LEGALITIES OF SCOTT ACT ELECTION.

The election on the 14th instant on the petition to determine whether there was to be a revocation of the Scott Act in Westmorland, having decided by a majority of 73 votes against such petition, it is stated in the Moncton Times, on reliable authority, that a recount will be demanded before Judge Botsford...

From this it is evident that the error of the Sheriff in not supplying a sufficiency of ballots practically disfranchised those voters of the two districts who were unable to obtain ballots, and the question is, What is the remedy, if any, for the wrong? The only remedy provided by the Act itself is by a scrutiny before the County Judge, and in looking at the Statute it does not believe that remedy is applicable.

The first section of the Act, under the head of "Scrutiny," enacts, that if within one week after the Returning Officer has summed up the votes and declared the result of the voting, any elector applies on petition to the Judge of the County Court, and shows by affidavit to the Judge reasonable grounds for entering into a scrutiny of the ballot papers, the Judge shall appoint a day for entering into the scrutiny...

NOT YET.

The long wished for, often predicted reaction against corrupt Tory rule has not yet set in. The returns of the election in Halifax County yesterday are not all in, but there appears to be no doubt that Hon. W. S. Fielding is elected by a small majority.

The Moral of the Vote.

The vote of Thursday was a double surprise. So large an English vote in favor of the Act and so unanimous a French vote against was generally unexpected. An analysis of the vote all around shows not only a vigorous growth of late of temperance principles, but an overwhelming sentiment against the bar-room and saloon. That this feeling exists in Salisbury, Sackville, Westmorland and Moncton no one who reads the returns can deny. The opposition developed in the French parishes arose not so much from disfavor for the Act itself as against its non-enforcement. These people are beyond question as good as any nationality question as regards the law, and are as anxious as any to promote sobriety and order; their complaint has been that the Scott Act did not promote temperance, but intolerance; they pointed to dozens of saloons opened for the sale of intoxicants where none existed previous to the Scott Act, which became associated in their minds with all the evils of free whiskey. In Memramcook and Botsford no attempt had been made to restrict the law, and only lately in Shelburne. To correct these evils, the people have seen no recourse except to the License Law. Hence the English and French people voted contrary to the law, and in favor of the Scott Act, which became associated in their minds with all the evils of free whiskey.

Personal and Political.

The Duke of Wellington dropped dead last week at Brighton, England, while entering a railway carriage. General Gordon was twice fired at last Saturday while inspecting the Russian troops at Warsaw.

The position occupied by some of the Blaine papers in the United States would be amusing if it were not humiliating. A while ago they were assailing him in a manner that admitted of no reasonable retraction. At present, while making no attempt to dispose of the really unanswerable charges brought against him, they loudly eulogize him as the embodiment of all that is pure and upright and denounce his opponents as "cads and pharisees."

The Emperor of Germany has rejected the petition for clemency towards Krawzski, the Polish author, recently condemned for treason. Lord George Francis Hamilton and Lord Clarendon Hamilton leave England this week for a tour in Canada and the United States, returning in time for the fall session of Parliament.

The necessity of keeping an eye to the vote often leads politicians from whom better things might have been expected into a most disagreeable disingenuousness. Governor Robinson, of Massachusetts, for instance, who has always been known as a most conscientious gentleman, delivered a speech the other day at the Irish National demonstration in Boston and in that speech he said: "It is said the Irish do not know how to use their privileges. Are they fit to be citizens in Ireland? America answers yes." Now if there is any fact in ancient or modern history which might be regarded as irrefragable evidence in favor of the rights of the Irish at large for the privileges of citizenship, it is that the assassinations, the cattle mutilations, the agrarian outrages of all kinds which have run riot in Ireland for the last eight or nine years, demonstrate the utter inability of the great majority of the Irish to govern themselves.

Trade and Industry.

The Moncton sugar refinery shipped 1699 barrels of sugar in four days last week. Owing to the dullness of the cotton trade in England, the Oldham factories are working only four days a week. Mr. W. F. Shedd, who has been engaged in the lobster packing business at Picton Island, has assigned the building trade in New York to nearly all a standstill on account of the strike of the bricklayers over the nine-hour movement. Fifteen thousand men are idle on account of the strike.

An attachment against the property of Wm. E. Scovill has been filed in a suit brought by Byron D. DeWolf and Samuel H. Swan. The affidavit sets forth that Scovill is concealed in a town in Nova Brunswick and that detectives are on his track. The Customers receipt at Moncton during July were \$857,546, a gain of \$89,756 over the corresponding month last year. This is the first advance in ten months, and is regarded as an indication of a better feeling in commercial circles. The Nova Scotia Cotton Co., limited, held in Halifax on the 6th inst. fifty shareholders being present. The President, Mr. John Doull, stated that a small margin of profit had been earned on the year's business, 200 tons were exported to Moncton, 200 hands employed and 800 pa. per week produced.

New Coal Mine.

What promises to be a valuable coal discovery, owing to the assistance of Daniel McLeod about a mile east of Spring Station, near Spring Hill. The mine is situated on a hillside and is said to be of superior quality. A company has been formed to work the mine and some twelve men and a superintendent are at present engaged in taking out coal, prospecting, etc. A correspondent at Spring Hill writes as follows concerning the new mine: "The coal was found about six hundred yards south of the I. C. R., cropping out on the surface in a manner that would be very irregular—although the seaming is regular, in a manner that would be very irregular. The angle of inclination is considerable, nearly directly north, thus the strike is pure and clean. It is active and west or north parallel with the I. C. R. at this point. The coal is presently being mined at the water level, but as the seam is tapped by a tunnel driven from the river bed and a level is being driven nine feet wide, cross cuts or levels are then driven up hill, these in turn can be crossed out by an upper level, forming a cross board. A siding or branch railway is being constructed, and the question of a few hundred dollars—maintaining coal is being handled away with teams."
