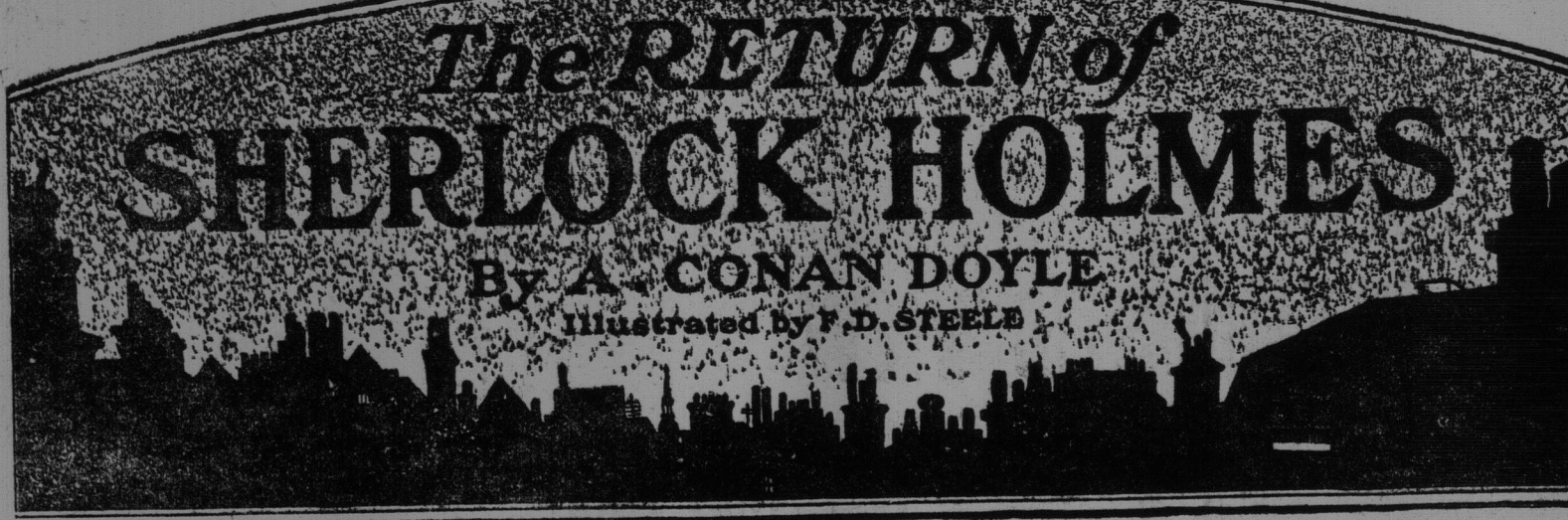

THE ADVENTURE OF THE EMPTY HOUSE

(Continued.) "No, Watson, I never was in it. My note to you was absolutely genuine. I had little doubt that I had come to the end of my career when I perceived the somewhat sinister figure of the late Professor Moriarty standing upon the narrow pathway which led to safety. I read an inexorable purpose in his grey eyes. I exchanged some remarks with him, here and there, and obtained his courteous permission to write the short note which you afterwards received. I left it with my cigarette box and my stick, and I walked along the pathway, Moriarty still at my heels. When I reached the end I stood at bay. He drew no weapon, but he rushed at me and threw his long arms around me. He knew that his own game was up, and was only anxious to revenge himself upon me. A BOSTON DIVINE

Rev. A. D. Mackinnon Preached in St. Stephen's Church Yesterday.

Rev. A. D. Mackinnon, B. D., of Boston, who preached in St. Stephen's Presbyterian church the last Sunday, spoke eloquently last evening from the text in the Song of Solomon, ch. II, v. 1: "I am the rose of Sharon, and the lily of the valleys." After referring to Sharon as being another word for plain, Dr. Mackinnon spoke of the division of the earth into mountains, plains and valleys and of the inhabitants as called respectively mountaineers, dwellers in the plains and dwellers in the valleys. He then directed his hearers attention to three similar moods in spiritual life—the exalted spiritual joy of the mountain tops, the mood of the plain level of every day life and the painful mood of the lowly valley. Speaking of the first he dwelt briefly on incidents in the lives of Moses, Isaiah and St. Paul who each experienced the ecstatic vision in different ways, and spoke also of Christ's communion with an unseen God on the Mount of Transfiguration. Similar experiences, Dr. Mackinnon said, were enjoyed by many in the present day and every soul should look for a time when there would come a season of spiritual vision—a life when prayer would seem natural and easy. Such a condition, the preacher continued, is not always present, there must come the plain level of everyday life in which the great mass of humanity live their lives. There was no high inspiration on this plain to put enthusiasm into life but it brought out the manly heroic qualities and showed a man in his true colors. Christ was seldom on the mountain top. He was the perennial flower of the plain.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE

Rev. David Lang Refers to It in His Sermon Last Night.

Preaching in St. Andrew's church last evening Rev. David Lang made a special reference to the peace conference at Portsmouth. He took for his text Matt. v. 9: "Blessed are the peacemakers." In his opening remarks he said the eyes of the world had been resting on Portsmouth (N. H.), and the thought that one of the youngest of the nations was mediating between those hoary with antiquity. Special attention must be felt for that nation's noble president—the hero of the ranches and the leader of rough riders—who but a few years ago was regarded as a dangerous warlike spirit. He stood today, whatever might be the outcome of the conference, as the incarnation of the benediction—a peacemaker. The preacher spoke of war as a relic of barbarism and happily doomed. It might, however, be said to have some advantages. It brought about a quieting of the mind, it produced great men through conflict, it was a means for undermining abuses as in Russia and it caused the punishment of the wrong doer. War was seen in nature in the conflict of the elements, in animals' nature "red in tooth and claw" in man's nature, and in society as teaching the death of war. He, Mr. Lang spoke of all great forces such as gravitation and sunlight as peaceful. He referred to the happiness of the peacemakers and reminded his hearers of the Messiah who was called the Prince of Peace. In conclusion, he spoke of the witheredness of having made peace with God by the blood of the cross—a peace which passeth all understanding.

BILL WAS TOO HIGH

Woodstock Council Objects to Paying Expenses of G. T. P. Delegation to Ottawa.

WOODSTOCK, Aug. 12.—Last night's meeting of the town council was attended by Mayor Jones, Couns. Nicholson, McMane and Leighton, Couns. Stevens and Fisher were at the I. O. O. F. convention in Halifax and Coun. Henderson was in St. Andrews.

The fire committee was instructed to get specifications for four tenders for the repair of steam fire engine, to be submitted at next meeting. The same committee was authorized to procure an out-house, now at Broadway school, which the trustees have no use for as they are making extensive repairs to that school, and have it moved to the lower corner engine house for a shed.

The fire committee reported that it had made extensive repairs to the lock-up and built a ventilator for the town building. There were two tenders for supplying the poor with groceries. That of John Graham, which was the lowest, was accepted.

During the reading of the monthly bills, one for \$180 to pay the expenses of the three delegates to Ottawa, was presented. P. railway (question) was opposed by Coun. Leighton, who said he had travelled to Ottawa many times, for a short time, and it never cost him \$60 for the trip. The bill was left over until the September meeting.

Comy Coun. A. G. Bailey and R. J. Lindsay were appointed revisors for the town for the ensuing year. Mr. and Mrs. W. A. The foreign offices were kept open all day, but only for the reports and handling of messages from the peace plenipotentiaries.

READY TO FLY FROM RUSSIA

Czar's Yacht, With Steam Up, Can Put to Sea at a Moment's Notice.

ST. PETERSBURG, Aug. 10--While anarchy is rampant and death stalks through the land, the Tzar--by many held responsible for all his country's troubles at Odessa (which had it first among his flowers).

It is said, however, that Nicholas' mental condition daily becomes worse. The Tzar of all the Russians still spends many hours lying fully dressed on his bed, his exercise being taken in the garden when brooding and with bowed head, in company with his physician, Dr. Hirsch.

Now every scrap of the imperial food is sent to the Grand Duke, the Pavlovsky regiment, before being allowed to pass the imperial gate.

The latest rumors are sensational enough. It is asserted by persons in close touch with the court that Nicholas has written a private letter to King of Denmark, asking whether he and his family would be welcome at Copenhagen.

Several interesting matters are to engage the attention of the equity court this week. On Tuesday next the application of the Attorney General to the court to set aside the St. John Lumber Company will be taken up.

Also in this court, before Judge Barker, the case of Jardine vs. Mandell is to be taken up. It is a Kent county matter--J. T. Jardine vs. Wm. Mandell.
