practical results. Awful Mortality. CALCUTTA, April 24.—A very virulent pidemic of cholera is raging in Benares. repidemic of choiera is raging in Benares. The mortality is very great. Yesterday there were reported 180 new cases and 135 deaths from the disease. Dr. Gregg, the sanitary commissioner for Bengal, recently issued a report upon an outbreak of cholera that occurred at Scrampore, a few miles northwest of this city. Over the whole of the affected area he found that tanks of various shapes size and depuls had been various shapes, sizes and depths had been

various shapes, sizes and depths had been dug and that all contained very dirty water. Low, foul jungles reeking with bad smells surrounded these tanks, the surfaces of which were almost completely hidden with thick decaying water plants, with here and there a clear place where the inhabitants wash their cooking utensils and draw water for domestic use. Between and around the houses are narrow lanes, bordered by narrow, deep, uneven drains, in which filth collects. These substances, under the inrow, deep, uneven drains, in which filth collects. These substances, under the incollects. These substances, under the influence of the hot sun, quickly decompose and emit foul odors. In places Dr. Gregg actually observed "masses of undulating maggots and portions of decaying animals." Wherever the people living in the houses in the neighborhood of these tanks had used the water, there cholera made its appearance. The tanks are also the sources from which the milkmen obtain water for their cows, and it is more than probable they dilute their milk with the same water.

London, Monday, April 25 FUTURE OF THE LONDON AND PORT STANLEY.

As the City of London has a claim of nearly \$900,000 against the London and Port Stanley Railway, the lease of which to the Grand Trunk Railway runs out on Sept. I next, the present position of the negotiations affecting the future disposal of the road is of vital interest to the tax-

The following is an exact statement of the claims against the road by the cities of London and St. Thomas respectively:

It has been said by some that the London City Council, in dealing with the rights of St. Thomas, has not treated that munici pality in a straightforward manner. The facts do not bear out that view. With the object of facilitating the prominion Parliament, the committee of the London Council, subject to the final approval of the aldermen, and to the passage of the legislation, offered to purchase the first and third mortgage bonds of St. Thomas, at their face value, with interest; but the St. Thomas authorities, while saying that they might entertain a cash offer refused to agree to the option to purchase after the bill passed. While sorry that they could not make the arrangement, the London aldermen have to proceed with the neighboring city on the fair basis there game. 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The object of the legislation asked for by the City of London has not as yet been very clearly stated. It is necessitated by the expiry of the lease of the road to the G. T. R. on Sept. 1 next, and the falling years recurrent outbreaks of the disease never found amongst them. By its charter the London and Port Stanley Railway Company was incorporated as a joint stock company, and the original shares are now held as follows: Sir Joseph Hickson (on behalf of the G. T. R.), 2,269 shares; City of London, 1,500; City of St. Thomas, 328; sundry persons, 318-total, 4,415 shares of \$160 each

Thus the Grand Trunk Railway holds the majority of the stock, but the act of 1882 provides that it will take two thirds of the stock to control the road. London holds 1,500 shares, being more than one-third,

and thus has a blocking power. The position of London as a bondholder. however, makes the city virtually owner of the road, but as a matter of fact it could neither sell the road nor buy it in without an act of Parliament.

To give London that control of the road, which its position as bondholder demands, the bill now before Parliament is promoted. When passed, London will have control of the road, be able to elect the board of directors, and make the best use of the auxiliary league of the Salvation Army. property for its owners that is possible. If fair bargain is struck with the Grand Trunk Railway, which has the next greatest interest in the road, so much the better for all parties concerned, and if the interests of St. Thomas can be jointly served with those of London no one here will object. That there may be no mistak. ing the provisions of the measure that Parliament is asked to pass, we append

them, as now amended:

"At the next and at all subsequent general annual meetings and at all other meetings of the London and Port Stanley Railway. Company, hereinafter called the company, the holders of the mortgage bonds or depentures of the mortgage bonds or depentures of the company shall have and possess the same rights, privleges and qualifications for acting and voting as shareholders, and for being elected and acting as directors, as appertain to the shareholders of the company, and each \$100 of the amount of any mortgage bond

or debenture shall be computed for such purpose as one share of capital stock of the

"The mayor and any "The mayor and any member of the Monicipal Council of the Corporation of the City of London, the mayor and any member of the City Council of the Corporation of the City of St. Thomas, any officer of the said corporations or either of them, for the office of director of the company, shall be eligible for election as, and to be a director of the company, although he may not be a shareholder or bond or debenture holder."

In the bill originally, there was a clause empowering the City of London to sell the railway if it saw fit, but as this was opposed by the other parties interested in the line, and as a controlling influence in the future of the railway would fully preserve the in terests of the citizens of London, it was wisely resolved to drop the clause, and simply enact as above atipulated.

DIRT AND DISEASE.

Terrible accounts of the ravages of holera in India have been sent by cable. It is made abundantly evident that the outbreak is the direct result of the filthy habits of the populace. How terrible is the punishment for failing to observe the laws of cleanliness and decency !

On this head the Canada Health Journal

emarks that "every housekeeper or head

of a family should know that the germs or spores of diphtheria and typhoid fever, as well as cholera and probably some other diseases, unlike those of scarlet fever, smallpox, tuberculosis and others, will take root, develop, mature and multiply outside the living human body, or other living organism, as on or in collections—even very small collections, minute quantities of damp, organic waste matter. The typhoid bacillus, for example, is cultivated in the laboratory on the damp, smooth surface of a cut potato. Indeed, it seems that typhoid fever is never communicated directly from one person to another, but that its germs must pass through another phase of existence out-side of a human body after they have been cast off from the body of an infected person before they can again take root in any other body. The same appears to be the case with cholera. The other phase of existence requires damp or moist organic matter with a certain degree of temperature, and it may be, absence of free sunlight. 

Delorme and Frank Lynch have applied for a charter for "The Bickerdike and Crowe Cattle Company." It is understood a couple of larger western shippers and more of Montreal men, in all controlling 60,000 cattle, will compose the company. The idea is to combine and make the rates with the steamship companies, the same as is done in the States.

The Dominien Line Steamship Company has ceased to carry the Canadian mails. Last winter the Allans took a contract with the Government for the mails for one year at £500 per round trip. Lately the Allans proposed to allow the Dominion people only one boat. The latter company refused to go in unless they got two regular boats and have withdrawn from the service.




