RAT PORTAGE, Jan. 28.—Considerable interest is being manifested in the Rainy River district over the death of Thomas Flake Carrothers, who came from St. Marys in June last and settled with his wife and two children in the township of Morley, in the vicinity of the Long Sault Rapids. It is said that his domestic relations were anhappy, and that he had reason to suspect his wife's fidelity. He became morose, and to his neighbors occasionally announced his intention of shooting himself. His wife tells that on the 3rd day of January, while she was down to the river for a pail of tells that on the 3rd day of January, while she was down to the river for a pail of water, Carrothers shot himself, at least on returning she discovered her husband's body lying on the floor in their house, he having apparently shot himself in the head. In Jan. 8 the inquest was held, but from ne evidence that was advanced the jury disagreed. From the evidence that was brought out, however, it would appear that deceased was shot in the back part of the head, about two inches anterior from the ear. MANGLED MINERS.

Dreadful Details of the Mine Disaster at Mammoth.

The Dead Bodies of 110 Men Recovered

with the much greater misery in Berlin and London. No cases of starvation have been reported in Paris, and the liberality and energy of the Government, directed by President Carnot in person, have been and are effective in relieving the multitude of destitute who had flocked to the city.

In London the thousands of workingmen who have applied to the authorities for aid have received but one answer: "Come into the workhouse with your families; we will not assist you outside." From this iron rule there has been no departure and consequently the poor of London remain dependent on private charity.

POLITICAL POINTS.

APPALLING SIGHTS.

Youngwood, Pa., Jan. 28.—When the volunteers entered the exploded mine yesterday a sight impossible to picture met them. Bank cars, mules, and, more terrible than all, men were piled in a compact mass against the ribs or walls of coal, and not a living thing was in the wreckage. It was almost as solid as the coal itself, so terrific was the force of the explosion. This obstruction was removed with difficulty and they then entered a

CHAMBER OF HORRORS.

The first object they discovered after leaving the main entry was a gun box. In it was the leg of a man; further on they found a human head, and after walking a distance surrounded by dangers unseen, but more terrible than can be imagined, they found the trunk. Working their way in, the band found the bodies strewn along the gangway. One unfortunate met death while on his knees in prayer with his hands clasped and eyes upturned. His body was found in this posision. The services of physicians were not needed, for every man in the headings where the explosion occurred was killed. Dead bodies were brought up every few minutes, and the crowd at the shaft mouth simply fell back to allow the men carrying the stretchers room to pass. Every corpse was covered, and no one even ventured to inquire which body it was, for they knew everyone in that part of the mine was dead.

SPECULATING ON THE CAUSE. An English View of Sir Charles Tupper's Trip—Nomination in Welland.

London, Jan. 29.—Sir Charles Tupper's sudden journey is still the subject of discussion in Canadian circles here. The semi-official statement to the effect that he could not take an active part in a general election does not remove the general impression that the object of his visit will prove to be to consult the Cabinet on the trade question before an appeal to the country. He will possibly use his influence to convert the hostile Ministers who are still anxious to keep in the old ruts. Moreover, though the High Commissioner may not himself share actively in the contest in Nova Scotia, where it is believed the Liberal party has gained ground, he doubtless party has gained ground, he doubtless hopes to be able to give a quietly useful support to the Ministry through other channels. These views are held by men here having the best knowledge of Canadian politics.

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



J. B. Ford & Cc., the operators of the largest plate glass plant in the world, commenced drilling for salt in Wyandotte some time ago. The object of the company was that if salt in large quantities was found that chemical works would be established for the manufacture of soda ash and other ingsedients used in the manufacture of plate glass. The other day the drill penetrated through a strata of salt 48 feet in thickness, and another lies below at a depth of about 1,200 feet of a thickness of more than 10 feet. This is eminently satisfactory to the promoters of the concern in Wyandotte, and it is expected that more than \$1,000,000 will be invested. This is as great a supply of salt as has ever been found in Michigan.

Fishing through the ice is a booming winter industry at Bay City. A village has sprung up on the ice at the mouth of the Saginaw River. It is a gathering of hute, sheltering from one to six people each. When a fisherman arrives at the village with his hut, which is on runners, he preempts a claim and proceeds to business. First he cuts a hole in the ice near the middle of his shanty and, after throwing in a quantity of bait to attract the fish, he sits upon a box or barrel and patiently awaits a victim. The fish are speared or hooked, and sometimes with a rapidity that soon fills the little hut. There are about 100 of these fish shanties on the bay, and upwards of 300 men and boys hard at work.


