IMMIGRATION FELL OFF.

The report of the Department of the Interior for 1896 will show somewhat of a falling off in immigration and settlement as compared with 1895. It also shows a reduction in revenue from land sales and like sources amounting to \$32,361. The net cash receipts on account of Dominion lands were \$166,28, as compared with \$198,617 for the previous year. In addition to the cash receipts, however, scrip to the amount of \$53,185 was taken in payment for land and rents, as against \$31,897 in scrip received during 1895. The timber dues received during 1895. The timber dues received during the last fiscal year amounted to \$61,923, as against \$74,079 the previous year. Homestead and inspection fees yielded \$20,438, compared with \$29,664. There was, however, an increase of \$9080 in cash sales of Government lands, the amount received being \$46,373, as against \$37,293 during 1895.

The expenditure last year on account of Dominion lands amounted to \$119,184, chargeable to income, besides \$22,184 on capital account.

The returns for Manitoba, the Northwest and British Columbia show the arrivals to be 6206 for 1896, and 5371 for 1895.

The origin of the fire was to be ascribed to a shot fired by John Tisdale under the barn to kill a skunk. They also arranged the irons of the implements to look as if they had fallen off the machines as they were burned. Dave Ballard also brought some straw and placed it in position. He had first committed arson by firing his barn, and then added perjury to it. He denied positively ever being offered money if he would give such evidence as would convict these prisoners.

Tisdale, a young man 19 years of age, described the trip to Jackson's burned barn after the old iron and the other events of the night of the fire down to the story of the shot fired at a skunk under the barn. 


