LATEST NEWS FROM DAWSON

New York Press Correspondent Gives Interesting Details.

Many Seekers for Gold Have Been Very Much Disappointed—Glad to Get Back to Their Old Haunts With Dreams Dispelled—And Yet There is Wealth in the Klondike Country.

New York, July 21.—A special correspondent of The Press sends the following to his paper:

On board steamship Rosok, off Seattle, July 18.—This treasure ship was to have had \$5,000,000 in gold dust in her hold, and has only \$1,200,000.

The Press expedition, going the entire distance over the ice from Dyea, arrived in Dawson on May 1. The Klondike extra of The Press, which carried, led Dawson with that which Dawson most hungered for—the news. A nugget valued at \$21 was paid for the first copy sold.

MICHIPICOTON VERY RICH

Quartz That Glitters With Free Gold.

One Man Who is Enthusiastic Over This Mining Field—Putting Up Primitive Home-Made Stamp Mills to Pound Out the Metal—Other News.

"Michipicoton is the greatest mining camp in America. During the past ten years I have been in almost every mining centre on this continent, and there is more gold in the surface in Michipicoton than I ever saw in any other camp."

These words were addressed to The World yesterday by Mr. T. F. Drew, formerly of Newark, N.J., of Cripple Creek, California, Rosland, and a score of other camps, and now of the new Ontario gold fields mentioned above.

It was last fall that Mr. Drew first went into Michipicoton. He remained there during the winter, and he has come out with a splendid assortment of gold-bearing specimens.

Mr. Drew asserts that Michipicoton is going to prove the "mining sensation of this era"—and that within the next twelve months there are now several hundred men in the district and preliminary development work is going ahead in good shape.

As to the reported existence of placer gold in Michipicoton, Mr. Drew says that he has found quartz which contains gold all right, but in no case have the deposits been tested by sinking to bed rock.

Those Halliburton Deposits. Mr. Drew and Keith has just returned from another visit to the quartz and placer gold deposits which he some time ago brought to the attention of the public through the columns of The World.

Mr. Keith brought back with him a piece of nice looking ore from one of his quartz ledges, which he says is 35 feet wide, traceable for two miles, and goes from the Township of Elzevir, in gold. Mr. Roy was left on the property to continue his investigations into his work.
