Pranks of Merry Hazers

Light on Treatment of University of Illinois Freshmen by Sophs.

ALL TAKEN WITH GOOD HUMOR

Stories of Brutally Exaggerated-Missouri University to Punish Hazers.

Champaign, Ill., Oct. 3.—Further inquiry into the hazing at the University of Illinois shows that while there has been some truth in the stories sent out there has been much exaggeration.

It seems that the sophomore have had for several years a set of regulations for the conduct of the freshmen, but that there has never been any serious attempt to enforce them by hazing or any other method.

The carrying of canes and the wearing of mistachos are two of the privileges denied the freshmen, but there have been so many violations of the rules that they seem to have been considered of no importance by upper class men.

Protests from Massachusetts attracted the attention of the upper class men by the peculiar beauty of his mistachos, and the sophs goad that he was surrounded Thursday night by a crowd of sophs, who avowed their intention of punishing him.

The freshman happened to be arrested, and tried his revolver into the two or three times. He was promptly released by his captors, and has not been arrested since.

Friday night an athletic hazing meeting, a freshman was dumped into the university, a small crowd hazing him in the university grounds which consisted of a large hole in the ground two inches, but except for his clothing he was unharmed.

Stories are current, also impossible of verification, that almost every night two or three freshmen have been rolled into the water by the sophs.

A fraternal crowd initiating a candidate was accused by a freshman who took the night and promptly retaliated by taking the freshman to the bonnyard creek and tossing him in the mud, from which he rose with the persistent slang remark that he was "all in."

So far all the pranks have been harmless and have been accompanied by the best of humor on both sides. The matter is not considered so far as the university authorities, so far as can be learned.

All the hazing is, of course, leading up to and preparatory to the big annual color rush between the freshmen and sophs, which is scheduled for this year for Oct. 12, and the only probable effect will be to make that event more than usually interesting.

WILL PUNISH ALL HAZERS

St. Louis, Oct. 3.—President R. H. Jesse of the Missouri State University today denounced in strongest terms the hazing of freshmen by the sophomore students, which was reported in the press to-day.

"No effort will be spared to discover the identity of the students who committed this outrage, and the punishment will be adequate to the offense. I will urge the expulsion of every university student who took any part in the stripping and whipping of freshmen."

"Our institutions rank with those of any other section of the world. We are to be destroyed internally by the rotten microbes of hazing. Not if Missouri knows it, and the old state is a handsome upright, plane second to none in the world, and after midnight a pack of scamps. I will leave tonight for Columbia, where I will immediately take this matter up."

It is just possible that this act of hazing at our college may prove good thing for the school. I fear there has been a certain sentiment favoring hazing among certain of the students for several years, and prompt and adequate punishment of those misdoers will undoubtedly have the effect of crushing out the foolish movement before it has gained much strength."

COMPLAINTS ABOUT CARS

Mayor Asks Engineer for Opinion on Regulations Recently Introduced.

ENGINEER ASKS FOR \$11,400 EXTRA

University's Offer to Extend Dun- can and Pearl Streets is Accepted.

The Mayor is apparently waking up a little bit upon the way the Street Railway Company is playing tag with the city, and the all-round condemnation which the people have passed upon the recent changes made by the company in the service is echoed in the following letter, which the Mayor has written and forwarded to the City Engineer:

"I have received complaints from several citizens and have myself experienced inconveniences caused by some new regulations which have been adopted by the Toronto Railway Company reducing the number of cars on various routes, increasing their speed and decreasing the time limit at stoppages. It is highly desirable that a course should be taken which would place the city in a position to give effect to your opinion and that of Council. I have, therefore, to request that you report regulations for the service of cars and particularly desire your opinion as to the regulation recently introduced by the company.

The Engineer is getting pointers on how to treat street cars, and the Mayor is getting other municipal matters at a municipal convention in Niagara Falls. He is expected to return to Toronto on Saturday.

Engineer is Broke. The City Engineer is broke for money for general purposes. He has, up and now in his report to the Works Committee he says that to carry out his plan will be necessary to provide \$11,400 in addition to the original appropriation. The extra cost includes cedar block repairs \$300, stone \$300, masonry \$200, tools and repairs \$300, stone and wooden cranes \$250, maintenance of cranes \$200, etc.

This little total is the fruit of the law that the city is now paying for the street cars. It will doubtless be the request for the balance of the year.

The Engineer points out that the additional money for scavenging is necessary to carry out his plan. The scavenger's work is not done by the city, but by a private contractor. The Engineer's plan is to have the scavenger's work done by the city.

Explanatory Note. The Engineer is the author of the report on the street cars. He is the one who has been asked to report on the regulations recently introduced by the Toronto Railway Company.

Hard up is the tenor of the comment on the report adopted by the Board of Control in dealing with the estimates in reference to the street cars. The Mayor is not in a position to give effect to the Engineer's plan. He is hard up for money.

CITY HALL ILLUMINATIONS.

C. C. Holland Explains His Plan for the Decorations.

C. C. Holland, the Montreal man who has the contract to illuminate the City Hall for the royal reception, started in on the decorations yesterday. It was understood that he was to submit plans to the committee this morning, but he evidently has plans arranged for the display of 2500 lights on the building, and it is decided to illuminate the tower, he says he can do it and start as soon as the instruction is given.

At the east end of the building over the window of the Mayor's office will be a crown 10 feet in diameter. It will be made of 160 lights. Red, white and blue shields in various designs will be placed in between the maple leaves.
