GRAND CHAPTER MEETING.

The Election of Officers in Capitulary Masonry AND VALUABLE SUGGESTIONS

Wise Counsel Offered in the Address of the Grand Principal.

A Liberal Donation for the Endowment of a "Grand Chapter" Cot in the Masonic Ward at the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto—The Annual Meeting to be Again Held in This City Next Year—List of Superintendents.

The annual convocation of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Canada was held at the Masonic Hall, Toronto-street, yesterday. This being the first meeting held since the revision of the constitution, which changed the date of meeting from July to January, great interest was attached to the proceedings. For many years the Grand Chapter has met at the same place and during the same week as the Grand Lodge A. F. and A. M., and the experiment of holding Grand Chapter meetings at a different time and place has, as was anticipated at the time the constitution was changed, proved a great success. The companions being freed from the business of Grand Lodge, were enabled to give undivided attention to the business before them.

The chair was occupied by Most Excellent Companion John Ross Robertson, Grand Z, who was supported by J. H. Comp. M. Wash, H., and W. E. Reid, J.

The report of the Credential Committee showed that of 95 chapters under the jurisdiction of the Grand Chapter, 23 were unrepresented. One hundred and twenty-seven delegates were present, being an increase over the attendance of last year.

GRAND Z'S ADDRESS.

The address of the Grand Z was comprehensive in its nature and will form an important record in the history of the operations of Capitulary Masonry was covered and the address contained many instructive comments upon the work of the past year, as well as valuable suggestions for the future. A DAILY PAY ROLL OF \$3000

British Columbia Government is Making a Good Thing in Fees.

Who is Trying to Sell the British Public Shares in a B. C. Mine Not Registered in That Province?—It is Either a Feast or a Famine in Rossland—Charlie Mackintosh Goes into Mining, as Also Does Tom Daly—The Production of Nickel—General Mining Topics.

Last week The World published an article showing that there are now in the Slocan silver country 38 mines that have shipped or are actually shipping ore, and that the number would likely be increased to 75 before the year is out. And to-day further information regarding the section is to hand. According to The Western Miner there are at present, as far as can be ascertained, 883 men employed in the Slocan mines. At the customary rate of \$300 a day, the total daily pay roll of the district amounts to over \$3000. Following is a list of the working mines, with the number of men employed in each: Slocan Star, 100; Ruth, 10; Wonderful, 15; Last Chance, 12; Ecco, 45; Goodenough, 15; Noble Five, 50; R. E. Lee, 12; Payne, 45; Slocan Boy, 15; Washington, 40; Best, 12; Rambler, 15; Wellington, 25; Northern Belle, 35; Phoenix, 12; Roslette, 6; Cordelia, 6; Idaho, Alamo, Cumberland, 45; Queen Bess, 12; Mountain Chief, 15; Northern Belle No. 2, 10; Reed-Tenderfoot, 10; Ivanhoe, 8; Galena Farm, 25; Enterprise, 25; Ruby Silver, 8; Blue Bird, 4; Colinh Group, 8; Fisher Maiden, 8; Thompson Group, 6; Miscellaneous, 60.

No. of Claims Staked. The number of claims staked out in Slocan since 1890 is 3743, taken up as follows: 119 in 1891, 433 in 1892, 295 in 1893, 270 in 1894, 633 in 1895, and 1685 in 1896.

The volume of business done by the Government recorder's office has been very large, these transactions having been made during the past year. No. of certificates of assessment work, 739; No. of certificates of improvements, 27; No. of bills of sale, 170; No. of bonds, 198; No. of cash payments made in lieu of work, 12; No. of abandonments of claims, 25.

A Revenue of \$90,000. For every document recorded relating to mining, a fee of \$2.50 is paid and an extra charge of thirty cents a folio is made for all instruments containing more than 500 words. It is estimated that at least 2500 miners' licenses were issued from the Denver office during the year. The Provincial Government, upon the basis of these figures, received in 1896 an amount of \$90,000 from the New Denver office alone. This does not include the poll tax, which is levied annually from every miner in the district, and the assessment on ore shipments, which is consequently a very considerable sum.

One mine alone, the Slocan Star, has paid into the public treasury as high as \$500 a month under the ore assessment Act.

ONE SHIPMENTS. It Takes Time to Prove That Kootenay Contains Wealth.

Those mines in the Kootenay district which have progressed to an advanced stage of development are getting down to such a solid basis that there cannot remain any doubt as to the actual wealth of the country. In Rossland camp it is announced that both the Le Roi and the Josie will henceforth ship ore at the rate of a ton a day. In the Slocan the Slocan Star is sending 22 tons per day to the smelter. Doubtless the next few months will make other properties in both Trail Creek and the Slocan just as big shippers and just as valuable mines as the above.

ROSSLAND NEWS. Western Union Telegraph Company to Enter the Kootenay.

Rossland and other British Columbia camps are to have additional telegraph facilities. The Western Union is to enter the Kootenay at an early date, so it is announced from the west. Treasurer Tom Nolan of the Rossland Mines' Union, No. 28, is said to have defaulted with \$570 of the society's funds. Diphtheria has broken out in Rossland. The fire brigade had netted a balance to the good of \$118. A chess and checkers tournament is in progress in the camp. It is understood that the price paid by the C. P. R. for the Columbia and Kootenay Navigation Company's boats was between \$300,000 and \$350,000. A new steamer is to be built. Lily May, with seven men at work, has 47 feet down a good body of ore. Trains are now arriving at and leaving the new Red Mountain depot. The Rosslander is advocating the appointment of an inspector of mines to protect the miners against accident, etc.

ROSSLAND WILL BE HURT Unless Fake Mining Concerns are Checked.

According to the latest advice, some person is endeavoring to sell to the English public shares in a Rossland mine which is not registered in British Columbia. If someone is selling stock in a mine which is not registered in British Columbia, the reputation will be injured. London. The Rosslander says: "A Rossland man who has been represented to him as owning claim about three and a half miles from Rossland. The Londoner had thought it so good that he bought \$5000 shares before making any enquiries. An examination of the list of all the mining companies incorporated in British Columbia does not reveal one of any name of the kind, which is it possible that the Ego may be registered under the Imperial Act."

FEAST OR FAMINE. Rossland Made a Slaughter Market for Goats.

The sick run by retail dealers, the night feeds and make their business one of great worry and uncertainty. One of the evils those in business have to contend against is the throwing on the market of job lots of all kinds of goods. For a day or

two there is a scarcity of butter, and three or four, who are not usually in the business, are beginning to hoard themselves post haste for a carload of butter. It all arrives at once, a couple of days after the regular dealers, who, foreseeing the scarcity, has ordered in advance. The job lots must be sold, whether at a living profit or not, because roads were bad and it was next to impossible to have it hauled from Northport. Several ordered lots of speculation, with the result that it goes begging at \$22, which is about as low as it ever reaches. It was the same with regard to chickens a fortnight ago. There was a dearth of them. Then the next week there was waste.

YANCOUVER SHELTER
Now Likely to be Built in the Near Future.

The Proposed Island Railway.
Editor World: Aid. Hallam is certainly correct in insisting on the land damage question being settled before the city determines upon committing itself to an island railway. We are anxious to weigh out all particulars of what it will cost and how the bridge and its maintenance are financed. It seems to be taken for granted that the bridge will cost \$200,000. The interest on this sum at 4 per cent. is \$8,000; add to this the expenditure of maintenance, and the total land damage should be \$10,000. The city's and the province's responsibility ought to be clear. If any matter is to be referred to the building of a road before the city's consent is given, it is necessary to require on the subject of land damage, a law to refer the matter to the Don Improvement, the grading of College-street, and the Dundas-street bridge. When the cost is fully ascertained, it will be time enough to ask the citizens whether they consider it advisable to have so much money for the use of a public utility for the next three or four months of each year. It seems a matter of little consequence to have the superior funds out of which the cost of the bridge is to be met, and the city to be an unwise one. The question should be whether the advantage to be gained is commensurate with the cost. The Mayor and corporation should ascertain definitely the cost before they commit the taxpayers to so expensive an undertaking.
