

Premier Majora told him it would be equivalent to suicide to enter that hotbed of anarchists.

Some of the highest officers of the army are protesting vigorously against the maintenance of the censorship. They regard this restriction as foolish and useless and giving play to the wildest and most exaggerated stories. They say they have received despatches from officers at the front insisting that all the anarchy has been caused by the useless censorship. They declare this only has agravated matters and that it would be better to tell the entire truth.
