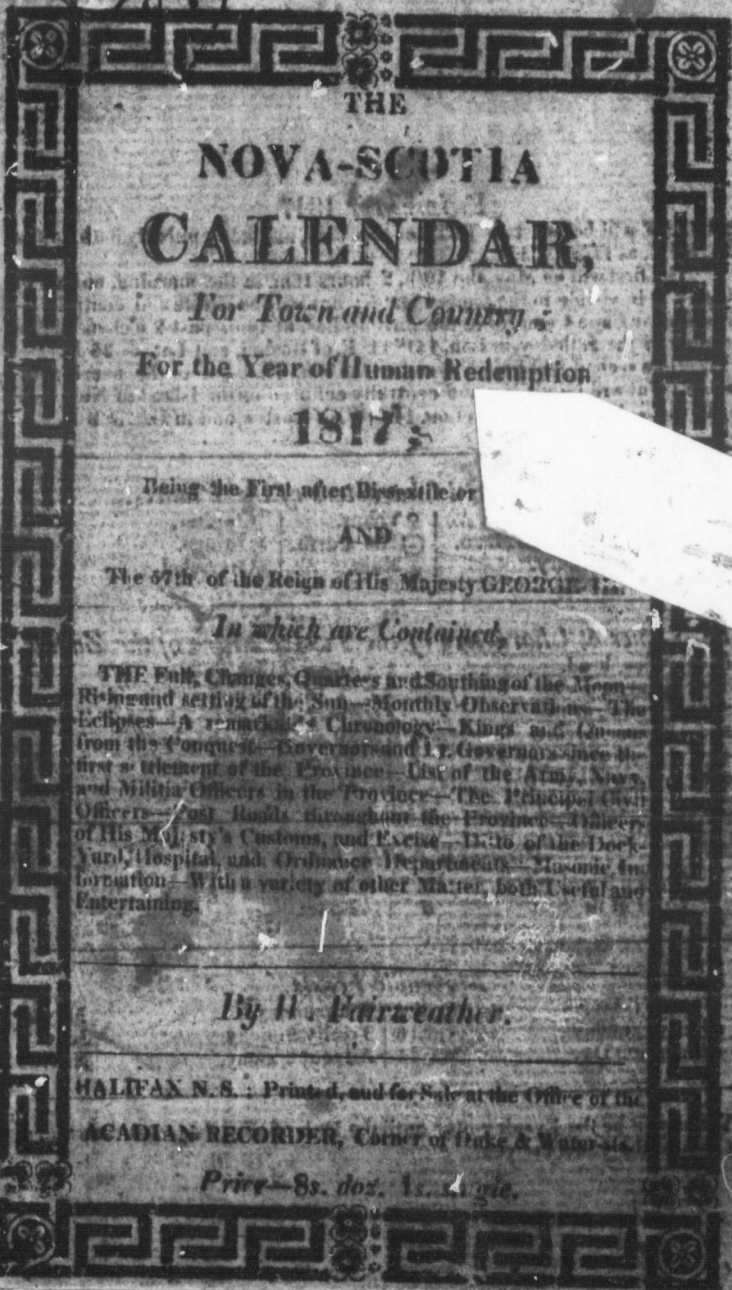

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*Eclipses for 1817.*

**T**HERE will be but two Eclipses this year, and consequently both of the SUN, as follows, viz.

I. The first will be May the 16th, 2 hours 16m. in the morning, no part of which will be visible in the United States; but will be visible and centrally eclipsed near Cape Comorin in the East Indies, at 10m. past 2 o'clock in the morning of the 16th day, in Lon. 147° 11' E. of Boston, and Lat. 6° 23 N.

II. The second will be in November the 8th, 9h. 20m. in the evening, invisible; but will be visible and centrally eclipsed on the Island of New Guinea in the S. Pacific Ocean, in Lon. 142° W. of Boston, and in Lat. 8° 8' S.

*The following Story is related on the authority of Lady Hamilton, the first wife of Sir Wm. Hamilton, many years the British Minister at the Court of Naples:*

On the subsequent morning after great irresolution, he determined, at whatever risk to his personal safety, not to participate, by concealing so enormous a crime.

It formed nevertheless, a delicate and difficult undertaking to substantiate the charge, as he remained altogether ignorant of the place to which he had been carried, or of the name and quality of the lady whom he had deprived of life—Without suffering himself, however, to be deterred by these considerations, he waited on the Secretary of the Apostolic Chamber and acquainted him with every particular; adding, that if the government would extend to him protection, he did not despair of finding the house, and of bringing to light the perpetrators of the deed. Benedict the Fourteenth, (Lambertini) who then occupied the Papal chair had no sooner received the information, than he immediately commenced the most active measures for discovering the offenders. A guard of the Shirri, or officers of justice, was appointed by his order, to accompany Ogilvie; who judging from various circumstances that he had been conveyed out of the city of Rome, began by visiting the Villas scattered without the walls of that metropolis. His search proved ultimately successful. In the Villa Pona Julia constructed by Pope Julius the Third, (*del Monte*) he there found the marks left on the bloody walls by his fingers at the same time he recognized the apartment in which he had put to death the lady. The palace belonging to the Duke de Bracciano, the chief of which illustrious family, and his brother, had committed the murder in the person of their own sister. They no sooner found that it was discovered than they fled to the city, where they easily eluded the pursuit of justice. After remaining here for some time they obtained a pardon, by the exertions of their powerful friends, on

paying of a considerable fine to the Apostolic Chambers and under the further condition of affixing over the chimney piece of the room, where the crime had been perpetrated, a plate of copper, commemorating the transaction, and their penitence. This plate, together with the inscription, still continued to exist there till within these few years.

Just at Christ Church, Blackfriars, Ned Simple shot at a rat, and missed it: but it gave us a fine hunt, the dogs barking all the way, until we drove it into the Thames.

Beat over all the ground about the halfpenny hatches, and found nothing but one cat, which all of us fired at; but being only six in number, and a cat having nine lives, we missed killing, though we severely wounded her.

Passing at the back of Webber-row, we saw several pigeons; but though they were within pistol-shot, they flew so fast that none of us could take aim, although our guns were ready cocked, and loaded with No. 2 six finger's deep.

Saw five sparrows on the ground, opposite the Elephant and Castle, Newington, feasting on some new dropped horse-dung—stole up with great caution within four yards of the game, and gave an irregular fire; but Bob Tape's musket going off before he took aim, the birds, we suppose, made their escape antecedent to the other five going off; for the devil a sparrow we killed.

Rather out of the humour with such ill-luck—so took another dram a-piece, and pushed briskly forward for Camberwell.

Met two men driving geese at Kennington-common—offered them eighteen-pence, which they accepted, for a shot at the flock at twenty yards. Drew lots who should fire first. It fell to Billy Candlewick's chance, who, from his father belonging many years to the Orange regiment of City Militia, knew something of taking aim.

The goose-driver stepped the ground, and Billy took aim for about ten minutes, when shutting both his eyes, lest the pan might flash in his sight, he snapped and missed fire—he took aim a second time, snapped and missed again—borrowed Bob Tape's scissars, and hammered the sine—snapped and missed fire a third time—thought the devil had got hold of the gun; examined her, and found she was neither loaded nor primed. The goose driver refused to let Billy try again, so we gave him another sixpence, and he sold us a lame gander, which we placed at about six yards, and taking a shot a-piece at him, killed him, and put him into Ned Thimble's cabbage-net.

When we came within sight of the Swan, at Stockwell, we all ran as fast as we could, to see who should get in first, as we had settled to breakfast there. Unfortunately our guns being cocked, I made a stumble, and the trigger being touched by something, off went the piece, and

lodged the contents in the body of a sucking pig that was crossing the road. The squeaking of the poor little animal roused the maternal affection of the sow, and set the fox dog, the terrier, the Newfoundland bitch, and the mastiff, a barking. The noise of the sow, the pig, and the dogs, with the report of the gun, brought the people of the house, and indeed of the neighbourhood, and being threatened by one, and laughed at by another, we thought it best to buy the pig at four shillings, which we did, and having put it into Bob Tape's game bag, which, by the bye, was nothing but half a bolster tick, we made the best of our way to the Plough, at Clapham, where we had some cold buttock and ale for breakfast.

Tried all the common round—beat every bush with the muzzle of our guns, set the dogs on the pigs, and found but one chaffinch, which was rather wild, not letting us come within eight yards, so that we could not make sure of our bird. We hunted him from spray to spray for above an hour, without being able to get in a parrallel line, so as to take sure aim, when at last he was killed by a little boy, who knocked him down with a stone—bought him, and put him into the net with the goose.

Resolved to make for Blackheath, and to cut across the country that we might get amongst the stubbles—missed our road, and by some kind of circumbendibus, got into Brixton-causeway, where we asked if there were any birds in the neighbourhood. We were directed to a dead horse, where two ravens and several magpies were assembled; but they would not stay our arrival, for the moment they saw us they made off.

Our pig-carrying companion and our goose-carrier complained of the weight, so we took charge of the game by turns.

Hunted a weazel for above an hour, and lost him. The terrier was remarkably staunch.

Crossing a field near Camberwell, we thought we saw a covey of partridges at the side of a ditch—so we all made up to them with our guns cocked, tying the dogs to our legs, that they might not run in and spring the game.

What we thought to be a covey of partridges proved to be gang of gypsies, who were squatted under the hedge, peeling turnips and preparing potatoes for dinner. It was the mercy of God we did not fire at them, as all our pieces were up to our shoulders, and we had but one eye a-piece open, when that which we took to be the old cock rose up, and said in a loud voice, "What the devil are ye about?"

After much difficulties, and but little sport, got by the direction of the gypsies into the Greenwich-road, where being rather fatigued, we stopped at the Halfway-house until a coach came by, when mounting the roof and the box, we were conveyed near Blackheath, to our unspeakable joy.

Never saw the heath before—amazed at the number of furze bushes, and the wide extent there is for game. Had an excellent chase after a jack-ass, which the mastiff tore in the leg. Kept close together for fear of losing each other.

Got down near a large round house—shot at a flock of sparrows, and killed one, which we think is a cock, his head being rather black.

Saw several brother sportsmen out, who had killed nothing but a hedge-hog and a tame jack-daw, which belonged to a public house at New-cross Turnpike.

Got up to the main road—fired at a yellow-hammer, and frightened the horses in the Dover stage. The guard threatend to shoot us, and we took to our heels.

Saw some black game flying very high. They looked for all the world like crows.

The terrier came to point at a thick bunch of ferne. We were now sure this must be a covey of partridges, and we prepared accordingly. The mastiff run in and brought out one of the young ones. It proved to be a nest of grass-mice—took every one, and put them into the bolster. Grass-mice were better than nothing.

Much fatigued, and agreed to shoot all the way home—fired off our guns at the foot of Greenwich-hill, and were laughed at by the inhabitants—loaded them again, and fired at a sheet of paper for half an hour, without putting a grain in it—got at Smith's at dusk, and discharged our pieces in the air, before we went in—had something to eat and drink, then set off for the city, and squibbed our guns all the way, as long as the powder lasted.

Got home much fatigued with the day's sport—went to our club, and told a thousand lies about the birds we killed, and the presents we made of them—smoked our pipes, and by twelve got to bed.

*Highwaymen Reclaimed.*

A NOTORIOUS robber in Scotland, known by the name of John of the Score, happening to meet with a poor man travelling with two horses, forcibly took them both away, regardless of the entreaties of the distressed countryman, who, falling on his knees, begged him, *for Jesus Christ's sake*, to restore one of them, as the maintenance of his family depended on his horses.

The thief, having returned home, became from that day dull and melancholy, unable to rest at home, or pursue his depredations abroad; for which he could assign no cause but this, that the words which the poor man had uttered concerning *Jesus Christ* (which, by the way, he was so ignorant as not to understand), laid like a heavy weight upon his spirit. Desiring, therefore, his sons to shift for themselves, and secretly restrained from attempting to escape or hide himself, he was apprehended by the ministers of justice, imprisoned in Edinburgh, tried, and condemned to die.

Being visited by the Rev. Mr. Blyth and a Mr. Cunningham, who had formerly known him, he was exhorted to consider his miserable and dangerous condition as a dying sinner, and to fly for refuge to *Jesus Christ*. Hearing that name, he suddenly cried out, "Oh! what word is that? for it has been my death! That is the word that has lain upon my heart ever since the poor man mentioned it, so that I had no power to escape. The minister took occasion to preach to him JESUS, as the only and all-sufficient Saviour. "But will he," said the relenting thief, "will he ever look upon me? will he ever shew mercy to me, who would not, for his sake, shew mercy to that poor man, and give him back his horses?"

After farther instruction, a real and most gracious change appeared in him, of which he discovered the most convincing evidence: he attained to a happy assurance of his interest in Christ; and on the scaffold, where he suffered, spoke so wonderfully of the Lord's dealings with him, as left a conviction on the spectators, and forced them to acknowledge a glorious truth and reality in the grace of God.

"It was my lot, a few years ago," says Dr. Lettson, "to be attacked on the highway by a genteel looking person, well mounted, who demanded my money, at the same time placing a pistol to my breast: I requested him to remove the pistol, which he instantly did: I saw his agitation, from whence I concluded he had not been habituated to this hazardous practice; and I added, that I had both gold and silver about me, which I freely gave him, but that I was sorry to see a young gentleman risk his life in so unbecoming a manner, which would probably soon terminate at the gallows; that, at the best, the casual pittance gained on the highway would afford but a precarious and temporary subsistence; but that, if I could serve him by a private assistance more becoming his appearance, he might farther command my purse; and, at the same time, I desired him to accept a card containing my address, and to call upon me, as he might trust to my word for his liberty and life. He accepted my address, but I observed his voice faltered: it



was late at night ; there was, however, sufficient star-light to enable me to perceive, as I leaned towards him on the window of my carriage, that his bosom was overwhelmed with conflicting passions ; at length, bending forward on his horse, and recovering the power of speech, he affectingly said, ' I thank you for your offer ; American affairs have ruined me ; I will, dear sir, wait upon you.' Two weeks afterwards, a person entered my house, whom I immediately recognised to be this highwayman. ' I come,' said he, ' to communicate to you a matter that nearly concerns me, and I trust to your honour to keep it inviolable.' I told him I recollected him, and I requested him to relate his history with candour, as the most effectual means of securing my services ; and such was the narrative, as would have excited sympathy in every heart. His fortune had been spoiled on the American continent, and, after a long imprisonment, he escaped to this asylum of liberty, where, his resources failing, and perhaps with pride above the occupation of a sturdy beggar, he rashly ventured upon the most dreadful alternative of the highway, where, in his second attempt, he met with me. I found his narrative was literally true, which induced me to try various means of obviating his distresses. To the commissioners for relieving the American sufferers application was made, but fruitlessly ; at length he attended at Windsor, and delivered a memorial to the queen, briefly stating his sufferings, and the cause of them. Struck with his appearance, and pleased with his address, she graciously assured him of patronage, provided his pretensions should, on enquiry, be found justified. The result was, that, in a few days, she gave him a commission in the army ; and, by his public services, twice has his name appeared in the Gazette, among the promotions. After some years' employment in the service of his sovereign, this valuable officer fell a victim to the yellow fever in the West-Indies."

" A second time I was attacked and robbed, and at the instant seized the criminal, whom I knew. He fell on his knees, returned the money he had taken from me, and prayed forgiveness. I told him I could not commute felony ; he must instantly depart ; and advised him to go to sea, and never suffer me to see him again. About two years afterwards, on visiting a person in the country, I met with this offender ; upon enquiring into his situation, I found that he had since been married, and was become a respectable farmer."

Dr. Conder, during his residence at Cambridge, having taken a ride to Peterborough for the benefit of the air, on his return, he saw a gentleman in a private lane, at some distance, standing by his horse. As he approached, the supposed gentleman mounted, and, coming up to him, demanded his money. The doctor (then Mr. Conder) immediately recognised him as a former inhabitant of Cambridge, but thought it prudent to conceal his knowledge. Not satisfied with receiving all his cash, to the amount of several guineas, the highwayman asked him for his watch. This being a family piece he pleaded hard to retain it ; but the man persisting in a menacing tone in his demand, he surrendered it, though not without strong symptoms of reluctance.

The doctor was a man of tender sympathy. This amiable quality

soon suppressed all concern for personal safety, and the property thus violently wrested from him; and led him to commiserate an unhappy man, in hasty strides, to the chambers of death, and to attempt to reclaim him. He immediately addressed him with great civility, enquired what way he was going, and proposed, if agreeable, to ride in company; assuring him, at the same time, that he need not entertain the least fearful apprehension upon his account.

During the robbery itself, the man, with all his assumed courage, could not conceal the agitation of his mind. From this circumstance the doctor took occasion to suggest that his present mode of subsistence, separate from its moral turpitude, was both unwise and dangerous, as the small sums generally collected at one time in these adventures were inadequate to the risk, as they required the frequent exposure of his person, and must subject him to perpetual alarms.--- The robber urged the common plea of necessity. The doctor represented, that it was an unpleasant and commonly a fatal necessity, as it was not only a trespass upon the rights of society and the authority of God, but would subject him to a dreadful penalty in the life that now is, as well as in that which is to come. Here he intreated him to desist from these pernicious habits—urged him to repentance, assuring him that there was forgiveness, through Jesus Christ, for the most atrocious offenders, and that he did not doubt, if he implored direction from above, but Providence would so direct his way, as to enable him to “provide all things honest in the sight of all men.”

This conversation appeared to make a deep impression; the immediate effect of which was, the robber took the watch, and returned it to him, saying, “he conducted himself so much like a gentleman, that he could not think of retaining it.” The doctor replied, that he greatly valued the watch, and received it with pleasure; but acknowledged that he had a higher object in view than the restoration of his property.

As they continued their discourse, he took the money out of his pocket, and tendered that also to the doctor, saying, “that his conscience would not permit him to keep it.” But the doctor absolutely refused receiving it, begging him not to consider it as forced from him, but as the gift of benevolence to a necessitous man.

Coming nearer to Cambridge, the robber told him, “he was under a necessity of leaving him,” and, on parting, wept considerably, saying, “he hoped he should attend to his advice.” He then took a cross road, on the skirts of the town; but, having previously committed other robberies in the neighbourhood, was almost immediately identified and seized. The doctor leisurely continued his ride, and, on his arrival at Cambridge, was greatly surprised to meet him in the street, in the custody of the persons who apprehended him. On his commitment to the castle, he sent for his spiritual monitor, who found him in very great distress. During his confinement, both before and after trial, he made him repeated visits, which were rendered eminently useful; and at his execution, he had every reason to believe, he died a real convert.
