

BOCAVE CAPTURED.

American Army Advanced Yesterday Morning and Drove the Insurgents Back Three Miles. Manila, March 29 .- (Noon.)-The Ameri-

can army advanced at 6 o'clock this mornsweeping onward three miles before

can army advanced at 6 o clock this borning, sweeping onward three miles before 10 o'clock and driving the rebels beyond Bocave, to the east of Bulacan and on the railroad leading to Malolos.

Our troops met with but slight resistance.

The Filipinos fired volleys yesterday evening for the purpose of drawing the American fire and disclosing the locality of our positions. Two men of the Pennsylvania Regiment and one man belonging to the Dakota Regiment were wounded. The Americans remained silent.

The country between Marilao and Manila presents a picture of desolation. Smoke is curling from hundreds of ash heaps and the remains of trees and fences torn by shrapnel are to be seen everywhere. The general appearance of the country is as if it had been swept by a cyclone. The roads are strewn with furniture and clothing dropped in flight by the Filipinos. The only people remaining behind are a few aged persons, too infirm to escape. They camp beside the ruins of their former homes and beg passers-by for any kind of assistance. The majority of them are living on the generosity of our soldiers, who give them portions of their rations. The dogs of the Filipinos cower in the bushes, still terrified and barking, while hundreds of pigs are to be seen busily searching for food.

Bodies of dead Filipinos are stranded in

food.

Bodies of dead Filipinos are stranded in the shallows of the river or are resting in the jungle, where they crawled to die or were left in the wake of the hurriedly-retreating army. These bodies give forth a horribie odor, but there is no time at present to bury them.

The inhabitants who fied from Marilao and Moycauayan left in such a panic that on the tables our soldiers found spread money and valuables and in the rooms were trunks containing other property of value. This was the case in most of the houses deserted. They were not molested by the American soldiers, but the Chinese, who slip in between the armies, are looting when they can. They have taken possession of several houses and over them raised Chinese flags, some of which were torn down.

R., chairman of the court of inquiry.



The "Giant" is a full claim, situated in the north belt, just outside the Rossland city limits. 

Taking flour and wheat together, the receipts for the week were less than in the same week last Season. Some Western authorities claim that farmers in the Northwest are showing a disposition to hold on to the balance of their crop for higher prices. They claim that the greater part of the month's deliveries has come from interior elevators. This can hardly be the case, as the receipts of wheat at Minneapolis and Duluth for the first three weeks in March were 8,000,000 bushels, during which time Bradstreet's shows a reduction of only 750,000 bushels at interior elevators.

In the early part of the season The World estimated that three of the important wheat importing countries of Europe (Germany, Beigium and Holland) would probably require about the same quantity of foreign wheat during the crop year 1898-99 as they fild during 1897-98. The Corn Trade News, March 14, shows that the shipments to three countries during the 32 weeks up to March 11 have been 70,170,000 bushels, as compared with 68,280,000 bushels in the same weeks of last year.

In the first five months, Aug. 1 to Dec. 31, In the first five months, Aug. 1 to Dec. 31, the importing countries on the Continent purchased foreign wheat much more freely than the United Kingdom, the shipments to the former exceeding those to the latter by about 5,000,000 bushels. This was owing to the rather small deliveries of native wheat. During the period, Jan. 1 to March 11, the relative position has changed, the shipments to United Kingdom, Aug. 1 to March 11, exceeding those to the whole of the Continent by over 3,000,000 bushels, the totals now being 121,000,000 bushels to United Kingdom, 118,000,000 to the Continent. The requirements for all Europe for the last 20 weeks of the season are estimated at 125,000,000 bushels, or 6,250,000 bushels per week. It is generally accepted that the supply will largly exceed this, so that the future of prices will mainly depend on the views of European dealers as to the values at which they will be willing to purchase wheat for increasing the stocks to be carried over into next season, and these views will be determined by the promise for next year's world's crop.

Opinions on U. S. Wheat.

Several estimates of the condition of winter wheat in the United States are being published in Western grain papers. The Chicago Daily Bulletin says that conservative authorities are predicting that the Government report, to be published April 10, will show a condition around 80 per cent. This condition, on the reported acreage, would indicate a yield of 390,000,000 bushels This is exactly the quantity estimated by Government for winter wheat crop of 180s.

The winter has been one of the most severed ing to a special report of The American Agriculturist, to appear in its issue of April 1. The ground everywhere has been frozen to a depth beyond all precedent, and to accentuate this condition, snow protection has been very limited. Except in the extreme southern part of the belt the last week of March brings no appearance of spring growth, and it is apparent that damage has been in keeping with the severe character of the season. The report for the whole crop shows a preliminary estimated condition of some approximate the actual situation. But in the northern and more important districts the advent of April weather may change the returns.

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
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
