JANUARY 1st, 1843.

THE Visitors of ST. GEORGE'S DISTRICT VISITING SOCIETY having terminated another year in the relief of the Poor of this Parish, rejoice in the opportunity which is afforded them of bearing favorable testimony to the little Institution which now claims the patronage and support of the Public.

Since the formation of this Society, (now two years,) the Visitors have had cause to bless the Giver of all Good, for the means placed at their disposal, and for the various and interesting opportunities afforded them, of administering to the relief and comfort of the sick and afflicted, and only regret that their limited funds have compelled them in many instances to be less liberal than they could desire. Still a large amount of good has been effected, and the necessities of the Poor have not only been investigated and relieved, but many cases of fraud detected and exposed.

The spiritual, as well as the temporal interests of those around us have not been overlooked; and we have humbly endeavoured to lead the careless and unawakened to wait upon the ordinances of Religion, and improve their Day of Grace.

It is peculiarly encouraging, and calls for grateful acknowledgment, that the Funds of the District Society have not diminished since our last Report, and we would affectionately congratulate the Rich and the Poor on the support it has received, and the good, which under the Divine Blessing, has been effected. To that Gracious Being, who has the hearts of all in His hands, and who only can dispose us to devote a part of our worldly substance, in the relief of the deserving Poor, be ascribed all the Praise.

Increasing observation and experience convince us more and more powerfully of the necessity and benefit of the District Visiting Society, as the organ of communication with the Poor, and the least exceptionable mode of dispensing charity. Whilst therefore we would again recommend it to the cordial support of all who feel it a duty and privilege to relieve the sick and needy, we would commend it to the Blessing of God, and pray that the hearts of many may be enlarged to contribute freely towards St. George's District Visiting Society.
