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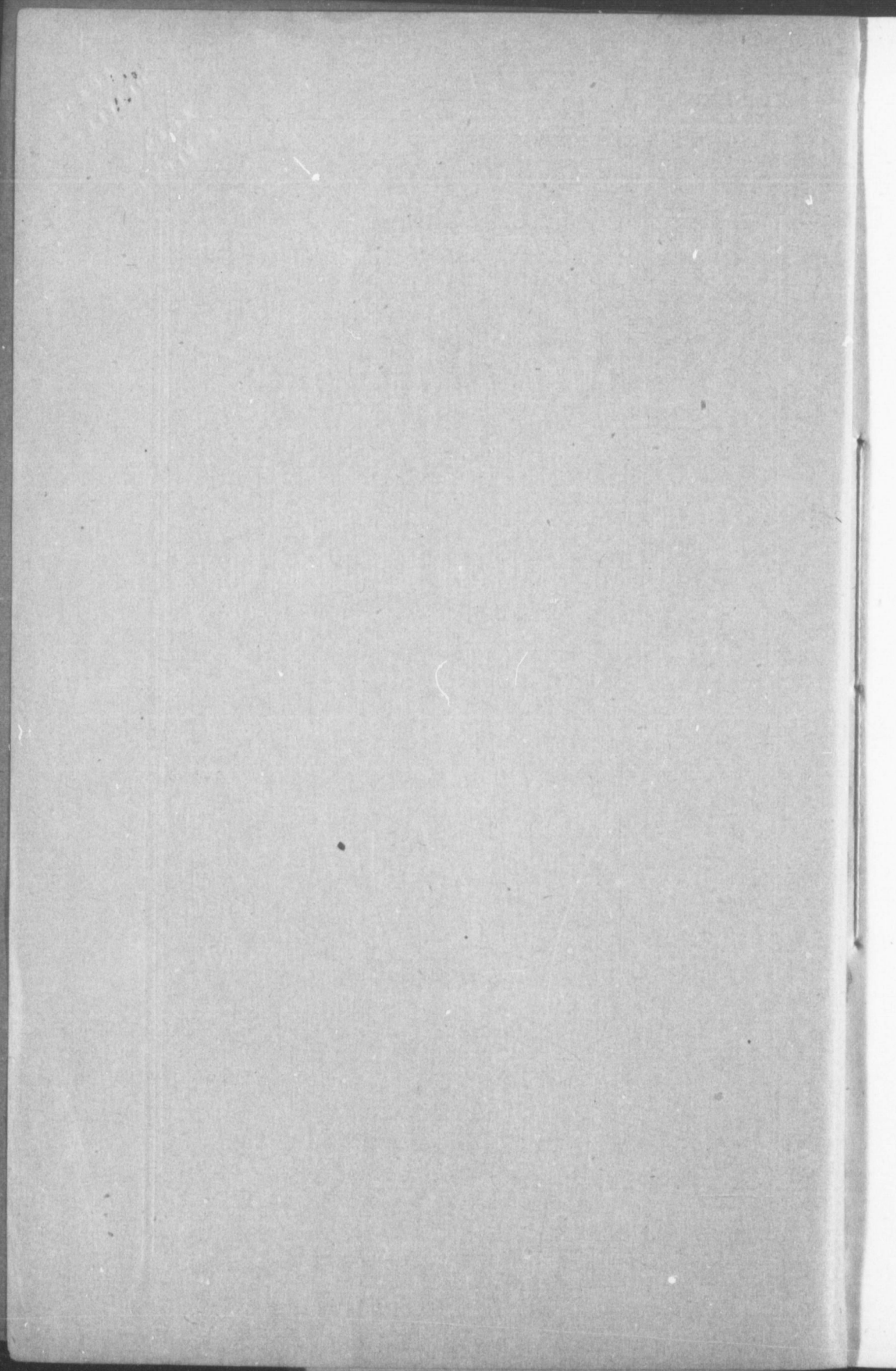

ANNUAL MEETING,

February 16th, 1881.

The Annual Meeting of the Grande Ligne Evangelical Society was held in the parlors of the First Baptist Church. In the absence of the President, the Rev. Dr. Clarke was called to the chair.

The minutes of the previous Annual Meeting were read and accepted.

An abstract of the Annual Report was read by Mr. Lafleur, and accepted, subject to revision by the officers in charge.

The Financial Report was then read by the Treasurer. It showed a very satisfactory state of things as the result of exertions of some of the missionaries in their collections—of the new and efficient agent appointed, Rev. Mr. Griffin—and also of the Ladies' Associations in Canada and the United States.

It was moved by Mr. D. Bentley, and seconded by Mr. Lafleur, That the cordial thanks of this Society be and are hereby tendered to the Rev. Joshua Denovan, of Toronto, Ont., for the great interest and sympathy he has ever shown in the welfare of this Mission, and especially by his attendance and participation in the dedication services of the Feller Institute at Grande Ligne in July last, also for his efforts in securing a large portion of the furnishings for the various rooms in the new building. Also, to the Ladies' Associations in Montreal and Brooklyn, for their valuable aid, not only in the general work of the Mission, but especially in the furnishing of the Feller Institute. The motion was unanimously carried.

On motion it was resolved that copies of the above resolution be sent to the various parties mentioned therein.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

Evangelical Society of La Grande Ligne.

In the spiritual, as in the material world there are years when the harvest does not correspond to the amount of labor bestowed on the seed sown. This year, 1880, has been to us such a period. It has seemed to us that in no previous year in the history of the Mission have the missionaries labored more faithfully or more assiduously for the Master. Fields that had been more or less neglected in the pressure of other work have had this year a thorough visiting, and still in our eyes the results are but meagre. We are confident, however, that these labors, imperfect as they have been, will not be vain in the Lord. We look upon the past year as one of preparation for future blessed results. It may be that, though working for the Lord in His name, and, we trust, in His Spirit, we have had too large a proportion of external activity, necessitated by the nature of the work itself.

The Association of our little churches, which met at Grande Ligne on the last day of June, brought before us part of the work accomplished then and the measures adopted for its prosecution during the next six months. Since then the fields of St. Constant, La Pigeonnière and St. Isidore have been the especial care of Brother Therrien, with an occasional visit from Mr. Lafleur. Mr. Roussy's failing health rendered it necessary also for those brethren to go often to Grande Ligne to supply the pulpit on Sunday. Brother Riendeau has been often called to visit some of the stations,

especially South Ely, where he had the superintendence of a house being built for the resident missionary. Part of the time of the now two oldest missionaries, Messrs. Riendeau and Lafleur, was taken up in providing means to carry on the work, one of them collecting in Great Britain until the end of March last, and the other visiting in the fall several cities in the United States. Mr. Therrien had also a little of the same kind of work to do in the Valley of the Ottawa, where he had at the same time the opportunity of making known the Gospel to several French Canadian families; and where a most interesting work has already sprung up which caused a second visit from him of a very promising character.

Three of our students who are studying at McGill College have also helped us in the work of evangelization with much acceptance and readiness, but at times to the prejudice of their studies. One of them, Mr. Bracq, has besides borne a considerable part of the burden of collecting in several cities and churches of New England.

Early in the spring the annual examinations took place in the Institute.

But the brightest day of our missionary record of last year was that of the dedication of the Feller Institute at Grande Ligne on the 1st of July. We may be allowed to quote somewhat extensively what was written then.

Our dear old missionary, though very much enfeebled then by sickness, was able to be present for more than an hour at the dedication services. His benign and distinguished countenance shone with heavenly beauty as he remembered that forty years before, the house we now call the "Old Mission House" was, with overwhelming joy and gratitude, also consecrated to the service of Him who sent both Madame Feller and Mr. Roussy here to begin this great work. The crowding memories of those eventful years often suffused his eyes with tears on that day. After that he only lingered for four months when he was unexpectedly called away.

The Rev. Mr. Therrien has written a biographical notice which we here insert, as we would also if space permitted a memorial sermon preached by Rev. Mr. Lafleur in the First Baptist Church in Montreal.

THE LATE REV. LOUIS ROUSSY

OF GRANDE LIGNE MISSION.

It is not without feelings of deep regret that we record the death of the last of the three pioneer French missionaries of Canada. Madame Henriette Feller died twelve years ago, leaving behind her a name which future generations will rise to bless; Miss Sophie Jonte died a year ago, after forty-one years' faithful labor in the Master's cause; and now death has visited us again and bereft us of one whose name will be held in sacred remembrance by every one who knew him, and especially by every French Canadian Protestant.

Rev. Louis Roussy, born in the Canton de Vaud, Switzerland, died at Grande Ligne, in the sixty-ninth year of his age, leaving behind him to mourn his loss, no wife and children—for he was never married—but a large number of friends and brethren in the Gospel, who held him in the highest esteem and cherished for him the warmest affection.

When Canada was without one known French Protestant, when schools were very few and far between, and when spiritual darkness covered the land as a pall, Mr. Roussy and Madame Feller left their own beautiful country to come to ours, bringing with them the seed of the Gospel, which they scattered broadcast in this not altogether uncongenial soil, and from which has sprung up an abundant harvest, many precious sheaves of which they were permitted to reap before they went to their celestial reward.

Converted to Christ when very young, Mr. Roussy early in life felt his heart drawn out toward the work of missions. When a mere boy he read much about heathen nations, and he would say to his pious mother, "When I am old enough I will go, and preach the Gospel to these people." At the age of nineteen he commenced a work of colportage in France which he carried on with much zeal and earnestness during two years. But when a missionary school was opened in Lausanne, the object of which was to prepare young men for the foreign field, Mr. R. discontinued his colporting work, and was one of the first to enter that school.

It was about that time that Mr. and Madame Olivier left

Switzerland as missionaries to the Indians of Canada. They came to Montreal, and here they changed their plans, deciding to remain in this city, and labor among the French Romanists. But after they had been here a little more than a year their health failed, and seeing that they would soon have to return home they endeavored to induce others in Switzerland to come and continue the work they had begun. Mr. Roussy and Madame Feller, who had been long prayed that the Lord might open a field before them, recognized, in Mr. and Madame Olivier's earnest appeals, the voice of God. Consequently they sailed from Havre, France, on the 20th of September, 1835, arriving in New York after a long and rough voyage on the 23rd of October, and in Montreal on the 31st of the same month.

After a few months spent in the work of evangelization in Montreal and St. John, P.Q., they (on account of the strong and violent opposition they met in those places, especially in St. John) went to Grande Ligne, where Mr. Roussy had already labored with some encouragement. Madame Feller opened a school in the garret of a little log house, and Mr. Roussy continued his evangelistic work, going from house to house and preaching wherever he could gather a few hearers. It is difficult to realize the amount of courage and of devotion that was needed to carry on such work amidst the opposition and persecution this faithful missionary had to encounter. Time and again he was ill-treated and driven away from houses which he had entered to carry to the inmates his message of truth. At one place he was beaten by a crowd of women, who fell upon him armed with sticks; and he carried to his grave marks of the blows he then received upon his head. In one instance an attempt was made to burn the house in which he was preaching; in another he was shot at with a musket; but the hand of Providence was upon him and kept him from serious harm.

On the 30th of June, 1837, Mr. Roussy had the inexpressible joy of baptizing four converts who, with the missionaries, were organized into the first French Protestant church ever founded in Canada. The developments of this work, begun so humbly and prayerfully, have been such as to call for the loudest praise to God who so signally prospered it. It is estimated that over 4,000 French Canadians have been led to embrace the truth of the Gospel through the direct instrumentality of this Mission; fifteen churches

were organized; over 2,000 young people were educated in its institutions; and twenty-two young men were prepared for the work and sent into the field as ordained ministers, or as evangelists and colporters. Surely, our lamented "father in Israel" could, and no doubt did utter Simeon's prayer, "Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word; for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation."

The subject of this notice possessed many rare qualities which endeared him to every one that became acquainted with him. Combining in his character the resoluteness and pluck of the Anglo-Saxon race with the sedateness of the Swiss nation and the courtesy of the French, he also evinced a patience never at fault, an affectionateness and a charitableness no one could fail to observe. His Christian character was marked with the depth of his piety, the simplicity of his faith and the ardor of his zeal in the Master's service. The combination of so many rare qualities made of him a most efficient missionary and devoted pastor. His vivid imagination, his fluency of speech and his natural unction, guided by a thoughtful mind and superior intelligence, gave him power and eloquence in the pulpit.

It can truly be said of our brother that "he died in the harness." The multiplicity of his labors as missionary, pastor and physician had for several years begun to undermine his robust constitution and weaken his well-built frame. A rest was frequently suggested to him and he himself contemplated it, intending to visit his own native land, which he never saw after he left it forty-five years ago; but his devotion to his work induced him to postpone until too late the much needed rest. After an illness of about three months, the greatest part of which he was confined to his room, he entered into that perfect rest which "remaineth for the people of God," leaving behind him the fragrant memory of a well-spent life.

In the month of October there was a large meeting in Toronto with a view to forming a Baptist Union of all the Baptists of the Dominion of Canada. The delegates of the Grande Ligne Mission

were most cordially welcomed by their brethren in Ontario who afforded them an opportunity of presenting the claims of the Grande Ligne Mission to the Denomination in a way that we feel assured has greatly advanced its interests.

GRANDE LIGNE.

As already intimated the old station has this year attracted and almost monopolized the attention of the friends of the Mission. In the beginning of the year the church and congregation were still under the influence of the remarkable revival of the preceding year. Early in the spring the death of the old devoted missionary, Miss Jonte, was deeply felt by all the French Protestants, who all respected and loved her. At the end of April the successful examinations in the Institute drew a goodly number of friends, of one of whom we give the testimony below. Then the association of the churches in connection with the Mission, and the dedication of the Feller Institute already related, and finally the death of the last one of the two founders of the Mission, the beloved Mr. Roussy, all combined to centre interest at this station.

(*To the Editor of the Witness.*)

SIR,—The school year of the Feller Institute at Grande Ligne closed on the 28th of April with a public examination and exhibition. A written examination of a thorough character was passed previous, and the results exposed for inspection by the visitors. The students presented a fine appearance, and acquitted themselves in a way that did credit to their own diligence and the faithfulness of their teachers. The examination in Greek, Latin, second year geometry, first English and French classes, was conducted by Mons. Eugene Lafleur, B.A., B.C.L. The classes in algebra and third year geometry were examined by Mr. Parent, student of McGill College. The Principal, Mr. Roux, aided by the teachers, took charge of the other classes. It may be proper to say here that the teachers of the past winter, besides the Principal, Mr. Roux, and Madame Roux, were Miss Robbins, English and mathematics; Miss Kinsman, music and singing, both of Vermont; Miss Vadenais, household work and elementary branches; and Mr. Massé, French and mathematics.

The exercises of the day consisted of music by the pupils, *vive voce* examination, declamations and remarks at the close by the examiners, visitors and officers of the institution. Touching and impressive were the words spoken by the reverend and venerable pastor, L. Roussy. Among

the visitors present we observed Mr. Lamarche, Inspector of Schools, the Rev. A. L. Therrien, of Montreal, the Rev. Mr. Tucker, of Sabrevois Mission, the Rev. T. Riendeau.

The report shows 52 pupils present during the year, 22 young ladies and 30 young men. Conspicuous on the walls of the school-room we were pleased to see exhibited the taste and industry of the young ladies in drawing needlework, under the wise direction of Mrs. Roux.

The mission is to be congratulated on the general efficiency to which the school has been raised within the last few years. A glance over the farm also shows the improvements in agriculture—the draining of the soil and converting waste land into fruitful fields.

The new building completed is a great want supplied, and cause for thanksgiving. It is both substantial and commodious, and all add greatly to the prosperity and stability of the school. Will the friends of Grande Ligne see that it is comfortably furnished by the opening of the next school year?

Without drawing any comparison, it is safe to say that the influence going forth from this quiet and modest institution is one of the most powerful civilizing and Christianizing agency in the Province of Quebec. May the benediction of heaven abide upon it continually.

Since the death of Mr. Roussy the duties of the pastorate have been shared by some of the missionaries—first by Mr. Roux, who being resident here had to preach often, especially before the opening of the School; then by Mr. Therrien and Mr. Lafleur alternately, and occasionally by a student going to preach on Sunday and returning for his classes on the Monday morning.

As it was neither in the interest of the church, the school, or the missionary work among the Romanists that so important a field should long remain without a pastor, the church and congregation have lately decided to call Mr. Therrien as pastor among them. Having already been the instrument of much good in their midst, we are confident that with his known zeal and ability, energy and assistance of his excellent help meet in Mrs. Therrien, he will be the means of great good in that locality.

On the day of the dedication of the Feller Institute, it was impossible to look at the large gathering of young men and women of fine appearance and culture (and that, too, not during the session

of the school but in the time of vacation) without being deeply impressed, and indeed convinced, that a great, lasting and growing work had been for forty years taking root in the French Canadian population. The dedication of the first Mission House there forty years ago was doubtless a great joy to the missionaries and to a few converts, but it was very little compared to the present members and success.

We have no pastoral report to give of this place, but we know of a striking instance of the grace of God toward a once very well-to-do farmer, almost reduced to poverty more through generosity than anything else. For many years he had known the truth, had read the Gospel a great deal and had been looked upon as a Protestant; but not until a year ago, when his wife and daughter were baptized, did he entirely break his connection with the Church of Rome. Having for several years been in a declining state of health, two weeks before his death he asked one of the missionaries to visit him so as to unfold his whole mind to him before God, and also to have a last and solemn interview with a few Catholic neighbors, in order to bear before them his testimony to the marvellous grace of God which thus sustained him at the last hour and gave him such peace and joy in the assurance of a glorious release. He felt confident that this final testimony could not remain fruitless. The interview has taken place and now we prayerfully wait for the result.

GRANDE LIGNE INSTITUTES.

Our staff of teachers this year comprises Rev. Mr. Roux, principal, and his wife; Mr. Beal, a graduate of Dartmouth College, and Miss Osgood. Music and singing are as last year placed under the care of Miss Kinsman. A young French gentleman and a few pupil-teachers help us also in both Institutions. We have thus far received more than one hundred and sixty applications, seventy-one of whom have been admitted since the opening in October last; sixty-four remain with us—thirty-two boys and thirty-two girls, ten being out-siders; they come from thirty different localities. These pupils receive here elementary, commercial, or classical education, according to their age and the object they have in view.

The course embraces, besides the ordinary branches taught in common schools, geometry, algebra, book-keeping, elements of sciences, general history, literature, rhetoric, Greek, Latin, music and drawing. All the pupils give a portion of their time each day to manual work, and the girls receive special instructions in needle-work, crochet, &c. But the study of the Word of God is the one we most strongly urge upon our dear youth, knowing by the experience of ages that it is the only safe light to lead them unto Him who is the way, the truth and the life, and the best safeguard against the errors of Popery and the snares of infidelity. That study consists this year of a series of familiar instructions on the life of Christ and the doctrines of Rome, given to the whole school, and of a superior course of religious teaching for the advanced classes.

We have no reason to get discouraged in this arduous but blessed work which the Lord has entrusted to us. The progress of our pupils in regard to their studies is in most cases very satisfactory, and although we cannot say that all have advanced in the paths of wisdom as much as we would have wished, or they were able, still there has been a forward movement in that direction—more manly and elevated aspirations have been awakened in the breasts of not a few, and we might point to one of them who, after a few weeks' stay with us, has returned into the bosom of his family, and is giving striking proofs of his moral improvement. Such a result, even if it were a solitary one, would be quite a sufficient compensation for all the trouble taken and would gladden the hearts of those who by their self-sacrifices have enabled us to keep this Institution open. Some also have heard the voice of the Heavenly Father, "My son, give me thine heart," and are ready to confess this faith in Jesus by baptism; and others, both among the older as among the new pupils, study with the view of becoming some day our fellow-laborers with God. But in order to prepare them for the ministry of the Cross—to develop what has already been done—and to give to this central station—to this "Mother of the French Canadian Protestant Churches"—the necessary impulse, we needed a man well qualified both as a pastor and as a preacher, and the Lord has just given him to us in the person of the Rev. A. L. Therrien, who is to come and settle among us by the first week in May next.

But his arrival will not fill up the gap made in our ranks by

the departure of the Rev. Louis Roussy, the venerable founder of this Mission. We can hardly believe that he has left us forever. It seems as if his mild, noble face would at any time appear again in our midst; and when, by some accident, his bedroom bell sounds in the corridors our heart leaps as in the days when, laid on his bed of suffering, he called us to his help. He has no longer need of us now; he has entered into his rest, but we shall never forget his calm and beautiful expression when, in answer to this question addressed to him by a colleague in the ministry a few hours before his death, "Brother Roussy, you are looking unto Jesus, are you not?" he said, with a look which testified to the deep and unaffected faith and hope which animated him to the end, "Ah, my friend, I have nothing else to do!" And we must be allowed to express publicly our deep feeling of gratitude to our good old friend and sister, Mrs. Racicot, whose intelligent and delicate attentions have not a little contributed to sweeten the last weeks of his life, and to the youth of this Institution who were ever ready to lavish upon him the tokens of a truly filial affection.

TWO DAYS AT GRANDE LIGNE.

A GRAND COMMEMORATIVE OCCASION.

The last day of June and the first day of July must be recorded as memorable in the history of the work of the Grande Ligne Mission. On Wednesday, the 30th of June, the pastors and delegates of the small French churches connected with the Grande Ligne Missionary Society met at this place to give an account of the work accomplished during the past year. We exceedingly regret to say that Monsieur Roussy, the venerable pastor of the church at Grande Ligne, through illness, was unable to preside. Mr. Lafleur was requested to take the chair in his stead.

The proceedings were opened as usual by devotional exercises, which were followed by an excellent sermon by Mr. Therrien, pastor of Montreal, from the text, "For the people had a mind to work."—Nehemiah, iv., 6. It was a clear and forcible discourse. After the reading of the letters from the different churches, Prof. Roux read the annual circular letter to the churches collectively.

At the afternoon meeting Mr. Rossier, pastor of the French

church in Burlington, delivered a most interesting, searching and vivid address on the dawn of the Reformation in Geneva. He related how a poor school-master named Froment had, in consequence of Farrell's exhortations, inaugurated that great movement. It was about the time that Jacques Cartier discovered the St. Lawrence. All these were only small beginnings, but full of promise for the future. Exactly three hundred years after the coming of Cartier to Canada, a missionary landed in this country for the purpose of preaching the Gospel to the Indians, but finding the nature of this work different from what he had anticipated, he changed his course and devoted himself to the work of reformation among the French Roman Catholics. Mr. Olivier barely began this work, for his failing health compelled him to leave the country after little more than a year. Before he left, however, the two missionaries who were the real beginners had already arrived in the autumn of 1835, exactly three hundred years after Cartier's second voyage. Their first attempts were made in Montreal, but that stronghold of Romanism was not yet opened to receive the Gospel. At Grande Ligne Mr. Roussy began, like Froment, his work of reform by teaching a small day school. Mr. Rossier then proceeded to draw a parallel between the two dates, in verses full of poetical and Christian feeling, which we are sorry we are not able to produce.

Mr. Lafleur followed with an address having for his theme, "The aspect of the work of evangelization in France." He had but lately returned from Europe, and had endeavored while in France, he said, to make himself acquainted with the moral and religious condition of that great and beautiful country, and the amount of success which was meeting the efforts of the work of Protestantism among its population. It is known to all that Canada, at the time of the great French Revolution, had already come under British rule and had therefore escaped the great upheavals which had shaken Catholicism to its very foundations, and had spread broadcast infidelity and indifference to religion. It is worthy of remark that the Catholic clergy who assume the names of church and mother should have brought up such children to behave as they did. In spite of its partial restoration under the empire, and the more or less constitutional monarchies which followed, Catholicism remains a disturbed soil very different from that of Canada, which has

always been the peaceful and most lucrative domain of the priesthood and the nuns. In many respects the work of reform is easier there than here. In the first place there is a considerable nucleus of the descendants of the Huguenots—Protestants, well educated, generally wealthy—and who frequently fill positions of trust and consideration even in the government of the country. These positions, it must be understood, are not the result of their creed—rather in spite of it—but of their peculiar fitness in holding places of ability, honor and responsibility. This forms a natural basis for all evangelistic work. Another great advantage lies in the fact that the French people emigrate but very little, so that converts generally remain as means of influence on others. With us it is quite different. The French Canadian, whether educated or not, learns the English language easily; for that reason our French churches which are formed with so much difficulty rapidly lose their members; many of the latter join English-speaking churches in the country, or still more frequently emigrate to the United States or elsewhere. Nevertheless the work is being done, although the result does not fully appear. Finally, the work in France is fostered by a high degree of culture among liberal-minded men, while in this country everything is crushed by the influence of public opinion moulded in seminaries and convents. Here a work of even partial reform such as that of Father Hyacinthe is impossible, for the whole of priesthood has submitted to the degrading shackles of Ultramontanism. In France they are expelling the Jesuits—here they have processions of sympathy for them. In France whole parishes call for Protestant pastors; Protestant lecturers are filling large halls with eager audiences all over the country. The work of reform in France possesses preachers like Bersier, Hyacinthe Loyson; writers and orators like De Pressensé, Pilatte, Naville; lecturers like Réveillaud and the Monods; workers like McCall and many others. Our work is small compared to theirs; but they are endeavoring to introduce the Gospel in a population of thirty-five millions of people, while we are doing so among one million, surrounded by English Protestants. Oh! if only that Protestantism were what it should be with the teaching of the Gospel! Let us now endeavor to show in this country an exemplary French Protestantism that will surely be successful and sanctifying.

In the afternoon meeting the religious emotions of those who engaged in prayer were such that they were unable to proceed.

In the evening another meeting was held, presided over by Mr. Therrien. After several addresses, hymns and prayers we separated, feeling that for a long time past we had not experienced a day so full of the things of God.

On Dominion Day a considerable number of friends from Montreal came to Grande Ligne for the official opening and dedication services of the Feller Institute. On their arrival all seemed pleasantly struck by the substantial and imposing appearance of the fine building, which now forms the south wing of the old Mission house, and from the balcony of which one has an extended view of the Richelieu River, and the mountains of the Eastern Townships and of the State of Vermont.

The morning services were opened by the Rev. A. H. Munro, President of the Society. The Rev. J. Denovan, formerly President of this Society, and still one of its most devoted friends, then preached a carefully prepared, forcible and inspiring sermon of which too much good cannot be said, and which gave a tone to all the subsequent proceedings of that day—so full of sweet remembrances, recalling so many striking instances of God's fostering care, and opening to us a vast outlook full of hopes for the faithful laborer who lives the life of Christ. Mr. Denovan preached from the text, "In him was life, and the life was the light of men."—John i., 4.

According to the programme, our old missionary, Mr. Roussy, was to speak in French and to give interesting instances of his life-long work of love—a recent attack of illness prevented his doing so—he was not able to do more than make an appearance among his friends in the new hall for a part of the day. Mr. Lafleur was chosen as a substitute and was asked to give a welcome in English to the English friends present, and to acknowledge the fact that this French work had been chiefly supported by English-speaking Christians. He also dwelt on the fact that the Grande Ligne Mission was the first in point of time among all the French missions in Canada. This by no means implies the non-recognition of the good work done by other societies, but that in such a task as this, which is only in its infancy—since it was begun less than fifty years ago—denominational zeal and competition in the work ought never to weaken the simple rule of common courtesy and far less the refined feelings of Christian charity. We have not too much of intellectual, moral and spiritual power given us to impart truth and divine

life into the solid mass of Roman Catholicism around us. What, indeed, is our small Feller Institute together with the other French Protestant institutions by the side of these monstrous citadels of Popery which, under the names of seminaries, convents, asylums, churches, rise as it were by enchantment over the whole country? Whenever a new spirit of truer and fresher belief shall have penetrated within those walls, then those now strongholds will have become useless. It will surely take a long time before we can hope to reach that stage, but as one of the speakers said, "God will give us all the time we need."

After this meeting the audience separated for refreshment, and for the purpose of visiting the halls and various rooms of the new building. An object of special interest was the new parlor, so nicely furnished and carpeted by the liberality of the Ladies' Association of Brooklyn, N.Y. We offer them our sincere gratitude for this timely embellishment.

At three o'clock the services were resumed, being presided over by Mr. Joseph Richards, Treasurer of the Society. The pleasing and varied nature of the programme made the time short and seemed to dispel the heat of the day. There was first a chorus by some of the pupils, followed by an address by the Rev. Dr. Clarke, pastor of the Olivet Baptist Church, Montreal, who told us we had a new friend in him to the mission cause. Then a duet by Miss Munro and Mr. Bentley. Mr. Beaudry, pastor of the French Methodist Church, Montreal, delivered an address full of warm and kindly feeling, after which the President, Rev. A. H. Munro, gave an impressive and eloquent discourse. Rev. A. J. Therrien and Professor Roux then addressed the meeting in French. After more singing in both French and English, short addresses were delivered by Messrs. Leeming, Riendeau and Lafleur. At the close we could not but regret that we must separate so soon, and moreover that our friends from Montreal would reach their destination so late in the night. We only wish they had been more numerous to testify with us that God has already begun a great work in this country and even for this northern continent.

May the Lord grant us many such memorial days in this work which is carried on modestly but perseveringly and faithfully to the glory of His eternal truth.

MONTREAL STATION.

In the beginning of May last Mr. Lafleur returned from his trip to Europe and resumed with Mr. Therrien the missionary work in this city. In case the impression should obtain that two laborers are scarcely needed for the work here we shall say that in connection with Montreal we have had all this time to provide regularly St. Constant and La Pigeonière fortnightly, St. Isidore once a month and Grande Ligne very often during Mr. Roussy's illness and still more so since his death. In fact at times, even with the help of our students, we scarcely know how to meet all these appointments.

The meetings have been well attended, especially on Sunday. On week days the distances are too great for many to attend evening meetings, which are seldom large. We have again experienced the painful result, as in former years, of losing some of our best families by emigration to the United States or to some other part of Canada. Thus our little church and congregation has to be constantly replenished by new conversions from Romanism. We had hoped that before presenting this Report we should have several baptisms to record, but circumstances have removed some who will be baptized at Grande Ligne, and others are waiting for a friend or two to join them.

The important matter of a convenient and central church edifice seems to have made a little progress, in so far as having obtained a few good subscriptions here and in Boston, where Mr. Lafleur visited a few friends of the cause. A friend has promised to make an effort in New York on behalf of this object. If successful, a circular will be sent to England where a number of Christian friends have also promised to help in this matter. Montreal is as hard a field as it is an important one. We have here a good footing in several respectable families.

A work of colportage and evangelization was begun and continued for some time by Rev. Mr. Therrien accompanied by Mr. Millar, a student in this city, with encouraging success. We will let Mr. Therrien speak of it:—

“Last summer Brother Millar and myself devoted some time to the work of colportage in Montreal. We went from house to house, carrying with us New Testaments, tracts and papers. We

sold a goodly number of each kind and gave a few. In some instances the people were eager to get them and quite willing to pay the price for them. We were permitted to speak on the subject of religion with many persons, some of whom engaged in the conversation with deep interest and much seriousness. Several persons manifested much astonishment at the things they heard from us, and showed a desire to hear more. In two cases the seed of Truth was, we believe, effectually planted, and in due time we trust it will spring up and bring forth fruit to the glory of God.

“One thing surprised us much—it was, to find that in no instance were we repelled with insults. We often met with indifference—in many instances our books were refused, but no insults given. This indicates the great change that the mind of the people has undergone in the last few years in regard to Protestants and the Bible.

“In my collecting tours in the Ottawa Valley last fall I met with several French Canadians with whom I had religious conversations. At B—— I met with a young couple who had just embraced the truth from reading the New Testament. Never did I meet with persons who exhibited as much joy and gratitude for the privilege they had, as they said, of speaking with a minister of the Gospel of their own nationality. During the several hours which it was my privilege to spend with them they both listened so closely and with such manifest pleasure to what I said that my own heart was also thrilled with joy, and those moments were some of the happiest in my life. They are endeavoring to spread the truth among their own kindred and neighbors, and it is my purpose to visit them again and to preach the Gospel publicly in that place.

“At F—— I met with a woman who had lately begun reading the New Testament. She was somewhat shaken in her faith, and just at the time when, like the eunuch, she needed some one to guide her in the understanding of the Scriptures she read. During the conversation I had with her she manifested the deepest interest, and when we rose from our knees after offering our prayer to God, she was in tears. After my return home I sent her a pamphlet entitled, ‘The Teachings of the Church of Rome compared with Scripture,’ and other books. I went last week at the request of the Rev. P. H. McEwen to preach in French at that village. I had the pleasure of entering this woman’s house for the first time

—having met her in a neighbor's house before—and was greatly rejoiced to find that she had not only renounced the errors of Romanism, but had also become a sincere and earnest Christian.

“ On the same day in October that I met her I also met with a young man with whom I had a long conversation on religion; on Thursday last, when I saw him again, he told me that he had entirely given up the Church of Rome and was seeking to become a true Christian.

“ On the evening of that same day (Thursday) I preached the Gospel in French in the Baptist church to about nine or ten French Catholics; among the hearers was the doctor of the place. They seemed intensely interested in the discourse, and gave evidence that the Truth was not presented to them in vain.

“ On the following day, Rev. Mr. McEwen and myself went eight miles off to hold a meeting in a small log school-house. Mr. McEwen had already preached there twice, in English, with much acceptance, about fifteen or sixteen French Catholics being present at his last meeting, and thanking him for coming among them. In spite of the opposition of the priest about twelve of them attended our meeting. I preached from these words:—‘What must I do to be saved?’ and never was a sermon listened to more attentively. After the service they came and shook hands with me, and thanked me most earnestly for my visit to them. They also urged me to go back and preach to them again, which I promised to do. ‘Come,’ they said, ‘and you will not be alone; we will come and hear you, and we will bring others with us.’ We have reason to believe that the Lord is preparing a great work in that place.”

STE. MARIE DE MONNOIR.

Brother Riendeau writes: “The church and congregation in this place continue in a healthy condition. Public worship is well attended when the weather and roads permit it. As many have to come a long distance, the stormy season of winter reduces our numbers very much. The pastor has to visit the more. I am sorry to say, we had no accession to our number by baptism this year. I have had several cases of encouragement among the Roman Catho-

lic population in this neighborhood and elsewhere. A young woman came to borrow a New Testament from me in order to inquire as to the way of salvation. Another to whom I had given one told me in my last visit that she must decide to follow the Truth she clearly saw.

"The other day a man came to my house of whom I asked if he could read. 'Oh, yes,' he said, 'and I have bought a De Sacy Bible, but the nuns tell me that it is not quite a Catholic book and that I should consult the priest about it, but I am not going to do it.'

"I have been trying in the summer months to do good in visiting different parts of the missionary field, where scattered families live a great distance from the means of grace. In one of these visits, fifty-five miles from home, I met on the border of the forest a large family, whose father and mother had come to the knowledge of the Gospel by my instrumentality thirty years ago. Since then they had lived in different parts of the country—had met with infidels, had neglected public worship, and had become very indifferent. The good old time was recalled; and as we read and prayed together the conscience spoke—the heart was melted, and we felt the Spirit of God in our midst.

Stopping at a country hotel for tea, when the hostess heard who I was, she expressed her surprise that a French Canadian could have become a Protestant minister—"Who ever saw the like," she said. "But there are a good many now-a-days," I replied. "Then there is thus a great work done in the country," she simply said. "Of course,"—and we parted good friends."

ROXTON POND.

"Brother Brouillet writes: "My Report has been delayed, partly in the supposition that my letter to the Association would suffice, and partly because I have been for some time in a poor state of health.

"On the whole I may say that we have had a good and prosperous year at this station. Our people, who are most of them poor, have this last year contributed towards building a house for

the pastor and for religious objects the handsome amount of \$430. The attendance at public worship has been good and encouraging. There have been eight members added to the church, and as many more are to be baptized shortly.

“Were it not for some difficulties still fostered by a little too much of denominational zeal in some quarters, and that some who profess to be Christians are nevertheless, unintentionally perhaps, enemies of the cross of Christ, the work would go on here most prosperously, as many of the Romanists come very freely to our meetings and manifest much interest in the truth we teach.

“I am sorry to say that the state of my health is such that I can no longer make my weekly trip to St. Pie on Sunday. It would require an efficient resident missionary to work that old station as it deserves.”

SOUTH ELY.

From reports of missionaries who have lately visited this field and from the resident missionary himself, Mr. Jousse, we regret to learn that there has been some little trouble in the congregation, owing partly to ill health on the part of the pastor, who is unable to be as active as formerly, and especially to the unexemplary conduct of some of the members. However, by last account things were moving on quietly. The Committee has lately been at a good deal of expense in re-building what is now a convenient and comfortable parsonage. Brother Riendeau was commissioned to superintend the work on that building, and did well at the cost of a great deal of travelling and trouble.

MONTGOMERY.

At the pressing invitation of some of the members of the church in that field, last summer we sent a young man for some time in our employ as a colporteur and evangelist, to visit and hold meetings among the neglected French Protestants. That once flourishing field, where much might still be done, is becoming more

and more Americanized, especially the young. But many of the older members remain almost entirely without the privilege of public worship.

It must not be inferred, however, that tokens of God's presence and approval have been wanting among those we ministered to. In the more detailed reports cheering instances are given. They have taken place in our midst, and they come to us from abroad—from the United States and even from France, where converts from Canada have been the instruments in God's hands to make the Truth known to large communities.

May the Lord speed the work.

ST. CONSTANT AND LA PIGEONNIÈRE.

This large field has had since last spring the ministrations of Mr. Lafleur, occasionally of a student, and more especially of Mr. Therrien. It is high time that an efficient laborer be stationed there permanently, not only to keep up the interest among the many respectable families of French Protestants in that neighborhood, but also to pursue a work of evangelization among the Roman Catholics. There are several candidates for baptism in this locality.

AGENCIES.

As already stated the first months of the year were employed by Mr. Lafleur in collecting in Great Britain. In the months of May and June one of the students, Mr. Bracq, collected in the State of Vermont and in parts of Massachusetts and Connecticut with encouraging success. In the fall Mr. Therrien made the collections in the Ottawa Valley and in the city of Quebec, also in some parts of our French congregations. Mr. Riendeau on the same errand visited New York, Philadelphia, Orange, Albany, Troy and other places.

In the beginning of October it was suggested to us by some kind friends that perhaps the Rev. H. F. Griffin, then supplying the pulpit of the First Baptist Church in Montreal, in the ab-

sence of the pastor, might be induced to undertake the financial agency of the Mission. Mr. Griffin was approached and finally engaged to labor, first in Ontario for the present; afterwards in the United States, and then proceed to Great Britain. We are happy to say that his arduous labors have met with a very general and generous response at the hands of our friends in Ontario.

The Ladies' Associations of New York, Brooklyn and Montreal have as formerly come to the help of the Mission by collecting funds for current expenses, and during the past year have made a special effort to furnish the new house at Grande Ligne. We hope that their kind interest will be continued in this work to which Madame Feller devoted her noble life.

CONCLUSION.

In closing this hasty review of a year's work, we have the mingled feelings of gratitude, sorrow, regret and hope. Through means employed the Lord has been pleased to meet our pressing wants; death has come with its deep shadows to two of our old missionaries, and several of our old converts, who have died in triumphant faith. Our efforts at doing good and bringing souls to Christ have been less successful than we had hoped, perhaps because we have been too much taken up with the outward work of the Lord's house and not enough with him in the sanctuary.
