Is it Punishment? Imprisonment "with hard labor," for crime committed, does not seem to be a very great punishment when compared with other modes of life. The idea of restraint is really the only punishment inflicted. Look at young Walworth for instance, who has been convicted of calmly killing his father for what appeared to him a good and sufficient reason.

Full proof of premeditation not having been furnished to the jury, all the public have no doubts on that point. The murder is classified as one of the second degree, and "hard labor for life" is the sentence. The unphilosophical mind confuses the pleasure of a man in a treadmill, living on black bread and water, and sleeping on straw-covered mats, and the punishment seems worse than hanging by the neck until dead.

Halifax has a weather prophet in the person of Mr. Frederick Allen, who predicts the state of the weather thirty-six hours in advance. Picnic parties always depart before starting on an excursion. It is a very profitable trade for the newspaper.
