The New Parliament. The Act of Confederation provides that each Parliament of Canada shall exist for a term of five years, and no longer.

These facts render very significant the statement made by Sir Hibbert Tupper in the House of Commons on Tuesday night. The junior knight then declared that it was the intention of the high tax leaders to keep back the so-called Manitoba Remedial Bill until the whole of the estimates for 1896 and 1897 were passed.

Surely the Liberal and Independent Conservative members who now represent far more than one-half the people of Canada, will never tolerate any such prostitution of the use of the time at the disposal of Parliament.

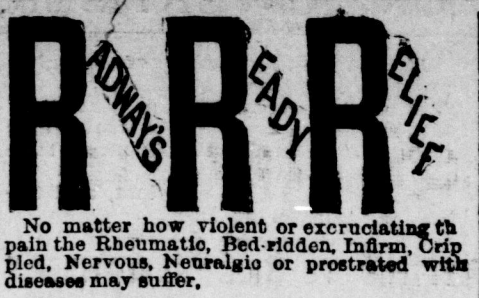
