The fisheries furnished employment last year to 65,926 men in vessels and boats, and 25,206 persons of both sexes were employed on shore in factories and packing houses. The fishing fleet of Canada consists of 1,648 ailing vessels and tugs and 36,761 boats. Fishing is nat a waning but a growing industry in Canada.

AT THE ADJOURNMENT.

The House of Commons has adjourned after being less than a month in session. Notwithstanding that nine days were taken up with the debate on the address, for which the Opposition were clearly responsible, considerable progress has been made by the introduction of sev-

which the Opposition were clearly responsible, considerable progress has been made by the introduction of several important Government measures.

Among those which have advanced a stage are the trade agreement with the West Indies, the new Bank Act, the act relating to Radio-telegraphs, and the act to increase the pay of the North West Mounted Police. The act to encourage the improvement of the highways, which was killed by the Liberal majority in the Senate, last session, was reintroduced. The report of Sir George Murray on the reorganization of the public service of Canada has been tabled in the House and will be given early consideration by the Government. Several private bills of general interest were also introduced.

Interest naturally centres on the situation which has developed in relation to Mr. Borden's proposals as embodied in the Naval Aid Bill. During the past week the time of the House was taken up mainly with the debate on Sir Wilfrid Laurier's amendment. When the House reassembles the Opposition may prolong the debate, but will fail if they expect to embarrass the Government. Supported by a solid majority of nearly fifty, the atrong position in which the Government stands cannot be successfully assailed. Neither is this an issue in which, at Sir Wilfrid Laurier's instigation, the Liberal majority in the Senate could throw out the bill with impunity.

If such a course were adopted it would not involve

the dissolution of Parliament and an election, but there is every indication that partisan obstruction would result in reforms in the Senate itself. The strong sentiment which prevails throughout the country in favor of Mr. Borden's proposals would warrant this course being taken. Parliament will reassemble on January 14th with the Government fully prepared to effectively meet any factious opposition that may develop.

A SCHOOL FOR BRIDES.
