally furnished the Club (taking a mortgrage on the building for the amount of $\$ 5,500$ payable in twenty years without interest), and the other half represented the regular membership of the Club. The first officers were :

During the first year of the Presidency of the Hon. Adam Crooks the Club was found to be embarrassed financially, and the stockholders who furnished the Club generously presented the Club with the mortgage for $\$ 5,500$ on the building. The financial basis of the Club was unsatisfactory, involving as it did personal liability of members, which led to a special Act
being obtained from the Ontario Legislature reincorporating the Club under which a reorganization took place. This Act is still the Charter of the Club.

During the Presidency of Lt.-Col. Denison financial embarrassment again occurred, but by the energetic efforts of a few of the members, it was again restored to a satisfactory basis.

In 1892 it was felt that the club premises were behind the requirements of the times, and this fact combined with the increase in the number of Clubs in Toronto, rendered great improvements necessary to enable the National Club to maintain a place in keeping with its traditions. In the year 1893 an arrangement was adopted by a very large meeting of the members for the purchase at $\$_{17}, 500$ of the leasehold building. and premises formerly the home of the United Empire Club on King Street West, and then occupiec by the Canadian Pacific Railway for offices. The Club paid $\$ 2,000$ on account of this purchase money. Plans were prepared for alterations and improvements to the building involving an expenditure of $\$ 30,000$, and a sum over \$9,000 was actually subscribed by members
towards consumating the scheme. Delays occurred throwing the matter over till i89t, when the financial depression which had become widespread by that time so affected the Club that it was tound impossible to raise the funds required. These circumstances and others acted very prejudicially to the Club membership, and it was felt in 1895 that some radical means had to be adopted to keep the Club in existence. The United Empire Building purchase was happily got rid of by giving up the deposit of $\$ 2,000$ which had been paid and which procured the Club's release from liability: In i 895 , upon the iniative of President Frank Arnoldi, Q.C.., a scheme was adopted by the members for carrying out enlargements and alterations of the existing club premises in conjunction with the landlord involving an expenditure of $\$ 13,000001$ the part of the landlord and about the satme amount for furnishings and decorating by the Club. This scheme was carried out between April and November, i 896 . During the alterations the Club occupied, as temporary premises the buildings Nos. $9+$ and 96 Bay Street to the south of the Club House.

In November, 890 , the Club returned tot the enlarged and commodious quarters prepared for it and entered upon an area of prosperity unparalleled in its history.

It would be impossible in a brief sketch to detail the influence that the National Club hats exerted upon the nation. Bier since its orannization numerous social and patriotic meetings have been held, disseminating the opinions of our members and laying broad and deep those cherished principles which today are so highly valued by the canadian people at large and which so deeply concern the welfare of the Dominion and the Empire.

## CHAPTER 66.

An Act respecting the National Club.

> [Assented to "th March, 187s.]

Whereas in conformity with the provisions of I'ramble. an Act passed by the Parliament of the Province of Ontario, in the thirty-seventh year of the reign of Her Majesty and chaptered thirty-four, the declaration therein mentioned was duly made, endorsed and filed, it being intended thereby to incorporate the persons who signed such declaration, their associates and successors as a body corporate and politic under the name of "The National Club;" and whereas the said club thereupon went into operation, and in further conformity with said Act, made by-laws, rules and regulations for the government and conduct of the affairs of the club ; and whereas doubts have risen as to the extent of the liability of members of the said club under the said Act, and the hereafter mentioned persons have prayed to have the club reorganized, and the future liability of members of the reorganization fixed, without prejudice to any existing liability of present members of the said club to creditors or otherwise ; and whereas it is expedient to grant their prayer :-

Therefore Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows :-

Wond, Thomas Walmsley, Frederick Wyld, and such other persons as may hereafter become members of the corporation hereby constituted shall le, and are hereby declared to be a budy politic and corporate in deed and in name, and by the name of "The National Club ;" and shall by the same name from time to time, and at all timps hereafter be able and capable to purchace, acquire, hold, possess, and enjoy, anr? to have, take, and receive, to them and ther successors, to and for the actual occupation and use of the said corporation, any lands, tenements and hereditiments and real or personal property within the promerty

City of Toronto, and the same release, sell, alienate and dispose of whensoever the satid corporation may deem proper to do so.

Next general meeting to frame bylaws, de.
2. Within three months from the passing of this Act a general meeting of the persons named in the first section hereof shall be called by the secretary or directors of the said original club upon one week's notice by letter, mailed to the post oftice address of each such person, for the purpose of adopting such constitution, rules bylaws, and regulations as may be thought fit, touching the admission and expulsion of members, the election of officers, and the management and conduct generally of the affairs and concerns of the said club, in so far as they shall not be inconsistent with the laws of this Prorince; provided always, that the corporation hereby created may from time to time alter, repeal, and change such constitution, rules, bylaws or regulations in the mamer to be provided in such constitution, by-laws, rules or regulatioms.

Lialmities of
3. No member of the corporation hereby created, shall be liable for any of the debts, contracts or liabilities incurred, assumed or entered into, by the said corporation, beyond the amount of the entrance fee and the ammal subscription, or any portion thereof which may be due and unpaid by such member, and members of the corporation hereby created, not being in arrears for entrance fee, subscription or otherwise, shall as such be wholly free from liability for any debt,

liability contract, or engagement of the eorporation hereby created, and members of the corporation hereby created, not in arrear may retire therefrom in the manner to be provided for $1 y$ the constitution, by-laws, rules or regulations $t$ ' be adopted or enacted as aforesaid.
4. It shall be lawful for the corporation hereby created with the assent of the members as hereinafter provided for, to raise or borrow either upon mortgage of the real and personal property of their corporation, or by the issue of debentures secured thereon as hereinafter provided, or partly in one way and partly in the other, or otherwise, such sums of money as they may deem necessary, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum of fifty thousand dollars.
5. If, as provided by the next preceding section of this Act, it be decided to raise or borrow

Powersto borrow or mortgage, sc. moneys upon mortgage, the said corporation are hereby authorized to execute a mortgage or mortgages upon their real and personal properts, or either, or such portions thereof as they may see fit, to secure the repayment of moneys borrowed and interest at the rate to be fixed as iforesaid in such way and manner as may have been agreed upon.
6. If, as provided by section four of this Act, it be decided to raise moneys upon dehentures,

Moneys may be raised on debentures. the said corporation may pledge and mortyage the real and personal propersy of the said corporation, or either thereof for the repayment of
the moneys so borrowed and the interest thereon; such debentures may be payable to bearer, or to the order of any person, and shall pass and be transferable by delivery or endorsement thereof respectively ; Provided always, that no money shall be raised by mortgage, or debentures until the consent of the majority of the members of rhe corporation attending in person or represented by proxy, at a special meeting to be called for that purpose be first obtained, such special meeting to be called in the manner pointed out by the constitution, rules and regulations for the calling of special meetings.

Power to liecome parties to notes, \&e.
7. The corporation hereby created shall have power and authority to become parties to promissory notes and bills of exchange, and any such promissory notes made or endorsed, or any such bill of exchange drawn, accepted, or endorsed by the proper officers of the corporation to be designated in the said constitution or rules, and under the authority of the board of directors shall be binding on the said corporation; and every such promissory note or bill of exchange so made shall be presumed to have been made with proper authority until the contrary be shewn ; and in no case shall it be necessary to have the seal of the said corporation affixed to such promissory note or bill of exchange, nor shall the said officers be individually responsible for the same, unless the said promissory notes or bills of exchange have been issued without the sanction and authority of the board of directors Proviso. as herein provided for ; Provided, however, that
nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the said corporation to issue any notes or bill of ex-hange payable to bearer, or intend $d$ to be circulated as money or as the notes or bials of a bank, and circulated as money.
8. The moneys so raised shall be appliec' Disposal of exclusively in the purchase, improvement, or funls raised erection or leasing of a club house, and depen- gachs.and et: dencies and in furnishing the same or in payment of debts incurred therefor, or for the other proper purposes of the corporation.
9. The corporation hereby created may acquire by purchase for its exclusive use, all or any por-

Purchase of assets of original clol. tion of the assets of the said original club.
10. It shall be competent for the board of directors of said original club, and they are may wind ni hereby empowered to wind up its affairs, and to sell or dispose of, at a valuation or otherwise, the assets of the said original club, and to apply the proceeds in payment of its debts, so far as the same will go, and in case of a deficiency between assets and liabilities to assess members of the said original club for a proportionate sum or amount thereof, and if need be to collect such assessment in the name of the then secretary of the said original club or in any other legal manner ; Provided always that prior to such sale or assessment a special general meeting of the members of the said original club shall be called on two weeks' notice stating the special purpose for which the meeting is summoned, mailed, pre-
paid, to the address of each member of the said original club as shewn by the books thereof; and a resolution authorizing such sale, the limit of such assessment, or both, adopted by a majority of the members there present at a meeting so called as aforesaid shall be sufficient warrant and authority therefor, and shall be binding on all the members of the said original club. And provided moreover, that no member of said original club shall be liable for or to pay the amount of any assessment made under this section, unless irrespective of anything in this Act contained, the said member would be, either alone or with other members of said original club, liable for the debts of said original club.

Rights of creditors of original clab.
11. Nothing herein contained sball prejudice or affect the rights of the creditors of the said original club as against the said original club or its members, nor shall this be interpreted to make the corporation hereby created liable for the debts of the said original club, or to extinguish the charter or incorporation of the said original club.

## CONSTITUTION AND BY LAW

## THE NATIONAL CLI'B

Incorporated by Act 41. Vic. Chap. 66 (Passed 7th March, 1878.)

## Board of Directors.

1. The entire supervision of the affairs of the Club shall be entrusted to a Board of Directors, consisting of fifteen members with power to leave the actual management of the Club affairs to an Executive Committee of three, to he elected by them from their own number.

## Election of Officers.

2. At every annual meeting the Club shall elect by ballot a President, two Vice-Presidents and twelve Directors, who shall constitute the 23 |

Board of Directors, and they shall remain in office until their successors be appointed. The Board of Directors shall appoint the SecretaryTreasurer who may or may not be a Director. Nominations for President, two Vice-Presidents, and twelve Directors, may be sent to the Secretary and may be posted in the Club House ten days before the annual meeting of members and all nominations shall be sent to the Secretary and posted not less than three days before such annual meeting.

## President.

3. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all the meetings (when present), to see the rules and regulations strictly enforced, to call ali meetings, and have a general supervision over all the affairs of the Club.

## Vice-Presidents.

4. In case of the absence, resignation or death of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall perform all the duties pertaining to the office of President.
5. The Board of Directors shall elect from their own body an Executive Commit ee consisting of three members, who shall ho d office during the pleasure of the Board of Direcrors.

## Secretary-Treasurer.

6. The Secretary-Treasurer shall see that all fees, charges and subscriptions, are regularly collected, have charge of all the funds of the Club, and keep a regular account thereof subject to monthly examination and audit by the Executive Committee, and he shall pay out the same from time to time under the general directions of the Board or any Committee thereof, by cheque or other order, countersigned by the President or one of the Vice-Presidents ; and shall also keep a record of all matters transacted at the meetings of the Club or Board of Directors or Executive Committee ; shall notify candidates for admission of their election, and execute such writings and acts, matters and things as he may be officially instructed and authorized to execute and perform ; and shall have the custody of the corporate seal of the

Club, but which seal can only be affixed to any instrument or written document so as to legally bind the Club as a corporation, when and as the same is also signed and attested by the President or one of the Vice-Presidents.

## Executive Committee.

7. The Executive Committee shall mak all purchases authorized by the Board of Directors, regulate the price to be charged upon all articles to be sold in the Club, make monthly returns to the Board of all the stock of supplies on hand, and the amount bought and sold during the month previous, and report monthly to the Board all matters necessary to be done for the comfort and convenience of the members of the Club.

2 The Excentive Committee shall report the names of such members as are in arrears, and the sum: they owe respectively, once in each mont!, to the Board, see that the Seere-tary-Treasurer performs the duties of his office accurately, promptly and efficiently, and examine and audit his accounts monthly, and execute
the details of all financial schemes and suties as they shall be requested by the Board to carry out and perform, and hase ageneral supurision of the finances of the Club, and shall from time to time make a report of the financial position of the Club to the Board.
3. The Executive Committee shall have supervision of the billiard tables and room, library and periodicals, and shall make such rules and regulations with respect thereto as they shall deem meet; and shall report to the Board a monthly account of the billiard tables, with receipts and expenditures in respect of same.
4. The names of the members constituting the said Committee shall be kept posted in a conspicious place in the Club House.

## Powers of the Board.

8. The Board of Directors shall take into consideration all affairs affecting the welfare of the Club, shall authorize all expenditures, ballot for all candidates for admission to membership, and serve as the tribunal before whom all questions or differences which shall and might
affect the interests of the Club may be laid, and the decision of the Board thereon shall be final and conclusive, except in cases where an appeal is expressly given in these By-laws to the membets of the Club. The Board shall also have power to appoint such special committees as the interests of the Club may demand.

## Board Meetings.

9. The said Board shall hold monthly meetincs, or whenever they shall be summoned by the President or a Vice-President, and shall have full power to suspend any officer on receiving evidence of the faithless discharge of his duties by said officer, and to appoint one to fill the vacancy until the regular election. Five members of the Board shall form a quorum for the transaction of all business, except as hereinafter provided for the suspension or forfeiture of membership, or the expulsion of a member, or with respect to the admission of any member.

## Vacancies in Board.

10 The Board shall have full power to fill any vacancy which may occur from death,
resignation, or otherwise, either among the officers or Directors, and any election so by them made shall be valid until the next ensuingr annual meeting of the Club.

## Rules.

11. The Board shall also prescribe such rules for regulating the internal and domestic affairs and conduct of the Club, as in their judgment may from time to time become necessary and proper ; and shall have full power to appoint and remove the steward and all servants of the Club at the pleasure of the Board.

## Remova! from Office.

12. The Club shall retain the power of vacating the places of any members of the Board of Directors by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, at a special meeting called for that purpose.

## Suspension or Forfeiture of Membership or Expulsion.

13. The Board of Directors shall hate power, by vote of two-thirds of the members
present, at a special meeting of the Board called for the purpose, to inquire into, and thereupon in its discretion to suspend or forfeit the membership of or expel any member for any conduct on his part either in or out of the Club House, likely to endanger the welfare, interests or character of the Club ; or for wilfully infringing any of the By-laws, Rules or Regulations of the Club, or for conduct unbecoming a gentleman.
14. At any time within thirty days after such suspension, forfeiture or expulsion, a special meeting of the Club may be called, if requested, in writing by ten members, addressed to the Secretary, at which meeting an appeal may be taken from the decision of the Board of Directors and the member may be restored by a vote of a majority of members present.
15. Any decision of the Board of Directors upon the suspension of any member, or the forfeiture of his membership, or his expulsion, shall be final and conclusive, and not subject to the review or decision of any Court of Justice, but only to the appeal to a special meeting of

4. No vote shall be taken on proposed suspension or forfeiture of membership, or expuision, until after five days' notice at least shall have been given to the members in question, stating the ground of complaint, and time of meeting of the Board.

## Election of Members.

14. No person shall become a member or the Clut until he shall have attained the age of twenty-one years.
15. Every candidate for admission must be proposed by one member and seconded by another, previous to his being balloted for by the Board of Directors. His name and those of the proposers shall be posted in a conspicuous place in the Club House, at least ten days before being balloted for.
16. No candidate for membership shall be elected unless he shall receive an affirmative rote of a majority of the Board of Directors, at which seven members at least are present, and taro black balls shall exclude any candidate.
17. After a candidate shall have been balloted for, and rejected, any member of the Board then present may demand a second ballot before the Board adjourns. In the event of a candidate being elected the Secretary shall notify the same to him in writing, and shall request him to pay the necessary fees.
18. If the elected candidate shall not pay the necessary fees within fifteen days after his election, the Board of Directors at any time thereafter may cancel and annul such election, by resolution to that effect, without notice to the elected candidate, and the Directors at the time of or at any time after the passing of such resolution may direct the Secretary to enter the name of the candidate for membership whose election shall have been so cancelled and annulled upon a list to be kept for that purpose recording the fact of the election and cancellation and annulment with dates, and no candidate whose name shall have been entered on such list shall be eligible for membership or be elected a member of this Club for a period of five years thercafter.
19. No candidate elected shall le entitled to any privileges of membership till he shall have paid all fees and the subseription prable upon his election.
20. There shall be four classes of mombers :
(t). Members resident in the City of Toronto or within five miles thereof.
(2). Members non-resident.
(3). Life or Honorary Members.
(f). Members privilesed.
21. The resident members shall not exceed four hundred in number, and each resident member shall pay an entrance fee of fifty dollars, and an annual subseription of thirty dollars, payable in adrance on the first daty of April in each year, but if the same be paid on or before the first day of May the sum of twentr-five dollars shall beacepted in full thereof. In lien of theentrance fee it shall be at the option of the member to pay the same in two instalments of twentyfire dollars each, at the same time as his ammal subseription.
22. Non-resident members are subject to election in the same manner as resident members, 3
and are required to pay an entrance tee of twenty-fise dollars. The annal subscription of non-resident members shall be twelve dollars, parable in advance on the first day of April in each year, but if the same be paid on or before the first day of May, the sum of ten dollars shall be accepted in full thereof.
23. Privileged members are entitled to the privileges of the Club for the periods hereinafter mentioned, without entrance fee or subscription, but shall have no right to introduce any friend, or to attend meetings, or in any way interfere with the management of the Club.
24. The Directors may in their discretion and by a unanimous rote of the whole Board, from time to time reward important or distinguished services rendered to the Club by any member or by any person not a member by creating such member or person, member of the Club for the term of his natural life or an honorary member for such time or period of years as to the Directors shall seem meet, and every such life or honorary member shall be exempt from payment of any entrance fee in respect of such life or
honorary membership and also from payment of any ammal subscription but in all other respects shall be subject to the rules of the Club as in the ease of an ordinary member resident or nonresident as his place of residence may define him under this Constitution and By-Laws, with the exception that no such member shali have any right to vote at any meeting of the Club or be elegible as an Officer or Director.
25. If any member shall fail to pay his subseription for the current year, before the first day of May in that year, his mame may be posted up in the Club and notice shall be sent to him by the Secretary-Treasurer, and if the subseription be not paid within thirty days after such posting up the defaulter may be struck off the roll of membership by resolution of the Board of Directors, to that effect, without further notice to the defaulter.
26. Members should pay all bills for dues and expenses incurred before leaving the Club House and the names of all members whose account remains umpaid on the first day of each month, such accounts having been previously rendered,
shall be posted in the Club House as in default, on the $5^{5}$ th of the same month. All eredit shall be stopped to any member while posted.

## Members Defined.

16. A resident member is one who lives in the city of Toronto, or within five miles therefrom, or who has his place of business in such city.
17. A non-resident member is one whose usual place of abode or business is distant more than five miles from such city, and who has not during his membership resided in the eity of Toronto for a longer period than three months in any current year.
18. The privileged member is one who, not being a resident in any part of this Province, is temporarily in the city of Toronto, whom the " Executive Committee" may admit to the privileges of the Club for such period of weeks or months not exceeding one month in all, after which the Executive Committee may extend the time for a period not exceeding eleven months the privileged member paying during this extended period a monthly fee of $\$ 3.00$.
19. All members of other Clate in this and other Provinces of Canada, not be ng residents of Foronto, or within fise miles thereof, may be admitted by the Board to the privileges of the Club for two weeks.
20. A member may introduce, as a visitor, to the privileges of the Club any friend who resides out of the County of York, for two weeks being answerable for any dues contracted by 1
21. Any of the above privileges shall not be repeated to the recipient until six months after the former privilege has elapsed.
22. The names and residence of all privileged members, and the duration of such privilese shall always appear in the Visitors' Book.
23. The Executive Committee may grant the privileges of the Club pending the consideration of his application for membership to anyone so applying for membership.
(9). "Life members and honorary members are such members as may be appointed by the Directors pursuant to sub-section fire of Clause fifteen of this Constitution and By-Laws.

## Visitors.

17. Any member, at his own expense, has the privilege of introducing one or more of his friends to the visitors' room, and to breakfast, lunch or dinner, and the name of each such friend shall be entered in the Visitors' Book.
18. Guests of any member with whom they have dined or lunched at the Club, shall have all the privileges of the Club, while such member is with them.

## Club Hours and Rules.

1. The Club shall open every day for the reception of members from eight o'clock in the forenoon until one o'clock on the following morning, except on Saturdays and Sundays, when the hour of closing shall be midnight. The Club House shall be closed and lights extinguished after such hours, and no resident member shall, on any pretence whatever, be admitted to or allowed to remain in the Club after such hours of closing, unless the previous permission in writing of the "Executive Committee" has been obtained.
2. Any cause of complaint by any member is to be by letter to the Secretary, a d any inattention or improper conduct on the pa $t$ of a servant is also to be stated by letter to the Secretary.
3. No grambling shall be permitted in the Club, and no games of any kind on Sundays.
4. No higher stakes than quarter dollar points shall be played for at whist, nor shall any bet exceed one dollar.
5. Ecarre, picquet, euchre, billiards and pool may be played for limited stakes, the limits to be fixed by the Executive Committee, and such Committee shall have power to fix a limit to the hours during which cards or billiards may be played in the Club.

## Further Causes of Forfeiture of Membership.

19. Any member shall be liable to forfeiture of his membership in any of the following cases (besides those authorized by any other by-law): In case a member neglects to pay any dues and additions thereto or accounts due to the Club, for a period of one month after the same hall have become payable or have been incurred.
20. In case a member wilfully commits any breach of the Constitution or By-laws of the Club, wilfully violates or neglects the observance of any rule or regulation provided by such By-laws or by the Board of Directors, on any Committee under the authority thereot.
21. A member forfeiting his membership for non-payment of his subscription or other dues, may be reinstated within three months of such forfeiture, by the unanimous vote of a meeting of the Board of Directors, upon all arrears being first paid up.
22. Any member who shall withdraw, resign or whose membership shall become forfeited from any cause, shall ipso facto cease to be a member of the Club, and all his right claim thereon, or in or to its property or funds, shall become rested in the Club.

## Annual and Other Meetings.

20. There shal' be a general Annual Meeting of the Cluh, to be held at the Club House, on the second Wednesday in May. The Board shall also have power to call from time to time special meetings of the Club. They shall also
call a special meeting at any time on the requi sition of ten members sent to the SecretaryTreasurer, and expressing the specific objects thereof. Twenty resident members of the Club shall constitute a quorum at all general and special meetings.
21. All notices of meetings of the Club or of the Board shall be considered as duly given if posted in the Club for the required time, and all notices required to be given to members under any of these By-laws, shall be considered as duly given if so posted, (except notices required to be given to a newly elected candiclate.)

## Amendments of the Constitution.

21. Any amendment to the Constitution shall require an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present, at a general or special meeting called for the purpose.
22. No amendment to the Constitution shall be voted upon, unless a copy thereof shall have been furnished to the Secretary, at least three weeks before the Annual or Special Meeting of the Club; and it shall be the duty of the Secre-
tary to cause the same to be printed and distributed to the members at the same time with the notice of the Annual or Special Meeting, which shall be given at least ten days before any such meeting. These restrictions shall not apply to the amendment of a proposed amendment of the Constitution when being considered by the Club.

## Scrutineers.

22. The President or the presiding officer at rhe Annual or special meeting shall appoint three scrutineers, whose duty shall be to open the polls and count the ballots, in the presence of at least five other members, and those persons having the greatest number of votes shall be entitled to office, and shall enter upon their duties forthwith, after the date of theirelection.

Construction of Constitution and By-Laws.
23. In respect to all questions of the construction of the Constitution and By-laws, the decision of the Board once made thereon shall be final and obligatory until rescinded by the Board itself or by the Club, at any general or special meeting.

## RULES AND REGULATI(ONS.

## Directors' Meeting.

In the absence of the President a Chairman for the day will be first elected and the minutes of the last meeting having been read, the question will be put by the Chairman: "That they be confirmed"

If the minutes be objected to by a majority of the members present, the particular subject objected to will be reserved for consideration, either at a special meeting or at the next ordinary meeting as may be decided upon, and if not objected to then the Chairman will affix his signature thereto.

After the disposal of the minutes of the previous meeting ail such matters as require the consideration of the Directors will be brought before them, discussed and decided upon.

A tariff of meals, wines and cigars, which shall be observed by the Steward, shall be prepared by the Executive Committee and exhibited in the Coffee Room constantly.

## The Secretary-Treasurer.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall collect and bank daily all moneys of the club, and shall disburse them under the direction of the directors. He shall keep proper accounts, and a.t each meeting of the Directors shall submit a staterent howing the financial position of the Club, with the bank book showing the balance at the co dit of the Club. His book shall always beopen to the inspection of the Directors.

He will have the general control and superintendence of the establishment under the Directors and Executive Committee, and will attend all meetings of the Directors and of the Executive Committee, note their resolutions, and minute them in a book of their proceedings.

In all his written official communications he will state expressely that they are made by direction of the Directors or of the Executive Com mittee as the case may be.

Besides his attendance upon the Directors and Executive Committee he will conduct the official correspondence of the Club, draw up
reports, keep regular accounts of all the financial concerns of the Club. an account of the wine and other stores in the stock cellars of the Club, an account with the Steward for wines and stores delivered for the consumption of members and for the use of the establishment, examine all accounts previous to their being submitted for final adjustment, and wiil pay the same when passed by the Directors or the Executive Committee as the case may be.

He will have the custody of all the stock of wines in the Club and shall deliser thereout to the House Steward from time to time such wines as he may deem to be required for use of members during each day.

He will ascertain that all goods and provisions delivered are in strict accordance with the orders griven and correctly charged in the tradesmen's books, and will sign such books.

He will attend to all communications, receive information upon all subjects connected with the business of the Club, and particularly all matters relating to the members thereof.

He will place before the Executive Commit. tee the receipts for payments which have been
authorized by the Executive Committee at its previous meeting, and he will submit to the Executive Committee a weekly statement of the receipts and disbursements of the Club.

He shall take stock of all stores, supplies and property of the Club at the end of every month, and submit the results to the Executive Committee on or as soon after the first day of each month as possible.

## House Stewart.

The Stewart shall be subject to the control of the Executive Committee for the time being, whose instructions shall be conveyed through the Secretary- 「reasurer. He will constantly reside in the Club House ; and will have the custody of the Supply Cellars -other than the Wine Cellar--Plate, Cutlery, China, Glass, Linen, etc. He will have the general control and superintendence of the servants and be responsible for their conduct and cleanly appearance, as well as for the cleanliness and order of the establishment.

He will account daily with the SecretaryTreasurer for all moneys received from the
members for supplies, and for all vines given out by him for the use of members.

Subject to the Executive Committee, he will make the established charges for all provisions, wines, etc., and cast up and receive from the members the amount of their bills.

He is required to notify members of any violation of the regulations, and to report the same to the Secretary-Treasurer for the information of the Executive Committee.

## GENERAL HOUSE RULES.

## Billiard Room.

The following regulations will be in force in this room :-
rst The game of English pool shall have choice of tables, and take precedence over billiards and pyramids, and may be played in consecutive games.

2nd. For billiards and pyramids the tables can only be engaged for one game and no game of billiards is to exceed one hundred points. Precedence in playing and choice of tables are
to be giving according to entry of names on the marker's slate.

The charges will be as follows:
English Pool-Five cents per ball ; stars to pay extra.
Black Pool-Five cents per ball for every half hour or portion thereof.
Billiards-Thirty cents per hour ; no charge less than fifteen cents.
Other games, by the hour, thirty cents.
The marker is instructed at the conclusion of each game to present to the loser a cheque for the amount of his game, which must be deposited by the player in the box kept for that purpose in the billiard room. Should the player pay cash he will deposit the ticket in the box, giving the marker the amount due for same. All credit tickets to be signed by the member previous to depositing same in box.

Members cutting the cloth will be fined in proportion to the damage done.

The Billiard Room shall be closed from 12 o'clock on Saturday night until io o'clock on Monday morning.

## Bed Rooms.

The Club bedroom is preferentially for the use of non-resident members. No member to occupy the room for more than two nights when there are other applicants for its use. The charge shall be $\$$ i.oo per day.

## Private Dining Rooms.

A charge for the use of each room for meals of $\$ 1.00$ shal! be made for parties consistins of less than four persons. Over that number no charge will be made. No meals will be served in these rooms at a less price than seventy fire cents each.

An ordinary course dinner taken from regular bill of fare will be served at *i.oo for each person.

Members desirins special menucan arrange with the Steward as to details and price.

The private dining rooms when not in use for meals may be used by members for private conferences.

## Cards.

Card playing shall be strictly confine w the two card rooms allotted for the purpose and shall nst under any circumstances be permitted in any other part of the Club House. No visitor whall be introduced to either card room who has not lunched or dined with a member introducing him to the Club, and thenonly when accompanied by that member. The same visitor may not be introduced oftener than once in birty. days, and no person not a member of thi.. Shib shall be admitted to the said rooms except for the purpose of playing whist and then only in accordance with a strict observance of the conditions governing the admission of guests to the card rooms.

The charge for cards will be forty cents per pack for new cards, and twenty cents per pack when second hand cards are used.

The cards will remain the property of the Club (except when sold as second-hand to members to be taken out of the house) and shall be taken care of by the Steward immediately
after the party using them shall hi ve retired from the room, or after the table has been broken up.

## Visitors

Visitors calling to see members will be required to remain at the entrance of the Club until it is ascertained if the member be within.

No risitors are to be shown into the Reception room, but if accompanied by $a$ member or coming by appointment to meet a member they may be taken into that room, otherwise no stranger shall be admitted into the Club House except on business.

No resident of the city or within five miles of the city. is to be introduced to the Club more than once in thirty days.

## Members.

If a letter for an absent member be applied for by another member, who may wish to forward it, the latter will be required to paypostage (if any) and to sign an acknowledgement of his having received the letter, to provide for the case of any further question.

## Servants.

The waiters, and all other servants in the establishment, will be subject to the orders of the Steward and Secretary, and will perform such duties as they may prescribe.

The servants are strictly prohibited from receiving visitors or followers.

No member shall give and no servant shall receive a gratuity in the Club on any account or pretence whatever.

Servants, while on duty, are not to talk to each other except on matters connected with their business, and servants are prohibited from addressing an individuai member in the house on matters personal or relative to the concerns of the Club-all communications of the latter kind to be made through the Steward to the Executive Committee.

No servant of the Club shall be sent out of the house upon an errand on any pretence whatever, except by the sanction and order of the Steward or Secretary.

If any money or articles supposed to be the property of the members shall be found by the
servants in the Club house, they shall be delivered to the Secretary through the Steward.

The servants' entrance in the rear will be under lock and the key thereof be in custody of the House Steward, and servants must not enter or go out of the Club except by the servants' entrance at the rear of the building.

No large boxes, bicycles or articles of luggage belonging to members will be admitted into the hall.

## Meals

Breakfast will be served from 8 until ro. 30 o'clock a. m. week days and from 8.30 until I I o'clock on Sundays; luncheon from 12.30 to $3.30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. , dinner from 6.30 until $8 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. ; cold suppers up to 12 o'clock p. m., and liquors, teas and coffee up to i o'clock a. m., after which no orders of any kind can be received unless specially authorized by the Executive Committee on timely application in writing. Members will fill up their bills for meals themselves and must on no account employ the waiters to do so.

## General.

Articles of glass earthenware, etc., which may be broken by the members, either in the Coffee Room or elsewhere in the House, must be paid for by them.

No pamphlet, advertisement or notice of any kind shall be allowed to be laid on the table or put up in the Club by a member ; but any pamphlet, etc, which it may be wished to be made known to the Club shall be sent to the Secretary to be laid before the Executive Committee.

Writing material will be provided in the Reading Room.

## Complaints.

Members are requested to make complaints in writing, by entry in the complaint book, signed by themselves, to the House Committee for the time being, of any matter in the administration of the Club seeming to need correction. No complaints addressed personally to a member of any committee of the Club will receive attention.
