BRITISH CAPTURE STRONG POSITIONS

Occupy Their Old Trenches at Gouzeaucourt and Take the Wood Outside the Town ---Another Allied Advance From Glennes to Vieil Arcy---Fierce Battle Develops Before St. Quentin---French to Begin Attack Against St. Gobain Massif.

JOY-RIDING IS NOW UNDER BAN
Canada expects every motor car owner to do his duty. How? By discontinuing the use of his car for pleasure on Sundays. The fuel controller requests that this be done in the interests of the war and owners of cars are now under solemn obligation to respond locally to the call. Joy-riding on Sundays is henceforth under the ban. The public will place it there, because the threatened scarcity of gasoline may prejudice our drive for victory. To save "gas" is to save money and to add strength to the country's ability to finance the war. Car owners are now in a position where they can render a distinct service to the state by compliance with the fuel controller's request. The service which the public will not be slow to appreciate.

GERMANS BRING UP NEW TROOPS TO MAKE STAND
Hindenburg Line May Soon Require Considerable Alterations.
POUNDING ENEMY REAR
British Artillery Has Created Great Havoc in the German Lines.
With the British Army in France, Sept. 9.—Allied little strips of ground have been gained here and there along the battle lines that zigzag their way across Artois and Picardy, the British troops generally were stationary today. A heavy rain whipped along by a chilly wind covered the battlefield with a coating of mud. This in itself would necessarily result in a slower movement, even if it were not necessary for the advanced troops to consolidate their positions.

AMERICAN INFANTRYMEN GAIN ON CURVED LINE
Advance in Pace of Stiffest Machine Gun Fire Since They Crossed the Veale.
With the American Army on the Aisne front, Sept. 9.—In the face of the stiffest machine gun fire since the Americans crossed the Veale in force, American infantrymen today advanced on certain points on a curved line extending from Glennes to Vieil Arcy. The advance was preceded by a heavy artillery bombardment, which continued through Wednesday night.

BRITISH DIG MORE DEEPLY INTO THE CAMBRAI SECTOR
Important Positions Taken on Four-Mile Front and Old Trenches Regained—German Resistance Stiffens, But Efforts to Ward Off Further Encroachments Fail.
The Germans have markedly stiffened their resistance against the allied armies from the region of Arras to Rheims, but their efforts to ward off further encroachments into the territory they are holding have failed. All along the front the German big guns are violently in action, while the machine guns in vast numbers are being used in front of strategic points which the allies are endeavoring to gain. Nevertheless the British have dug more deeply into the sector southwest of Cambrai, capturing important positions on the four-mile front between the Havrincourt Wood and Peziere, regaining their old trench positions dominating Gouzeaucourt and capturing Gouzeaucourt Wood.

LT. COL. HARBOTTLE REPORTED WOUNDED
Mrs. E. H. Gourlie, 12 Brandon avenue, received a cablegram on Sunday evening announcing that her brother, Lt. Col. C. G. Harbottle, had been wounded. About the same time a letter was received in the city stating that at the time Col. Harbottle was wounded his batman was killed. Lt. Col. Harbottle went overseas with the Western Scots (Victoria). The batman was broken up because he became an instructor of the 4th Battalion in France. He succeeded the late Col. Beckett in command of the 7th Battalion in France.

CURRIE REPLIES TO BORDEN'S MESSAGE
Declares That Recent Victories of Canadian Corps Have Far-Reaching Consequences.
Ottawa, Sept. 9.—Replying to Sir Robert Borden's message of congratulations on recent Canadian victories in France, Sir Arthur Currie, in a message received by the prime minister today, asserts that the victories won by Canadian troops will have far-reaching consequences.

GERMANS MASS GUNS ON ST. GOBAIN MASSIF
Franco-American Troops Reach Line Prepared for Determined Resistance.
American Headquarters between the Ailette and the Aisne, Sept. 9.—The French and American troops have evidently reached a line beyond which the enemy considers they cannot be allowed to advance with safety to his defences, and he has thrown himself against this new line with an energy which discloses the arrival of fresh troops.

GOVERNMENT BUSY ON BOARD FOR C.N.R.
Selection of Directors for the Railway Is Being Made.
COCHRANE MAY GO UP
Will Probably Be Asked to Accept High Office Under Crown.
By a Staff Reporter.
Ottawa, Sept. 9.—The government is busy on the selection of directors for the Canadian Northern. A prominent Montreal man, experienced in the inland navigation service; another Montrealer, prominent in manufacturing, may be asked to join the board. A leading merchant and an active manufacturer of Toronto, conversant with the traffic needs of the west, are also mentioned. Instead of Hon. Frank Cochrane going on the board, he may be asked later on to take a high office under the crown. Representatives of the intercolonial provinces are also being discussed. The grain growers of the west will have a man.

NOTED AVIATOR MADE GENERAL STAFF OFFICER
Lieut.-Col. Bishop Is Gazetted—Other Promotions Announced.
Canadian Associated Press Cable.
London, Sept. 9.—Lieut.-Col. W. A. Bishop is gazetted general staff officer and when Mr. F. C. Culver goes to the artillery staff, Capt. S. E. Gunn, Centre Ontario, and Lieut. A. F. Mullins are gazetted to staff captain's headquarters. Major H. E. Pense of Eastern Ontario, is appointed to the command of a battalion. Major E. W. Macdonald of Alberta, is promoted lieutenant-colonel, and Major A. Cory of the Canadian artillery is also promoted lieutenant-colonel. The following are reported prisoners: Lieut. G. M. Maclean and R. Carleton, Pte. H. G. Jordan.

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CZECHO-SLOVAKS FORM JUNCTION UPON ONON
Washington, Sept. 9.—An encouraging report on the situation in Siberia came today in a cablegram from Vladivostok, dated Sept. 7, from the Czechoslovak leaders there, to Prof. Thomas G. Masaryk, president of the Czechoslovak National Council. The message said: "After a victory over the enemy our armies have effected a junction on the River Onon, south of Chifan, a complete and cordial union. With the new Russian people and the Russian people, and with the allies, our troops are operating in perfect accord. We hope that an allied army will come to the aid of our troops on the Volga front, where they are exhausted by extremely hard fighting. All our soldiers are sending with profound gratitude a greeting to their fathers."

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COMpletely Successful Attack by British Troops Results in Gain of Vantage Point of Substantial Tactical Value.
British Army Headquarters, Evening, Sept. 9.—This morning's attack between Gouzeaucourt and Epehy was completely successful. Considerable resistance was encountered from strong pockets of Germans with machine guns. The attack partook of the character of a reconnaissance in force by strong skirmishing patrols, as a result of which we carried Gouzeaucourt Wood, which lies on high ground to the northwest of the town. This is a vantage point of substantial tactical value, and carries our line nearly straight from the southeast corner of Havrincourt Wood, the major portion of which is now in our possession. The weather is wet and stormy.

CANADIAN CAPTURES
Heavy Guns, Machine Guns, and All Kinds of War Supplies Taken Since Aug. 26.
Canadian Associated Press Cable.
London, Sept. 9.—The Canadian captures since the battle of Arras opened on Aug. 26, include 89 heavy and field guns, two naval guns, six anti-tank guns, 100 machine guns, 22 trench mortars, two searchlights, one helicopter, three wagons, four ambulances, and four partially engaged. Several units of other divisions engaged were identified. Five complete trench systems were broken through. The Canadian casualties were considerably less than the total prisoners taken. On Friday, Ontario patrols stole across the Nord Canal, entering a point in the German lines, found a whole platoon asleep, evidently utterly exhausted.

SEVEN ENEMY AIRMEN DEFEATED BY BRITISH
Raiding in Stormy Weather, Machines Drop Bombs on Germans.
London, Sept. 9.—The official statement on the activities of the British flying forces over the battle zone, issued tonight, says:
"On Sept. 8 the sky was overcast and there were frequent rainstorms with high wind. Our airplanes carried on their work for the artillery with difficulty, and also accomplished a number of reconnaissances and contact patrols. Five tons of bombs were dropped during the day."
"There was no flying at night. The activity of the enemy's machines was very slight, but we brought down five and drove two down out of control. None of our machines are missing."

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AUSTRIANS IN FLIGHT.
Italian Patrols Get Better of Encounters With Enemy.
Rome, Sept. 9.—The war office communication issued tonight follows:
"North of the Chiasso our patrols put to flight hostile guards, capturing their arms. An enemy surprise attack on Monte Corno was put down by our assaulting parties, who pursued the enemy, inflicting losses on him."

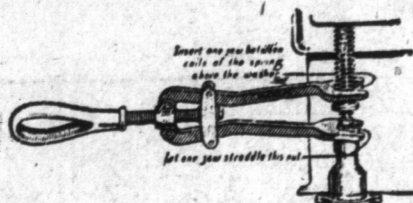

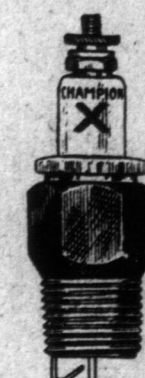

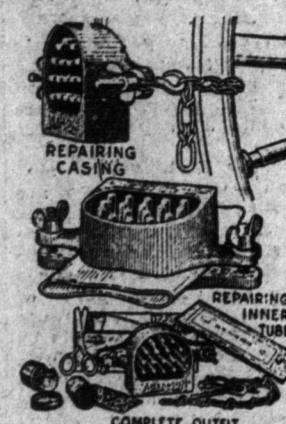

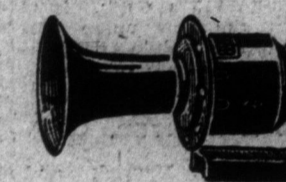

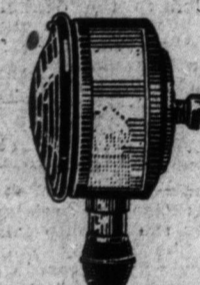

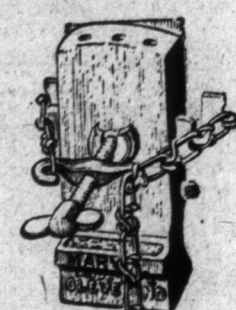

NEWS OF LABOR

WANT CLOSE UNION AND HIGHER WAGES

Stationary Firemen Not Satisfied With Present Conditions and Seek Change

Trades union stationary firemen in Toronto are asking for close union conditions, and also 50 cents an hour. They claim that at present they are receiving 25 cents a day less than street cleaners.

It is noteworthy that many stationary firemen now in Toronto are not affiliated with trades unions, and a number of them belong to the Canadian Society of Stationary Engineers, an association which is opposed in principle to the general plan of trades unionism.

WOULD FORM UNION TO INCREASE WAGES

Elevator men and porters throughout Toronto are considering the advisability of organizing themselves into a regularly accredited trades union. It is understood that an open meeting with this end in view will be held at the Labor Temple toward the close of this week.

The men believe that their present wages are inadequate. The wages range from \$10 to \$15 a week. It is understood that the new union will formulate a wage schedule with a maximum wage of \$22 a week and a minimum of \$18 a week.

BOARD APPOINTED

Judge Snider, J. G. Merrick and Fred Bancroft have been appointed a board of arbitration under the Industrial Disputes Act to attempt a settlement of the trouble between the plumbers' union and the two shipyards, the Polsons and the Toronto.

BARBERS ON STRIKE

Eighty barbers have gone out on strike in Toronto for a minimum wage of \$20 a week. Ten barbers have so far acceded to the demands for this schedule.

LIUT.-COL. GEORGE TO LEAVE THE ARMY

Lieut.-Col. James George, assistant adjutant-general for the Toronto military district, will be shortly ordered back to civil life owing to pressure of business. Col. George has had 23 years' military service.

COMFORT SHIPMENTS

Mrs. Arthur Van Koughnet, convener of the Soldiers' Comforts of the Women's Patriotic League, reports for the past two weeks the following shipments overseas: The Canadian Field Comforts Commission, 1,851 pairs socks, 150 service shirts, 100 towels, 38 suits pajamas, 30 stretchers, 14 wash clothes, 48 handkerchiefs, 4 pneumonia jackets, 18 hot water bottles covers, 18 bandages, 54 gauze suits, 47 gray bags, 5 pair slippers, 1 helmet and a quantity of tobacco, chocolate, gum, soap, stationery, maple sugar, foot powder, cigarettes, raisins, dates, 20 individual parcels for soldiers and a special shipment of 10,000 portfolios, 1,340 lbs. overseas chocolates and 10,000 cartons assorted biscuits were also sent within the week.

HURRY-UP CALL ISSUED

A hurry-up call has been sent out for instrument men, blacksmiths, carpenters, shoemakers, bridgemen, teamsters, draughtsmen and tailors to reinforce the Canadian railway troops in France. Category B2 men of class one, as well as men of other classes up to 45 years of age, can volunteer for this service.

LORD SHAUGHNESSY VISITS LEASIDE

Big C. P. R. Layout Probable in Toronto's Northeast Suburb.

A FIFTY-ACRE TRACT

Would Give Ample Room in Area Purchased for Tracks and Shops.

The high command of the Canadian Pacific—the men whose word is final and whose visit presages matters of importance—came to Toronto yesterday and, if all signs do not fail, the big railway company, realizing that the time has come when the city's needs in the matter of transportation must be considered, are preparing to lay out a big new layout for that road south of the National Railways (C. N. R.) lay-out immediately to the north, outlined by the map in the World some three weeks ago.

At present the C. P. R. has a narrow track yard on the north side of their line between themselves and a new layout of the C. N. R.; but it is more than likely that these C. P. R. tracks will be moved to the south of the property that they now own and use, and a strip of 40 odd acres further east that they have secured from the Canadian Northern included in the bounds of North Toronto town, and extending from the C. P. line up the Don Valley to Leaside and south of the station and tracks almost up to the Davies property. In a word, the National Railways would have yards and the Canadian Pacific a similar layout on the south side, a double track yard of a hundred acres with main signals on the C. P. R.'s main line, and these two layouts would later on constitute the East Toronto station of a still larger national system.

As far as the World can learn there will be a lot of joint operation between the two systems. Harris, president of the company, in May, 1912, that plans had been made to remove the plant to the Ashbridge's Bay district, and the Danforth Glue Estate were informed that they need not worry about any nuisance.

ANALYSIS IS GIVEN OF CITY'S REVENUE

The Toronto Bureau of Municipal Research in its analysis of the city budget for 1918 says that the money to meet the expenditure of the city of \$24,177,720, comes from the following sources in these proportions: General tax, 37.3 per cent. School tax, 17.5 per cent. Waterworks revenue, 9.8 per cent. Street railway, 4.1 per cent. Provincial war tax, 2.5 per cent. Civic war tax, 17.5 per cent. Each dollar of the taxes is distributed as follows: Health, 10.3 cents; highways, 12.3 cents; education, 22.8 cents; recreation, 2.2 cents; charities and correction, 5.5 cents; war expenditures, 25.2 cents; general government, 7.2 cents; protection, 18.5 cents.

CAPTAIN JOHNSON HONORED.

The Croix de Guerre has been awarded Capt. Arthur J. Johnson, son of Dr. A. Johnson, the Toronto surgeon. Capt. Johnson joined the British army when the war started, and was recommended for the war decoration by a French general, who had noted his conspicuous bravery while serving as commander of a battery of artillery. He was born in Toronto 30 years ago.

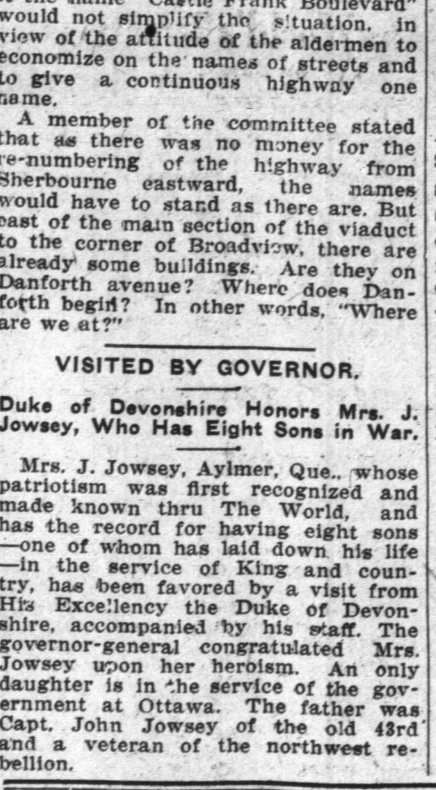
