"may, on the request of any city or incorporated town "or municipality, appoint a Chief District Health Officer for such city, town or municipality, at a salary of "not more than fifteen hundred dollars a year. Such "salary shall be paid as follows: One-third by the Receiver General, and the other two-thirds by the city, town "or municipality for which such officer is appointed."

The important provision follows that such officer "shall be a regularly registered physician and shall possess "a diploma of Public Health from some recognized university or shall obtain one within eighteen months of "his provisional appointment." A diploma of public health is only to be obtained after a course of study in many subjects outside the regular medical course. It includes sanitary engineering, hygeine, analysis of water and foods, quarantine and bacteriology.

Section 13 provides that the District Health Officer shall be "the executive officer of the local board of health officers and inspectors.

The duties of the District Officer are set forth in twelve sub-clauses. They include the enforcement of sanitary laws and regulations; the abatement of nuisances; the regulation of closets, sinks, drains, stables &c.; notification of infectious diseases; inspection of the sanitary condition of schools, workships, &c.; gratuitous vaccination; the charge of quarantinable diseases; affording such medical relief to the poor as public health requires; examination of the water supply, the milk supply and the inspection of food. 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
