

Norman E. Ditman of Columbia Univercity that the annual loss to the United States from preventable deaths is fully \$600,000,000. He makes this and other equally striking statements the basis of an

secon,000,000. He makes this and other equally striking statements the basis of an argument in favor of a school of preventive medicine and of sanitary science and public health, in connection with the University. Dr. Ditman says in part:

"One-third of the human beings born alive die before the age of 5 years has been attained, largely from preventable causes. The death rate of children in some tenement house districts in New York is as high as 204 per 1,000—five times as high as in the well-to-do districts.

"The number of deaths occurring in the world from epidemics of plague, smallpox, yellow fever and cholera is still enormous, in spite of the fact that methods for prevention of these diseases are known.

"Pneumonia kills 106,000 people in the United States annually, and the number is increasing rapidly, yet the cause of this disease is known and it should be in our power to stamp it out.

"Twenty-five thousand people in the United States who are needlessly blind could have had their vision saved had the causes of blindness and methods for its prevention been widely enough appreciated.






