

PRIMATE OF ALL ENGLAND DEAD AGED ARCHBISHOP PASSES AWAY

Funeral Will Take Place on Saturday at Noon in Canterbury Cathedral.

London, Dec. 23.—The Archbishop of Canterbury passed away quite peacefully at 8.15 o'clock in the presence of his wife and two sons. His death was anticipated for some days, and only the Archbishop's remarkable vitality enabled him to contravert his extreme weakness. The final collapse occurred about 6 o'clock, and he was unconscious towards the end. The primate died of old age.

The pathetic scene in Westminster Abbey at the coronation of King Edward was one of the earlier indications of his failing strength. Then came the collapse in the House of Lords at the conclusion of a vigorous speech in support of the education bill. He had not left his bed since.

The Bishop of Winchester is considered likely to be his successor. The funeral of the Archbishop will take place Saturday at noon in Canterbury Cathedral. Mr. White, the United States Charge d'Affaires, was among the callers at the Archbishop's palace today.

At the time of Dr. Temple's appointment to the Primate's English peerage, speaking of him, said: "The appointment of the Bishop of London to the Episcopal See of Canterbury crowns a career of singular variety. In the average churchman had in the chair of St. Augustine he would have laid to scorn the idea of holding a position more improbable than that of one of the authors of 'Essays and Reviews' should, become Archbishop of Canterbury. But what was then the unexpected has now happened, and the great relief and satisfaction of those who recognize the peculiar difficulties which at present surround the church."

Frederick Temple was the son of the late Major Temple, Lieutenant of the 1st Regiment of Foot Guards, and was born on Nov. 30, 1821. He was educated at Blundell's School, Tiverton, and the "Eton of the West," as it was called, a more distinguished dignitary of the church. From Blundell's he went up with a scholarship to Eton, where he took a double first, and attained the still higher distinction of a fellowship. His time at Oxford was not unfruitful, being described as the golden age of faith.

SKELTON HOLDS SECRET. CRUSHED UNDER ENGINE.

Found in Kingston, Napped Up in a Large Box.

Kingston, Dec. 23.—In a building in the business part of the city, near the post-office, a skeleton was found. It is that of a woman, and was found in a large box. It has probably been there for a great many years. The skull had been splintered and is almost crumbling to dust. The fact that the body is now almost all rotted away, and was for many years under police surveillance, leads to the supposition that a murder was committed there. In the box was a piece of paper, on which were written the initials "H. B." and in typewritten type, "Years, Address Prince Street." The rest of the message had been obliterated long since.

Neophyte in College Society Was Nearly Killed.

Madison, Wis., Dec. 23.—Seven students of the University of Wisconsin had an initiation in the back room of the saloon under the Venue Hotel here last night. The ceremony consisted in the hanging of the neophyte, who was then deserted by his fellows, and would soon have died except for the timely arrival of the barkeeper, who came in to take away the glasses. The students came early in the evening and told the saloonkeeper that they intended to hold an initiation, and that he must not be alarmed if they made considerable noise. After disposing of a considerable quantity of beer, the neophyte was taken, a rope placed around his neck, and a white towel tied around his head, and he was hung from a hook in the ceiling. The remaining six then left, whether so intoxicated as to forget their comrade or purposely is not known. The timely arrival of the barkeeper saved the young man's life. Upon the table lay a Bible, which had evidently figured in the initiation. It bore the name of William D. Eaton, a certificate of confirmation signed by Bishop Nicholson of Milwaukee at Kenosha last June. The university authorities and police will prosecute a vigorous inquiry into the matter, and deal with the offenders.
