

The main line of the C. P. R. about 30 miles north of the proposed route of the Grand Trunk Pacific Sheho will be the starting point of the new line to Edmonton. It will run between the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Canadian Northern as far as Saskatoon, where it will cross the Grand Trunk Pacific, and strike the Calgary and Edmonton road at Wetaskiwin, a station about 35 miles south of Edmonton. The Calgary and Edmonton road runs to Strathcona, on the south bank of the Saskatchewan River, and will be carried into the city of Edmonton, on the opposite bank, by means of a high level bridge costing \$2,000,000.

In all about 500 miles of track will be laid to fill the gap between Sheho and Wetaskiwin. Work at both ends. and the middle, will be pushed simultaneously. It is expected the line will be in operation before the end of 1907.

Thus three great trunk railway systems will traverse the fertile section watered by the Saskatchewan and its tributaries, and all three will concentrate upon the city of Edmonton. ******** RECENT RESULTS OF CANCER RESEARCH.

++++++++++++++ [Philadelphia Record.] The origin and nature of cancer, with

a view to the discovery of means for its prevention or cure, are being studied at this time with unprecedented thoroughness and care, and while success has not yet been achieved, some results of promise and importance have been attained. It is said that more has been accomplished toward the solution of a problem which has heretofore baf-

fled the medical science of the world during the last two years and a half than in all the preceding quarter of a century, and conservative students and observers are confident that the light is breaking and that in a relatively brief period the mastery of this dread disease will be accomplished. In the meanwhile some points of an encouraging character have been determined with a high degree of certainty.

It has for one thing been ascertained that there is no good reason for believing that the occurrence of the malady is increasing in frequency. This has frequently been asserted by men who spoke with some authority, but their statement is now declared to be inaccurate. It is based upon statistics which examination has proved to be untrustworthy, and it is now the better opinion, it is the opinion of the highly trained experts who are carrying on the studies of the London Imperial Fund, that cancer is no more prevalent today than it has ever been. The contrary impression is attributable generally reported than they were years ago, and also, that improved methods of diagnosis detect its development under circumstances when it would formerly have escaped detection. The reiterated assertion that the disease was rapidly becoming more common has disagreeably impressed the public mind. It is a relief to be assured that the contrary is true.



Reform Mayor of St. Cloud, Minn. Is Driven Out of Town.

St. Cloud, Minn., Jan. 9. - As a result of Mayor John N. Bensen's effort to live up to his oath of office, and enforce the laws of Minnesota by closing the saloons on week days at 11 p.m. and all day Sunday, the atmosphere of this German town has become too hot for him, and today he left for Mexico, where he will spend the rest of his term.

The agitation which has caused all the trouble began in an evangelistic crusade last fell led by the Rev. Robert E. Johnson. He stirred up the church members to present a petition to the mayor demanding that the saoon closing law be enforced.

It found favor with the mayor, who Issued an order which was to take effect Jan. 1, 1906. 
