PRINCE ARTHUR.

The Queen's Son at Toronto-A Hearty Reception Accorded Him.

TORONTO, May 30.—When the advance engine and coach, the herald of the approach of the C. P. R. special bringing the royal party to the city, rushed through Parkdale station at 4:35 o'clock yesterday afternoon the platform and space on the outside of the tracks were crowded with people whose curious eves were waiting to people whose curious eyes were waiting to gaze on Queen Victoria's third son. The people whose curious eyes were waiting to gaze on Queen Victoria's third son. The royal party was met by the mayor and aldermen of the city, who came in on the train with them. At the Union Station they were received by a crowd of several thousand people. A guard of honor from the Koyal Scots Infantry was on hand, and some 80 members of the army and navy veterans gathered opposite the Queen's Hotel, where the party will be quartered during their stay here. Prince Arthur inspected the veterans, and was well pleased to find that a number of them had served under him, several having fought in Egypt.

At 7 o'clock a large crowd assembled in the neighborhood of the Queen's Hotel to catch a glimpse of the royal visitors as they drove to Government House, escorted by a detachment from the Queen's Own Rifles, headed by the brass and bugle band.

The royal party is composed of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught and the Duchess of Connaught, Major-General Sir John Mc-Neil, Colonel and Mrs. Cavaye and Dr.

Major-General His Royal Highness Arthur, Duke of Connaught, K.G., K.T., K.P.; G.C.M.G., was born May 1, 1850, He entered the Woolwich Military Academy as a cadet in 1866, became a lieutenant in the Royal Engineers in 1868, and a lieuten-ant in the Royal Artillery in 1869, a lieuten-ant in the Rifle Brigade in the same year, and a captain in 1871. His staff services and a captain in 1871. His staff services are: Brigade major at Aldershot in 1873; brigade major to the cavalry brigadier at the same quarters in 1875, in the October of which year he was appointed assistant adjutant-general at Gibraltar, which post he held until April, 1876. In 1880 he was made a general of brigade at Aldershot. Besides holding other appointments, the Duke \$ colonel-in-chief of the Royal Riffe Corps and personal aide-de-camp to the Duke a colonel-in-chief of the Royal Rifle Corps and personal aide-de-camp to the Queen. He served for several years in Canada as a subaltern in the rifle brigade, being stationed at Montreal. He saw active service in Egypt in 1882, being in command of a division at the battle of Tele-l-Kebin Forseveral years past the Duke has been in command of forces of the Bengal Presidency. Upon resigning that position he resolvad to return to England via Canada, and after leaving India proceeded to China and Japan, where the received enthusiastic welcomes. He is accompanied by General McNeill and other officials. Prince Athur is a studious and accomplished nan, said to be the most intellectual max in the royal family of England. He marned in 1879 the Princess Louise, daughter d Prince Frederick Charles of Prussia, by whom he has three children.

HALIFAX, May 30.—The Echo says: "It would seem from news brought by the steamer Harlaw that matters on the so-called French shore, on the western coast of Newfoundland, are rapidly approaching a crisis. In consequence of the action of the commanding officer of the French ship of war at Bay St. George, requiring the inhabitiants commanding officer of the French ship of war at Bay St. George, requiring the inhabitants to take up their nets, the people have refused to recognize the right of the Government of Newfoundland to collect import duties, and a prominent resident, well known for his thorough grasp of the whole question, on which he has written many trenchant articles in the newspapers of St. Johns, was one of the first to take action by





The Remains of Adam Johnston R covered at Springbank.

The search for the bodies of the young people who were drowned in such an unfortunate manner on Monday last has been carried on with vigor ever since that day. The anxiety of the friends of Adam Johnston and Ida Doherty to discover the body of those who had been harriedly taken away, can readily be imagined. Willing hands have tried many experiments, and the drugging of the river has been continued every day. At about 9 o'clock this meaning the searchers found the body of Adam Johnston at the corner of the pump-house, but that of Miss Doherty has not yet been discovered. Detective Allan is one of those who have been busy dragging. At 9 o'clock this morning he secured the body of young Johnston in a spot some affected or twenty feeet from the northwest corner of the pump house. After his grapping iron was securely fastened he called Mr. Summer to his assistance, and it took the total strength of the two men to draw the body out, it being fastened to some of the rocks or other substance in the bottom of the river. When brought to the surface there were a few cuts and bruises noticeable, but the remains are not particularly affected by the water. Engineer Findlay at once telephoned to the city for a coroner, who went down, accompanied by an employe of Undertaker Ferguson. The body was taken to Ferguson's establishment.

The police contend that Mrs. McGinn is still alive, and is keeping a house of ill-repute in Chicago. They also claim that the girl Howell has no desire to become McGinn's wife, even if she lawfully could do so. During the argument in court Miss Howell, accompanied by her mother, was present. She is a pretty girl, and wears short frocks. She was on the point of crying several times. His Honor Judge McDougall allowed the case to stand until the next assizes.

Charged with Insanity.

Gabriel and Julia Maddigan, living on Horton street, who were arrested last evening, charged with heing insane, were remanded by Police Magistrate Parke to-day, as Dr. T. V. Hutchinson, who laid the information, was unable to be present. Maddigan and his wife have been causing quite a sensation lately by their actions in the neighborhood in which they have been living. Maddigan joined the Salvation Army a short time ago, and was very enthusiastic, but lately, with the help of his wife, he has been making things interesting for his neighbors, and would barricade himself in his house and admit no one. Several unsuccessful attempts having been made by the police to gain admittance to the house, Dr. Hutchinson, the medical health officer, forced op quick movements, secured her, and handed her over to two men who happened to come in. He then turned his attention to finding Maddigan and was in the act of trying a bedroom door when Maddigan jumped out from another room with a gleaming axe in his hand and made several attempts to put an end to the Doctor's existence, but the Health Office, who is a powerful man, warded off the blows. He managed to get in close to Maddigan, and, grabbing him by the throat with one hand, seized hold of the axe with the other and soon had the man disarmed. Satisfying himself that they were insane the Doctor laid an information against them to that effect, with the result that they were arrested and will be examined on Tuesday next.
