crucial rebuff. Following the example

MONTREAL, June 21.—Several interest-

ing decisions were rendered in the Court

of Appeal yesterday. In the long pend-

ing case of Hon. Mr. Lafontaine against

the Toronto Mail, the verdict of the court

below granting \$10,000 to the plaintiff

and dismissing a motion for arrest of

Judge Church and Baby dissented on the

ground that the damages awarded were

excessive, but the majority of the court

were against them. Chief Justice Sir A.

Dorion stated that there had been ac-

cused and malice in the accusations pre-

ferred by the Mail, and four years after

he had retired from public life. A slur

was cast upon the name of Hon. Mr.

Lafontaine, by accusing him of having in-

duced three individuals to commit a

crime for which they had been sent to

prison. The count had no right to disturb

the verdict and a new trial would not

therefore be granted. An appeal to the

Privy Council will likely be taken.

The Brockville Recorder mourns the

counties to the plains of the Northwest
