Another Great Railway Project.

The important announcement is officially made that the Canadian Pacific Railway will at once begin the construction of a new trunk line between Winnipeg and Edmonton.

The main line of the C. P. R. branches off at Portage la Prairie, in a northwesterly direction, and this branch is already carried to Shebo, a point 200 miles from Winnipeg, and about 20 miles north of the proposed route of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

The decision will throw the whole camp into confusion. Mr. Wallace McLean, who has made a study of the mining region for the Toronto Globe, says that the litigation in question will jeopardize the title of the square miles of mining which the very center of the companies un-

der attack, the Temiskaming and Hudson's Bay Mining Company, comprises nearly the whole population of the town of New Liskeard. The company was organized and its agents were prospecting before the discovery of silver at Cobalt, but as soon as the discovery was announced it sent its prospectors to Cobalt and secured patents for twelve claims, one of which it is mining with great success.

The importance of the Attorney-General's decision lies in the fact that it affords a precedent for attacking the claims of practically the whole Cobalt camp. For the decision means, if it means anything, that the recent regulation of the department insulating upon the applicant's affidavit being verified by the inspector is to be made retroactive, and that no lease or patent can be regarded as valid until the affidavits upon which such lease or patent was granted have been verified.

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RECENT RESULTS OF CANCER RESEARCH.

[Philadelphia Record.] The origin and nature of cancer, with a view to the discovery of means for its prevention or cure, are being studied at this time with unprecedented thoroughness and care, and while success has not yet been achieved, some results of promise and importance have been attained.

It is said that more has been accomplished toward the solution of a problem which has heretofore baffled the medical science of the world during the last two years and a half than in all the preceding quarter of a century, and conservative students and observers are confident that the light is breaking and that in a relatively brief period the mastery of this dread disease will be accomplished.

In the meantime, while some points of an encouraging character have been determined with a high degree of certainty, it has for one thing been ascertained that there is no good reason for believing that the occurrence of the malady is increasing in frequency. This has frequently been asserted by men who spoke with some authority, but their statement is now declared to be inaccurate. It is based upon statistics which examination has proved to be untrustworthy, and it is now the better opinion, it is the opinion of the highly trained experts who are carrying on the studies of the Landon Imperial Fund, that cancer is no more prevalent today than it has ever been.

The contrary impression is attributable to the fact that cases of it are more generally reported than they were formerly, and also that improved methods of diagnosis detect its development under circumstances when it would formerly have escaped detection. The reiterated assertion that the disease was rapidly becoming more common has been disagreeably impressed upon the public mind. It is a relief to be assured that the contrary is true.

Another point which has been pretty well if not absolutely settled relates to the question of heredity. There are probably few families in which some case of cancer has not occurred more or less remotely. The circumstance is usually as far as possible concealed, but to many of those who become aware of it the anxiety which it occasions is none the less distressing because it is likely not to be excluded.

They worry about the possibility of their meeting the same fate as some one or other of their relatives, and this is the very worst thing they could do. The whole subject is so obscure that one hesitates to speak of it, and with any assurance, but the observation that the occurrence of cancer is often connected with prolonged mental anxiety may not be without some significance. It is therefore gratifying to note that the researches of the Landon Imperial Fund, while not absolutely disproving, very seriously discredit the prevailing belief about the hereditary nature of the affliction.

They are also reassuring in a third direction. They show that the disease is not in the slightest degree infectious. It can be communicated from one person to another, but only by means of a surgical operation of the utmost delicacy and difficulty, and so far all practical purposes it is no more infectious than your tooth. This means that a patient may be visited without the least risk and there are many to whom this will be welcome information. These are all valuable discoveries and it may fairly be supposed that they will lead to others. Already the investigators are on the verge of the great secret. That they will presently succeed it need not be doubted.

HATES POLITICS, HAS HIGH OFFICE

Grey Achieves Striking Success in Spite of Himself. MAY BE PREMIER SOME DAY Is Admittedly Well Fitted for New Post of Minister of Foreign Affairs.

London, Jan. 9.—Gladstone once said of Sir Edward Grey, the new secretary of state for foreign affairs: "I have never remembered so signal a capacity for parliamentary life and so small a disposition for it." Sir Edward was but a boy of two and twenty when he made his maiden speech in the house of commons, but Speaker Addington said of his effort: "He went through his performance with an éclat which has not been equaled within my recollection." Yet the debutant himself declared at the time: "I feel convinced of my unfitness for a pursuit which I detest, which interferes with all my private comfort, and which I only sigh for an opportunity of abandoning decidedly and forever." That was twenty-one years ago. He has never gotten over his distaste for politics. He would much rather fish or play tennis than take part in the rough and tumble of a general election.

He has succeeded in spite of himself. He made a dash for the under secretary of state for foreign affairs in the last Liberal Government of which Lord Rosebery was the head, and his fitness for the higher office, the most important and responsible in the administration, is everywhere conceded. He is particularly well qualified for diplomatic work. He possesses the art of refuting or countering an opponent's argument without hurting his feelings. It is this due to the employment of ambiguous phrases. He always makes his meaning clear and says what he thinks in plain, direct Saxon. He never strains after oratorical effect. He does not seek out a political foe's par- ticular raw spot and dash vinegar over it, as Chamberlain, for instance, is so fond of doing. He never wins a cheer from his friends by snatching a loose phrase of an opponent and flipping him in the face with it. Consequently he makes no enemies. It used to be said of him that he hadn't enough of the fighting spirit—enough "devil" in his phrase it, to carry him far in politics but he has disproved that notion and many have picked him out as a probable future prime minister.

Shows Inflexible Will. Only 43, there is still the spring of youth in his stride. His face is clear, his hair is clear, his eyes are clear, his high forehead crowned by a mass of jet black hair, and a chin and jaw that bespeak inflexibility of will. His character is marked by almost impenetrable repose which nothing disturbs. It suggests a splendid storage of re- sulting force. He is an athlete mentally and physically. A disciple of Isaac Walton, he has written a deli- cious book on fly fishing. He is a fine performer alike in the cricket field, in the tennis court, and behind the rifle or foxing piece. His inclusion in the Liberal cabinet as head of the foreign office means continuity in England's foreign policy, for he is an imperialist of the Rosebery school. When Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman was hesitating in his appreciation of the treaty with Japan, and many radicals were inclined to deprecate the alliance, Sir Edward Grey was the first Liberal statesman to give it his cordial approval. As foreign minister he gets \$25,000 a year, which is \$1,000 more than is paid to an American cabinet minister, but according to the English standard he is well worth it. He is under no necessity of working for a living, for he has a fine estate of some two thousand acres and a snug for- tune besides. As chairman of the North Eastern Railway Company he has shown that he has a good head for business as well as statesmanship. That position brought him in \$20,000 a year and was practically a life appointment.
