

FROM THE STATES.

Boston, June 9.
The Herald's Washington despatch says it is not to be inferred that J. F. Davis will be tried in the district of Columbia because he was indicted there. He was not indicted at the instance of the Government and may likewise be indicted in Maryland, and the Eastern district of Pennsylvania, and if so may be tried in one which the Government may see fit to turn him over.

The times' Washington despatch says it is reported that John Mitchell, now editor of the New York Daily News, has been notified by the President to leave the United States if he wished to avoid an arrest.

It is now stated on good authority that the Government is sending two hundred thousand inhabitants of Virginia, eleven thousand of whom are in Richmond.

The report of Kirby Smith going to Mexico is confirmed. He takes with him a large amount of money.

The rebel soldiers are active in sulding guerillas in the Southern States; no mercy as shown them.

June 10.
Portions of a wreck were found a few days ago by a pilot boat off Cape May, which were ascertained to belong to the steamer Admiral Dupont, a transport that sailed from New York on the 7th for Fortress Monroe.

It has been ascertained that the explosion of the Ordnance boat at City Point, last autumn, by which 70 or 80 lives were lost and a large amount of property destroyed, was the work of rebel agents who were paid in gold by the Richmond Government.

Nearly all the leading Generals have left Washington.

President Johnson moved into the Executive mansion yesterday.

He is constantly engaged with Southern delegations on the subject of reconstruction.

Boston, 12th.
Steamship Perfexion with dates to June 2, has passed Farther Point.

Political news devoid of interest.

Race of Derby easily won by the French horse Gladateur. London papers congratulate France on the triumph.

Bank of England has reduced rate of discount to 3 per cent.

Breadstuffs dull and irregular, and all qualities slightly lower.

Provisions quiet and steady. Cereals 8 1/2 to 90.

Steamer Admiral Dupont, before reported sunk, collided with Sadoona from Philadelphia for St. John, and went down in 3 minutes. Seven lives lost.

The Stadoona saved the survivors, but subsequently got ashore on Nantucket, and is reported in a dangerous position. Crew landed.

Steamer Gov. Troup was recently burnt on the Savannah River, eleven miles below Augusta, and forty lives were lost.

The steamer had a cargo of cotton, which, with the vessel, was a total loss.

June 13.
Judge Underwood of the Eastern Section of Virginia, in Washington in consultation with the Attorney General with regard to the indictment of Lee, Garret, Howell, Longstreet, ex-governors Smith and others, for treason.

It is rumored that John Mitchell has also been indicted for treason.

A tremendous explosion of loose powder and fixed ammunition took place in Chattanooga, 10th inst., destroying property valued at a quarter of a million of dollars.

June 14.
A small locomotive was recently tried near London. A boy of eight years was the acting engineer and steers. There was likewise on board a boy, of fourteen or fifteen years, to be appointed to act consulting engineer in case of difficulty. The engine is on four wheels. The boiler is carried in a little cradle in front, and the engine and water supply tank are under the seat. The weight of the locomotive is about two hundred pounds, and the power is about half a horse nominal. There was no smoke or steam put off, and the little engine had machine under perfect control, and stopped it in its length upon request. The cost of fuel or working is said to be under a half-penny per hour.

Among the guests entertained by the Colonial Secretary, at dinner on the Queen's birthday, were the Hon. Mr. McGee, and the members of the Canadian delegation now in London. The Canadian News of the 13th ult., says that previous to the reception at the Queen's Court held on the 15th at Buckingham Palace, the Right Hon. Edward Cardwell, Secretary of State for the Colonies, presented the Hon. John A. McDonald, the Hon. George Etienne Cartier, the Hon. Alexander Tilloch Galt, and the Hon. George Brown, all of whom had the honour of kissing Her Majesty's hand. The Delegates dined with the Prince of Wales at Marlborough House on the 19th ult. They were expected to leave England for home this day, June 10.

AGE OF PUBLIC MEN.—The Ministry of Great Britain is largely composed of men in the "sere and yellow" leaf. Lord Palmerston is 81; Earl Russell, 73; Milner Gibson, 58; the Lord Chancellor, 65; and Mr. Gladstone, who is considered a young man yet, 50. Lord Derby, the Tory leader, is 60, and his lieutenant, Mr. Disraeli, is 60.

Louis Napoleon is 57; the Emperor of Russia, 47; and Victor Emmanuel, 46.

Of American statesmen and politicians, President Johnson and Jeff. Davis are both of Louis Napoleon's age, 57; Mr. Seward, Senator Wade and William A. Graham of South Carolina are 65; Thaddeus Stevens is 72, and so is John Slidell; Mr. Fessenden and Henry A. Wise are 59; Charles Francis Adams is 58; Chief Justice Chase is 57; Charles Sumner and Senator Morgan of New York are 54; Henry Wilson, Fernando Wood and Alexander H. Stephens are 53; Gen. Banks is 49, Henry Winter Davis 48, Vallarigham 44, Speaker Colfax 42, and Senator Sprague of Rhode Island, who has been Governor, General and U. S. Senator, is but 35.

It is said that Lieut. Colonel Anderson has resigned the post of Adjutant General of the Militia because of a difference of opinion with His Excellency relative to the "Camp of Instruction." The "Gazette" contains the resignation of Deputy Adjutant General Pyle also, and the appointment in his stead of Captain Hallows of H. M. 15th Regt. Captain Moody, A. D. C., is appointed Quarter Master General, during the temporary absence from the Province of Lieut. Col. W. B. Robinson.

The St. John Globe says.—From information received by the last English mail, we think we are justified in stating that His Excellency, the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, has received the appointment of Governor and Admiral-in-Chief of Hong Kong. We have no positive information as to when His Excellency will leave New Brunswick; but, probably, two or three months will elapse ere his departure. The salary of the Governor of Hong Kong is £50,000 sterling annually, which is £2,000 more than His Excellency's present salary; the duties are much more onerous than those of Governor of New Brunswick; they are also of much greater importance, as they often relate to matters of interest to the empire.

ACCIDENT TO THE STEAMER HIGHLANDER.—The Carleton Sentinel says.—We are sorry to have to record another accident to the steamer "Highlander," which arrived here in tow of the "Antelope" to-day. On her trip from Woodstock on Saturday, when about half-way down, her main shaft fell apart in the middle, owing to a flaw in the iron at the welding. The "Highlander" has been making most excellent time; that trip would have made 600 miles travel in the week. She left Fredericton on Friday morning, went to Grand Falls and returned, and was at 3 o'clock, p. m., half way down when the accident happened. She had, in about 26 hours running time, made 216 miles. "Our fleet of up-river steamers this summer are all of a first rate order for the route; it is speedy, in good order, and what is of very great importance to the traveller, all under the control of gentlemanly and obliging officers."

In an investigation into a robbery case at Hamilton, C. W., recently, one of the witnesses, Armstrong, a detective, testified that a gang of burglars had been carrying on their operations all winter; that the Chief of Police and Alderman Patterson were partners in the trade the burglars carried on—in disposing of their stolen goods through the country—and derived a profit of ten per cent for protecting them in their nefarious business. Sergeant McDowell, of the Toronto police force, is also an implicated party. The robbers carried on what they called a "weeding out" process. They entered a store, took such goods as they wanted, and then quietly withdrew. Some stores they went over three times in the course of the season.

COUNTERFEIT NOTES.—A person from Nova Scotia, supposed to reside near Windsor, recently succeeded in passing, in this city, bills to the amount of \$500 or \$600 of American banks, which notes have since turned out to have been counterfeit. Mr. Hallcock, who accepted the notes, is in possession of the person from whom he received them.

A verdict of "Death by Poison administered at the hands of her husband, T. Frank Whittier, with malice throughout and intent to kill," was brought in by the Coroner's Jury on the body of Mrs. Hannah Whittier. The Sentinel says that the husband has since been arrested in Houlton, and by the authorities there promptly delivered up to our Sheriff. Pending the examination of the prisoner we forbear further comment.

NEW ZEALAND.—General Cameron has asked for 2,000 men from England as reinforcements. The Secretary of War not only peremptorily declines to send them, but repeats his instructions for the withdrawal of five regiments. The Colonial Government has asked permission to enlist 1,500 men from two troops now in New Zealand as a local force, and the Government is willing to accede to their request. But whether the local corps is to be on the footing of militia, or colonial regiment like the Canadian Rifles does not appear.

The Controller at this port has received official instructions that Her Majesty's Government have determined no longer to enforce certain orders issued in 1863, prohibiting ships of war or privateers of either of the American belligerents from remaining in any British port or within British waters for a longer period than twenty-four hours.

We feel bound to state that the new Militia Bill is one of the most unpopular measures which has been passed by the Legislature for years. The volunteers and militia men feel it a great hardship to leave their employment at the busiest season of the year to play the soldier at the Camp of Instruction for twenty eight days, while many of them have families to support, others again have it in contemplation to try their fortunes where they are assured by numerous friends they will receive ready employment and good wages—in the States. Subalterns also do not care to leave their homes for \$1.50 per day, which sum will hardly pay their hotel expenses, leaving nothing for their time, and little contingencies. In fact from all that is said, it appears probable that the whole affair will prove a failure, in addition to its having been the cause of the resignation of the most popular and effective officer connected with the Militia, Col. Anderson, the Adjutant General. Although the \$30,000 could have been expended with more profit on the roads, and had that amount been properly expended on the Volunteers, its good fruits would be apparent in a short time.

We are happy to state that the Woodstock Railway Bill introduced by Mr. Connell passed the Assembly on the 5th inst., and the Legislative Council on the 7th. We congratulate our Carleton friends on their success. There is a fair prospect now of the main trunk doing a much larger business, when the St. Stephen and Woodstock branches are opened for traffic, and of the N. B. & C. Railway being made the connecting link with Canada. Patience and perseverance overcome all obstacles, and the grand idea of its originators (not one of whom are now living) may be carried out and witnessed by their children—viz. a Railway from St. Andrews to Quebec.

The long "agon" is over and the Legislature was prorogued on the 6th inst., his Excellency assenting to 36 bills. The members have returned to their homes, and we learn that the Attorney General and the President of the Council have been appointed Delegates to the Imperial Government, to assure it of the loyalty of the Province, and also that the feeling of a majority of the people are adverse to Confederation. How the latter information will be received, time will develop. That Confederation will ultimately take place, is not even doubted. Public opinion is liable to change, and upon sober reflection, it will adopt Confederation.

An alarm of Fire was given on Friday night; a flame having been seen issuing from the roof of the kitchen attached to the building owned by Mr. W. Fryer, adjoining Mr. Bradleys. The timely arrival of two young men saved the house as they poured some buckets of water on the fire and put it out. From what we learn, the fire was the work of an incendiary, as some sticks and shavings were discovered where it commenced. Had it occurred later in the night it is believed the whole block of buildings would have been destroyed on the Western side of Water Street, as they are old and were dry.

An accident of a serious nature occurred on the 10th inst., when a young man, on Monday last, was hanging up a pot of wool-

ing tar, which upset, blowing him in a shocking manner, and it is feared may prove fatal.

Excursion.—A large party from Woodstock came down by Railway this forenoon. They have a pleasant day, and we trust will enjoy themselves. It is to be hoped there will be several Railway Excursions this season, both ways Carleton and Charlotte by a frequent interchange of kindly feeling, may benefit themselves socially and commercially.

A Bazaar is to be held by the Ladies of All Saints Church next month, of which due notice will be given. The arrangements we are informed are all that could be desired; a large building has been selected, and is to be fitted up in good style, and no pains will be spared to make the affair pleasant and we trust profitable Excursions from St. John and Woodstock, and other places are in contemplation.

THE UNIVERSITY.—The Fredericton Farmer says, the Douglas Gold Medal at the University was awarded to Mr. George R. Parkins, of the Freshman Class, for the Essay upon "Railroads in their social, moral and financial aspects." Col. Cole's prize of six guineas has been awarded to Mr. E. J. Hewitt, of the Senior Class, for his Essay upon the same subject. Mr. Hannington, of the same class, received the prize given by His Excellency, the Lieutenant Governor, for proficiency in Natural Science. The same gentleman also received the Mathematical Scholarship. The Classical Scholarship was obtained by Mr. R. S. Harrison, and that in the English language and Literature by Mr. Henry.

The bill passed by the Lower House repealing the law under which the Board of Agriculture was constituted, was amended in the Legislative Council; the House of Assembly, however, were not disposed to concur in the amendments made by the Council, and the result was that the bill was postponed for three months.—Globe.

ITEMS.

—The slave trade is still active on some parts of the coast of Africa. There are several steamers engaged in carrying slaves from the coast, and they are two swift for the English cruisers.

—An excursion round the world is being organized at Antwerp. The voyage will last two years, and the principal ports in both hemispheres will be successively visited. It is chiefly intended as a means of educational travel for young men.

—The Albert Mines took fire on Tuesday last and have been burning ever since, although it is probable that by this time the fire is effectually checked. All the steamers in the vicinity were turned into the mine.—It is not likely that the damage will be very great.

—Geo. F. Robinson, of Annotstock County, Me., the soldier who saved Secretary Seward's life, has been presented with the sum of \$1,612, subscribed by the leading citizens of New York, for his courage and fidelity in saving the Secretary's life. The Times state that a gentleman in Bangor has offered to present Mr. R. with 500 acres of land in that county for a stock farm, and to add \$500 in cash to the gift of land, to aid in further development of his farm if he desires to locate in Annotstock. Republics are not ungrateful.

Mr. J. D. Andrews, well known in this city for his activity in securing the passage of the Reciprocity Treaty, has been appointed by the United States Government, to collect information respecting the commerce of the Great Lakes, and report thereon.
