STORMING WAVES SWEEP OVER GERMAN DEFENCES

SUBURB OF LENS **FALLS TO CANUCKS** IN DASHING RUSH **ACROSS OPEN AREA**

German Front Line Protecting Avion Cleaned Up By Troops From B. C., Central Ontario and Nova Scotia.

[By Stewart Lyon, Canadian Press Correspondent in France.] Canadian Army Headquarters, June 28 .- A further phase of the long struggle for the recovery of Lens, the centre of the richest coal mining region of France, from the German invader, was reached early this (Thursday) morning when the enemy's front line protecting Avion, a suburb of the city, was captured by storming waves, which went forward under the protection of a concentration of artillery fire on that part of Avion immediately behind the

The assaulting troops were composed of men from British Columbia, Manitoba, Central Ontario and Nova Scotia.

Dashed Across Open.
The Canadians have been greatly heartened by the successes gained during the past few days at relatively sma cost, and this morning's advance, which involved the crossing of open ground, sloping up to Avion and the village of Leauvette, near the Souchez River, met with opposition of a serious nature at only one point, where a combination of machine gun fire and uncut wire delayed some of the Manitoba men. The attack was not intended to be pressed home at this particular point, because the ground specially favored the enemy, so no great harm was done

Bombed Them Out. The men to the east and west of the Manitobans having reached their own objectives, at once began to bomb the nemy out of portions of trenches held by him in the centre. When this dispatch was sent few Germans were left on this part of the line.

On the extreme left of the two-mile out along which the attack was made the Nova Scotians pushed their way up the Lens-Arras road to the village of Leauvette. Here they came into con-, east of the railway track, enemy dugouts were bombed.

Petrograd, June 28.—The hero of the army in the woody Carpathians is a former convict from Siberia, who by his example inspired an attack by forces which heretofore had obdurately refused to charge. The ex-convict, whose rank is sergeant, led 50 volunteers in a rush on a German blindage.

The attacking party, confused by heavy fire, wavered, whereupon the sergeant alone climbed a breastwork and huried a bomb among the enemy. Attacked by three Germans, he sabred and shot two of them. Then with only eighteen followers, several strongly held blindages were rushed. This produced general panic among the enemy and resulted in the capture of many prisoners. The sergeant was given an officer's commission, two regiments invited him to take command, and the whole of his division resolved immediately to participate in an offensive.
