In the present War with *GREAT*.
BRITAIN, &c.

London, 25^d July, 1741.

SIR,

THE Task you have in such a friendly
Manner given me, could not possibly be
refused by him who looks on your Friendship
as his greatest Happiness.

We have often in Conversation ran over a
A 2 State

State of former Wars, and made *Essays* to come at the *Profit* one Side or the other have made by them. In some we have found that the *Success* has not been answerable to the *Justice* of the Cause. In others, we have agreed that *Right* has triumph'd, and *Oppression* and *Violence* been subdued; and in others, both parties have contended, till *neither* had any thing to lose. But arguing from *Consequences* is fallacious, for *Accidents* of a *Thousand* different *Natures* will intervene in the best Cause, and ruin the best concerted Scheme *Human Nature* can produce.

For this Reason all wise Governments endeavour to evade even a *just War*, whilst there remains a *Probability* that their *just Demands* may be granted without it.

Thus in the Case of the present War. All *England* knew they were ill-us'd; every *Individual* was exasperated against *Spain*, and the *Merchants* felt the Effects of their *Depredations*. Could a *Government* sit still and laugh at the *Calamity* of the Subject? No surely, but on the other hand, neither could they, nor ought they, to plunge the *Nation* precipitately into a *War*.

Many were the *Remonstrances* made to *Spain* to redress the *Merchants*, which, with some

some *European* Occurrences, produc'd those Treaties we all know of, and is not my present Purpose to speak on. *England* did not merely confide in the Faith of Treaties; but whilst she amus'd the World in that Manner, she prudently took Care to add Weight to her *Negotiations*, by augmenting her *Forces*, and manning her *Fleets*. A Work of this Nature was not to be done, in that *easy* Manner some Gentlemen imagine. The Channel, and the ordinary Service was always provided for, but when a Number of Ships was commissioned, what were the Difficulties in manning them! Out of the usual Allowance of Men, for Guards and Garrisons, none could be spar'd abroad: But before a Declaration of War, an Augmentation was order'd, and new Regiments rais'd immediately after. Would it have been prudent to have transported the old Corps, before the new ones were in some Measure disciplin'd?

'Tis indifferent to us, Sir, who directs the *State Machine*, but let us have Minds so unbiass'd, as not to approve the Views of any Party, if we believe they mean not the Good of the Community.

I shall not take upon me to prove, either (what is call'd) the *Court* or *Country* Party in the right; for as 'tis impossible for a private
Man

Man *positively* to defend the first as he cannot know the Springs of Action, so 'tis impossible, *absolutely* to applaud the last, except he can be certain, that *Ambition, Envy, or Ignorance* had no Part in their Sentiments. 'Tis possible a Minister could raise his Character and baffle all Opposition, were he at Liberty to tell the Publick what secret Advices he had received from Time to Time, which alter'd his Scheme of Politicks, and made That right to-day, which would in the Nature of Things be wrong to-morrow: But 'tis scarcely to be conceived that any Man, much less a prejudiced Person, shall raise Difficulties, and censure a Conduct where he can have no real Idea of the Affair, other than what the Minister shall think proper to communicate, which must always happen to be but a slender Part of the whole.

But Sir, Defending or Censuring is not my Province, it must suffice at present, that according to my Promise, I lay before you a Sketch of the *Profit and Loss* of this present War, and enable you to judge, whether it has been conducted in that blundering Manner, the Writers of a Party, and every News-Paper daily set forth.

In an Attempt of this Nature, 'tis impossible to ascertain the Number of Prizes, or absolutely

absolutely to fix their real Value ; but without having a Regard to Politicks, we must have Recourse to political Arithmetick. An Account settled by Vouchers cannot be liable to Error. The following tho' made up by such Authorities and Reports as I judg'd authentic, must certainly be erroneous ; but Errors on one Side may possibly balance Errors on the other.

Thus, Sir, it appears, that we are indebted to *Spain* 1005400 *l.* and I appeal to every impartial Gentleman, who will examine the Calculations, if I have not greatly *lessen'd* the Gain of the *English*, and *increas'd* that of *Spain*.

This is a large Sum for two Years, but, I have reason to believe, is far short of the *real Gain*, especially if we could include the vast Profit that Commodore *Anson* has by this time probably made, and the great Advantage of our *West-India* Trade, which I am well informed is more extensive than ever, as 'tis dangerous for other Nations to trade there; add to these the Hopes and Expectations from Sir *John Norris*.

It may not be improper to subjoin a few Remarks on the foregoing Account.

The Sea between *Cape St Vincent*, and *Cape Finester* is 120 Leagues, and between the *Isle of Usbent* and *Cape Ortegall* almost as much, so that 'tis not so practicable to let Ships of a proper Force ply there, on a Cruize, as is generally imagined; for in a hard Gale at N. or N. W. or W. they must be obliged to put into some Port of *Portugal*, *France* or *Spain*, whilst the smaller Ships of the Enemy may go from, and retire to their own Ports with Safety.

As

As the Trade of *England* is large and extensive, we have at least fifteen Ships employed in *Europe* for one of *Spain*; our Privateers therefore cannot have the same Encouragement to follow them, as they have to pursue us.

It has been thought, that not one third of our Ships would have been taken, had they waited for proper Convoy, but many have advanced the Insurance, and proceeded on their Voyages singly, in order to come to a better Market for their Commodities; so that Ships taken thus circumstanced, ought not to be carried to the Debit of *Spain*.

The Valuation of Captures from *Spain* is vastly lessened from the common Reports of News-Papers, which are very apt to magnify our Losses, but not our Captures. The following Instances of moderated Computations, will shew, that the Damage by the War to *Spain*, might have been raised much higher.

Our *West-India* Privateers have taken ample Satisfaction for past Injuries, as *Spain*, in that Part of the World, gives them a large Field.

'Tis not impossible but some Ships have been taken by consent, in order to defraud the Insurers.

I submit it, if many of our Ships have not been insured by Foreigners.

On a Review of the foregoing Account, it appears that we have taken from *Spain*, from *July* 1739, to *July* 1741.

Besides the Forts and Castles, of *Porto Bello* *Chagra*, and *Cartagena*, entirely demolished ; and, that they have taken from us

154 Ships.

And, 'tis remarkable, we have not lost one *King's Ship*, nor above one or two Privateers.

Undoubtedly many Gentlemen could make out a more exact List, especially the *Insurers*

mers of England and Holland, tho' some imagine they have contributed to the Reports of our great Losses, in order to raise the Price of Insurance; but till a better List is made, this may serve to shew the *Malice* of domestic Enemies, spirited up into Faction, who, regardless of Truth, or even the least Shadow of it, have represented the Loss to be almost all on our Side. *By their Fruit ye shall know them.* Witness the many Absurdities, Falsities, vile Innuendoes, &c. that are daily retail'd and greedily swallowed by the ignorant; the Inventers of which, I am convinced, are actuated by no other Motive than to distress the *Government*, and render us *less formidable* to our Enemies, by making us a *divided People*.

Let us look back to our News-Paper and Weekly Tracts, and we shall be astonish'd, when we see printed the Substance of imaginary *Orders* and *Instructions* to Admirals and Ambassadors, which they never heard of. Do we not read Debates at the *Privy Council*, which we know could not be communicated? Have we not heard the Lye given to the *Winds*? And have they not taken upon them to direct their Blasts? Have they not endeavoured to raise a *Mutiny* in the Fleets, by saying the *Provisions were unsound*, and that *the Powder was weaker than the Enemy's*? Have they not abused a brave and honest

nest Admiral, by saying he *sept* in the *Mediterranean*, and was quite useless, tho' the *Lisbon* and *Italian* Merchants, and the *Turky Company*, think quite otherwise? Have they not sent out or retarded Fleets of all Nations at their Will and Pleasure? and have they not built and formed Arguments from these *Falshoods* to censure and abuse *Actions* that never were or could be *actu'd*?

Charity will make us wish for their Repentance, but if they are harden'd in their Crimes, no Punishment is sufficient.

May every true *Briton* think with Justice, Humanity and Impartiality on our present Situation, and then he will be convinced that every Action was intended, conducted and executed with as much Care for the *publick Utility* as human Prudence could direct; he will then reflect, that if there has been any Delay or seeming Error committed by the Government in the Conduct of this just War, it is highly probable, it proceeded from the wise Consideration, that the Peace and Safety of the Nation, required to be guarded from *secret Enemies*, prior to annoying our declared Foes. IT may not be improper to inform the Reader, that the foregoing Accounts were collected, and the Remarks written, at a great Distance from London, and sent by Sea to the Person charged with the Publication of them; they may for that Reason be less compleat and exact.

After the Sheets were printed off, some Conversation happening on this Subject among Persons acquainted with Commercial and Naval Affairs, it was agreed, that several of the Ships taken by the Spaniards are rated below the Value, but that of others the Estimation is too high. One Article in particular was unanimously adjudged to be extravagantly enhanced; it is that of the British Merchants Effects seized in Spain upon the Declaration of War, the Value of which is set down at 200,000 l. whereas a Gentleman present would insure all the Loss that there could be on that Account at 8000 l.

It was observed too, that some Ships are represented in this List to be taken by the Spaniards, (as the Lancashire Witch, also a Ship for Gibraltar, and another for Gainsborough) which were reported to be taken, but came afterwards safe to Port. Other Ships are entered,

tered as taken, the Names unknown, and the Value computed, which Ships are mentioned afterwards by their Names, and the Value set down again in the Account.

As there does not therefore appear any Partiality in stating these Accounts, this Attempt of Honestus to make a Balance of our Profit and Loss, tho' deficient, or erroneous, in some respect, for want of better Opportunities of Knowledge, ought to be received with Candour. However that shall be, the Editor thinks himself obliged to promise, that if any Gentleman or Merchant will be pleased to send to the Publisher of this Pamphlet any new Accounts or Amendment of these, they shall be considered and published, either in a second Edition, or a second Part.
