London, April 27 (3.13 a.m.)—To the Canadians belongs the honor of spoling the Germans' plan in Flanders, accoroding to a despatch to the Dally Mall from its correspondent in Nortehrn France. They were supported in turns by a French force, by Zouaves, by Belgians and by English regiments. The guns they lost temporarily were not behind their line but on the left side.





was produced and witness said that he had analysed some of the contents and found morphine and mecunic acid and they are constituents of optum; having found these substances witness said he would pronounce the contents of the can to be opium.

A small white far found in Hop Lee's place by Deputy Chief Jenkins was then produced and witness said he found it contained small pills, and on making an analysis of the contents found it to be opium.
