Today they came in thousands to London's big show, and though they were glad enough to sit under the sheltering branches of the big trees in Queen's Park for an hour after their arrival, they made no complaint. The bright sunshine and the summery atmosphere seems in keeping with the Fair.

Just what the attendance will be today it is impossible as yet to say, but the directors feel that there will be everal thousand more people on the ground today than there were on Tuesday of a year ago.

Crowds Pouring In.

All day the crowds have been pouring in on the steam railways and the traction line.

The Grand Trunk brought in four specials-one from Jarvis, one from Sarnia, one from Guelph and one from Wingham. These four trains carried close onto 2,000 people.

The Pere Marquette brought about 600 persons to the Fair on a special, and the regular trains were crowded, so that the company carried to London about 1.000 visitors.

The C. P. R. had one special from Galt. Including the visitors on the regular trains, the company figures that between 700 and 800 people came over that line to see the exhibition.

REFUGEE TELLS OF RUSS HORRORS

Saw Women and Infants Shot Down by Troops.

USED CHURCH AS SANCTUARY

Three Hundred Hunted by Drunken Remain in Sacred Edifice for Days Without Food.

Warsaw, Sept. 11 .- The correspondent of the Associated Press interviewed a refugee from Siedlee this morning.

"I was staying Saturday at the Kupiecki Hotel in Siedlce. Suddenly, at 9 o'clock in the evening, I heard two shots, which were at once followed by a volley. In a few moments a number of Jewish women and children rushed into the hotel, pursued by soldiers. Shooting continued for an hour, and then came to an end. Then the only noise from the streets was the crying and moaning of the wounded. The soldiers got drunk, and coming out on to the streets, began wholesale murdet

WARSAW PRAISED FOR ITS BEAUTIES

More Attractive Than St. Petersburg or Moscow.

Warsaw, Poland, Sept. 10 .- Warsaw is more attractive city than St. Petersourg or Moscow, and in many respects the most attractive in the Russian empire. There are splendid palaces of the obility surrounded by gardens and groves—an unusual amount of foliage for so large a city; and scattered at frequent intervals are gardens and little parks and other breathing places in which the people can rest and play. The park system is quite extensive, and comes into the very midst of the business section. You can almost step from the door of your hotel into a dense forest. These pleasure grounds are well itilized. They are almost always filled with children playing upon the grass and in piles of sand that have been brought for their amusement, while the older folk seem to spend a good deal of their time sitting at the tables of he cafes listening to the music and

ipping their wine and beer. In the business section the shop windows are bright with tasteful displays of goods, and the sidewalks always seem to be crowded. 



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

NEW HOLD ON THEM

Cincinnati, Sept. 10. - Some amend-.364 ments to the rules governing the com-.340 mission, and one amendment to the in-.336 terpretation of the national agreement were announced today by the national baseball commission. To retain title to contract-jumping players, it will hereafter only be necessary for clubs having such title to carry the players on their reserve lists, the old method of tendering a new contract each March being declared unnecessary. The American Association is requested to abolish its non-reserve contracts, which have given the commission much trouble and are open to suspicion, in many cases, of not being entered into in good faith. The application for reinstatement of Player Reesling, who was declared to have violated his contract with Broklyn, was again denied, and Player Flynn's purchase from Toronto by the Boston Americans was declared to be invalid, the agreemnt not having been in proper form. The Toronto demand that Boston be compelled to complete the deal was denied.







The plant cost 4,000,000 kroners (a kroner is worth 20 cents in our money), and will be enlarged at the cost of another million in order to make it pay better. The burgomaster is quite sanguine about the prospects. The net profits during the first year, ending June 30, were 202,110 kroners—about \$4,000 in our money; and what is more important, from his point of view, the people have a chance to buy good beer at a nominal price, and are not in danger of being robbed by the Brauherrenverein.
