PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

The forty-sixth annual meeting of the Protestant Orphans' Home was held yesterday afternoon in the institution, Dovercourt Road. Mayor Fleming presided and with him on the platform were: Canon Cayley, Rev. A. Hart, Ald. Scott, Mr. Leigh, Dr. Macdonald, Dr. Hunter and others. Letters of regret at absence were received from Rev. J. W. McCaughan, Rev. Prof. Clark, Mr. Kelso and Provost Welch. The Mayor spoke very highly of the work of the institution and paid a high tribute to Mrs. VanKoughnet, who has been at the head of the institution for the last 40 years. The children were seated behind the chairman, and, after his remarks, sang in chorus, "The Land of the Maple," waving miniature Union Jacks and maple leaves. The girls are an exceedingly bright and happy lot of youngsters. The girls looked pretty in their dark blue dresses and white aprons. The boys were neatly dressed in grey, with dark blue neckties. The happy, healthy looks of the children spoke volumes for the management of the institution.

The Secretary's report was read by Mrs. Charlotte E. Leigh; the adoption was moved by Ald. Scott and seconded by Rev. A. Hart. During the year there had been admitted into the Home 116 children—boys 71 and girls 45. These were made up of religious denomination as follows: Church of England 64, Presbyterian 19, Methodist 15, Congregationalist 3, Baptist 8, Christian Workers 5, Protestants, not otherwise named, 2. The localities from which they come were: The city 80, born in the States 7, in Newfoundland 1, in Montreal 2, in England 1, and the remaining 25 in different parts of Ontario. In all 119 have gone from the Home, 72 boys and 47 girls; taken by relatives 62, boys 42, girls 20; apprenticed 31, 19 boys and 12 girls; adopted 9, 2 boys and 7 girls; doing for themselves 3, 1 boy and 2 girls; left without an order 3 boys; died 8, boys 6, girls 2; sent to Orillia 8, boys 6, girls 2; sent to Alexandria School, 1 girl; sent to the Shelter, 1 boy; average number of children 195; of inmates 210. The report now went into the detailed work of the year, as shown month by month. A number of picnics and outings had been given the children during the summer season, while the little ones at Christmas-tide were not forgotten.

The Treasurer's report was read and showed receipts for the year to amount to \$10,829, made up as follows: Bequests, \$4,229; city grant, \$1,420; Government grant, \$1,376; lady managers' collections, \$1,249; relatives' contributions, \$1,045; rent, \$700; interest, \$451; Lady True Blues and Orange contributions, \$215; Christmas gifts of money, \$45; miscellaneous, \$95. Expenditures amounted to \$10,401, made up as follows: Improvements to building, \$1,370; fuel, \$1,323; salary and wages, \$1,803; milk, \$1,241; bread, \$1,027; sundry disbursements, \$708; groceries, \$597; dry goods, \$576; repairs, 480; meat, \$393; flour and vegetables, \$296; boots and shoes, \$275; furniture, \$190; house, \$120; printing and stationery, \$108; medicine, \$9. The books showed a balance on hand of \$600.

The medical report was submitted and showed that the general health of the children was excellent. Many of the children had had consumptive parents, and under ordinary circumstances would have been likely to have acquired the disease, but owing to the very healthy institution this was avoided.

A beautiful address and handsome silver salver was presented to Mrs. VanKoughnet by her co-workers in the home on her retirement from the institution.

Votes of thanks were passed to the medical staff, the clergy, the retiring managers and officers, and the donors and friends of the home.

The meeting was closed by the National Anthem and three rousing cheers and a tiger for the Queen, led by the Mayor and the boys.

THE FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
PROTESTANT ORPHANS' HOME.

TORONTO, 1st June, 1897.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

In presenting the 46th Annual Report of the Protestant Orphans' Home to yourselves and the public, the Lady Managers must ask for your kind indulgence while they narrate the events of the closing year.

There have been admitted into the Home, 116 children. Boys, 71; Girls, 45.

By religious denomination:—64 Church of England; 19 Presbyterian; 15 Methodist; 3 Congregationalist; 8 Baptist; 5 Christian Workers, and 2 Protestant not otherwise named.

The localities from which they have come, have been—80 from the City; 7 born in United States; 1 born in Newfoundland; 2 in Montreal; and the rest, 25, in different places in Ontario; 1 in England.

The number who have gone from the Home have been 119. 72 boys; 47 girls. Taken by relatives, 62—boys, 42; girls, 20. Apprenticed, 31—boys, 19; girls, 12. Adopted, 9—boys, 2; girls, 7. Doing for themselves, 3—boys, 1; girls, 2. Left without an order—boys, 3. Died, 8 children—boys, 6; girls, 2. Sent to Orillia—2 girls. Sent to Alexandria School—1 girl. Sent to the Shelter—1 boy. Average number of children, 195; of inmates, 210.

In June (this Report will now follow the months throughout the year), after communicating with the Crown Attorney of Algoma, one of the girls was recalled and placed under the care of the Children's Aid Society, being too old to re-enter the Home.

In July, some of the boys and girls were allowed out with their friends for the summer holidays. The plumbing was all looked after during this month. The first sickness began—with the measles; nine cases were sent to the General Hospital, two in the Home. Tenders for coal were called for and obtained. Messrs. Gooderham and McIntyre invited the children to a treat at Oakville by the steamer "Greyhound," and on the 8th July, Mrs. Morrow gave them a Picnic at Ravenswood, in Mrs. Arthurs' beautiful grounds.

In August, the Managers did not hold a Monthly meeting as many were away. The Boys' Superintendent said in his Report, "the general conduct of the boys has been very good." They enjoyed an Entertainment given by the Morris Bros., very much, also Mrs. Carlyle's treat of ice cream and cakes. The Lady True Blues gave the children a delightful electric drive and sumptuous tea. Mr. Duncan Blue, C.P.R., sent them raspberries and blueberries from Algoma (also fish, when in season), which were thoroughly enjoyed. The girls knitted two dozen pair of stockings, made and repaired clothing, and in the sewing room the girls' uniform is nearly completed. Willie Brown, aged four years, did not recover from the measles, but died on the 13th August at the General Hospital. He was buried from the Home for Incurables, where his mother was an inmate.

In September, we find that three boys who had left without an order and played truant, returned, looking very dirty and miserable; they were glad to be taken in again. Mrs. McDougall kindly instructed the children in musical exercises once a week. The Exhibition was enjoyed this month. During the Summer, Miss Wheelright underwent a severe operation on one of her eyes, which she bore with fortitude and experienced relief from her sufferings, which had been very great.

In October, the funeral of Harry Pridding, aged 10 years (who died September 29th, at the Toronto Western Hospital from lung trouble), took place from the Home, and was a very solemn service for the children, who mourned the loss of their playfellow. They sang "Safe in the Arms of Jesus" with great feeling. This poor boy's mother was with him most of the time. Several clergymen offered to get out a chart, and take in turn to give a short service in the Home, if allowed to do so. The children had two nice intellectual treats this month from Mr. Cork, in the Home, and an invitation from the Rev. Charles Ingles, of St. Mark's Church, Parkdale. The Rev. Charles Darling also invited 40 children each day, to the Bazaar for his Church, where they were very much amused and generously treated by a lady. A legacy was received of \$181.03 from Mr. Eddington's executors. Visitors have repeatedly remarked about the happy and healthy faces of the children in the Home.

In November, there were four baptisms of children by the Rev. J. McLean Ballard. The plumber's bill was under consideration after repairs and alterations made, which were thought necessary for the health of the 223 inmates. Miss Morse and Miss Morgan endeavoured to re-arrange the Library for the children, and advertized for more books. A legacy of \$50 was received from the executors of the late Rev. David Carscaden, of

Forest, who had adopted one of the little girls. The widow not feeling able to provide for her, she was transferred as an apprentice to another place (a nephew of Mrs. Carscaden). Fifty of the boys and girls were invited to hear the Victoria Minstrels, by the Rev. G. Davidson. Through the kindness of J. Ross Robertson, Esq., M.P., 160 of the little ones were taken (free of cost by the T. S. R.) to the Pavilion to see the Monkey Theatre, with which they were delighted. It must not be forgotten that all this time the lessons were going on regularly under Miss Armstrong, the Lady Principal and the other teachers, who take a great interest in their studies, and also in the Kindergarten classes. All those connected with the School and Home, and also the Sunday School are agreed in the desire to send out good children, who will be a blessing to themselves and others. Through the very kind thoughtfulness of St. Andrew's C. E. Society of Drumbo, eleven barrels of apples were received, and needless to say enjoyed by the many little mouths.

In December, the children's month, the Angel of death again hovered near and took a sweet little girl of 3½, Cora Eva Findley, of diphtherial croup, away to the bright world beyond. The rest of the nursery children were isolated, and two others, Ethel Levaek and Lottie Gillespie were sent to the Isolation Hospital (where they recovered). Eventually, no more cases appearing, they were allowed downstairs again. A few words of praise must be given to the nurses in charge of them, who were assiduous in their duty. The Managers also wish to give a hearty vote of thanks to the members of the Medical Staff for their unremitting kindness to the children. During this month Miss Wheelright removed to her sister's, in Bellevue Avenue, and one of the older girls went with her. A legacy of \$4,000 had been left by Miss Jane Porter, but was disputed by her relatives, who were not affluent themselves. The matter was left in the hands of the Home's invaluable solicitor, Huson Murray, Esq., Q.C. The Managers would wish here, to express their great appreciation of Mr. Murray's services. In acknowledging the receipt of an Indenture with a girl, a person said the terms were "unreasonable," so the Secretary was obliged to say in return, "she was the only one who had said so." As a rule the small annual payments for apprentices is made very promptly (*the* exception proves the rule!) the farmers evidently feeling glad that there is some provision being made for the girls and boys when their time is up with them. If they go at eleven years of age and remain until seventeen, the sum is fifty-four dollars, with a little interest. They have to be fed, clothed and sent to school part of the time, and to be treated with consideration. Should any child be found to be unsuitable to the

place, it can be transferred to another; sometimes with very good results. The Managers are glad to say that in their short letters, it is very soon, "*we* have horses, and *we* have cows on *our* place;" or "Uncle John has given me a lamb;" showing how thoroughly they become one with the others. Dear children, what an untold blessing for them when they are taken into the family life once more. Of course Santa Claus (personated by Major Leigh) appeared on the scene with all his books, toys, etc., taken from an "Exhibition" chimney, kindly lent by Mr. Winsor of Peter Street, to the great delight of all the little people. Many kind gifts were received at the Home for the Christmas dinner, for which the Lady Managers were most grateful.

The New Year opened with 183 boys, 80 girls and 15 of a staff in the Home. Illness still prevailed. A letter was received from Mr. J. Ross Robertson, saying, "I write to ask that you will kindly call the attention of your Board to the fact that the Hospital for Sick Children will take care of any sick children whom you may have in your building, free of all charges; of course we are prohibited from receiving patients suffering from contagious diseases." This kind offer was accepted with thanks, and the former engagement closed with the Toronto Western Hospital.

February was the most trying month of all, having lost three children, two at the Isolation Hospital, namely: Annie Davis, aged 5 years, of paralysis of the heart, and Eddie Ussher, aged 8, of diphtheria. The mothers of both of these children were with them part of the time. At the Home, Duncan Blue, aged 3 years and 5 months, died from croup of a malignant type, after a short illness; every means were taken to prolong life that modern science could suggest, but without effect. His father hurried from Port Coldwell, Algoma, but was only in time for the last sad rites. This was a very distressing case, and occurred on the 4th of February. A special meeting was held soon after at 150 Beverley Street, by the Lady Managers. The chief brightness of the month appears to have been that Mr. Edwards, who has always been so kind, offered to come and give the boys singing lessons, if allowed to do so. There was also a legacy received from the late Mr. Milloy's estate, of \$3,000.

In March, a boy of four years, named Carlton Bates, died from convulsions, in the Home, where his mother was constantly with him to the last. He was always a delicate child, and his whole desire was to go to his Father. The Matron said in her Report (30th March), "we hope to be out of quarantine this week; any sickness for the last three weeks, extremely light;" which was cheering news, and some boys who had been treated by Dr. Price Brown at the Toronto Western Hospital, returned fully recovered.

The seal of the Institution was affixed to the release of a legacy of \$500 left by the late Mr. Robinson of Brampton. Mr. Murray wrote, on "the Election of Managers," as Mr. Hart A. Massey's bequest was "conditional" on having a Board of different denominations. The Managers who have been collecting for the Home, say that it is very difficult to get anything this year, owing to the idea having gone abroad that this is such a wealthy Institution, not bearing in mind that although out of debt, it has not any special endowment, but has to be provided by the generosity of friends with funds for maintenance; small proportion of which is given by the Civic and Ontario Government, and by the relatives of the children.

April at last saw an improvement in health; the children were allowed to attend the Easter services at Church, where they had been much missed, and many an anxious eye was cast at the galleries in their absence. They have become a feature of interest to the congregation, especially when a boy and girl advance from either side to place their offerings upon the plate held by the Churchwardens; the scene is not without a silent eloquence of its own.

May dawned more brightly, with a kind offer from Mr. Kelso of the Parliament Buildings, to visit any of the children out in homes in different parts of the country; an offer of which the Managers were very glad, and accepted with gratitude. Mr. Kelso also gave a lime-light lecture one evening on humane subjects, in the Recreation Hall, which was formerly the Schoolroom, in the Home. Mr. Hughes, Public School Inspector, came before the Board on matters concerning the School and pupils, and there is a prospect of the commencement of manual training in the School, after the holidays. Mr. Murray announced the receipt of a legacy of \$200 from Mr. Gilmour's estate. The Managers desire to express their satisfaction with Miss Deacon, as Matron, during a time of much anxiety.

Before drawing to a close the Lady Managers wish to express their warmest thanks to all who have remembered and helped the Home in any way, assuring them that be it much or little, such help is most gratefully received by them.

Not long since, a very admirable white knitted quilt was sent by an old lady in Perth, as a Jubilee offering to the Home. Another pretty scarlet and white one was contributed by the Willing Workers of Christ Church. The *Sentinel* is sent regularly, and much appreciated.

The retiring Managers for the year are Miss Morse, Miss Morgan, and the First Directress, Mrs. VanKoughnet, who for 44 years has guided the affairs of the Home (19 years as First

Directress) in the most successful way, and with excellent business capacity. It is with the deepest regret that the other members of the Board say farewell to her, and their only hope is, that as Honorary President they may still avail themselves of her ripe experience and advice. They would say at parting, "May God bless you, for no one can do for the Orphans what you have done."

worthy of the trust, that the greatest success of the undertaking has had its source in your constant and watchful supervision, and if you have gathered round you others to take a similar interest in the orphan children, it is because they have been influenced by your own example of devotion and love. We regret that you now find it necessary to retire from the active duties of first directress, which you have filled in such an admirable manner, but we trust that in your position as honorary president your valuable advice and the benefit of your long experience will always be available to the managers. We ask your acceptance of this silver salver as a small token of the love and esteem of the board, the result of your affectionate and harmonious ruling.

A BOY'S LETTER, IN PART.

MAY 14th, 1897.

DEAR FRIEND:

It seems as if I never was going to write to you, but I never forget you. We have been so very busy this last month, and the month before I had no stamps, so you must excuse me this time. I like my place very well; we have fowl and cows and horses, of course. I get lots of rides on horseback, but it is rather rough, as we have no saddle. We haven't started driving yet, as W—— has been so sick, but I expect to as soon as he is well. . . . We are setting quite a few hens, and have young ducks and chickens out already. . . . Mr.—— farm is 100 acres all clear. The factory is on the farm, and it is nice looking at the large engine and machinery. There is two men besides myself. When the Missus goes away I have to keep house; on such occasions I have to fly around to get my house work and mine done, but I generally get it all done. . . . We have lots of wild flowers here, large white ones, and blue, yellow and white violets. We have leeks in the bush, so it is quite nice to have all around us.

MEDICAL REPORT.

In presenting the Forty-sixth Annual report, we have to record a series of more or less extensive epidemics of scarlatina, measles and diphtheria. The extent to which these diseases affect the "Home" varies from year to year according to the number of children rendered immune by a previous attack. However, by prompt isolation and careful nursing, we passed through each outbreak very well. It is extremely difficult to prevent these diseases gaining an entrance, as parents from all parts of the city and country visit their children, and in this way contagion is easily introduced.

The general health of the children is excellent, and a splendid test of the healthfulness of the "Home" is the fact that although a large number of these children have had either a consumptive father or mother, and who under ordinary circumstances would have been very liable to have acquired consumption; yet, with the very thorough ventilation, abundance of light and sunshine in every room, wholesome food, cleanliness, and large airy playgrounds, are growing up healthy boys and girls, and will reach manhood and womanhood strong and vigorous. Of course it is impossible during an epidemic to prevent a few of such children breaking down, and of such are the deaths during the year.

Our attendance is always a pleasant duty, owing to the uniform courtesy of the Lady Managers, the faithful and cheerful services of Miss Deacon and all the nurses and attendants, and the happy greetings of the children.
